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

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report for the Year 1943. The Report accords with Circular 10/4/, of the Ministry of Health and like the previous ones published during wartime, it is much abbreviated and is to be regarded as an interim report.

The figures included relate only to the civilian population and I am happy to be able to state that the incidence of notifiable disease remained low. The commonest infections were measles, whooping cough and numps, but the incidence of these was not heavy. Generally speaking the health of the inhabitants was good.

In the present report the subject of water supplies has been dealt with in some detail, as the Council will have to give much attention to this question, in the near future, the particulars submitted may be of some assistance.

It gives me very much pleasure to place on record my appreciation of the support which the Council has always given me in the discharge of my duties.

I have to acknowledge assistance most willingly given by the other officers of the Council in the preparation of this Report and throughout the year.

SECTION C. - SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA:

Water: -

The Council provides a piped water supply in the Parishes of Clifford, Dorstone and Longtown. These schemes are quite successful and are of very great value to the parishes which they serve. In addition, there are a few other small piped schemes in the District, which are privately owned. These are of varying degrees of constructional soundness but make a contribution to the water supplies of the area. The remaining dwellings are supplied by individual shallow wells and springs. There are a number of public wells in the District.

The supplies of the District cannot be regarded as entirely adequate although this may be a defect of distribution rather than of real shortage. The western part of the District contains a number of springs and it is possible that these could be utilised more extensively than at present. This is a matter for further investigation.

Drainage and Sewerage: -

Five new drains were laid during the year.

SECTION F. PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS DISEASE:

The number of notifications of infectious disease received was 64, which is the usual figure for what can be regarded as a normal year. Measles accounted for 25 and whooping cough for 16, whilst scarlet fever came next in order of frequency with 11 cases. Throughout the year, the district remained free from diphtheria; such freedom from this disease has not been experienced since 1936.

There were 10 cases of scarlet fever admitted to the Stretton Sugwas Isolation Hospital and 1 case of cerebro spinal fever was admitted to the County Council Hospital, Hereford, and a second case was notified after admission to the Herefordshire General Hospital, Hereford.

There was one death due to cerebro spinal fever, and one due to acute encephalitis and four due to influenza.

Scabies:-

Eight cases of scabies were brought to the notice of the Department and all necessary action for treatment and prevention was taken. Scabies in a rural district presents no easy solution as treatment must be carried out in the home and many dwellings are without adequate supplies of water and proper facilities for baths.

Diphtheria Immunisation:-

Slow but steady progress continued to be made with this work and much has been accomplished by the willing co-operation of the local medical practitioners. I am sure that the Council would wish me to place on record its appreciation of the work of the doctors in this direction.

At the end of the year it was considered that 25% of the child population under 5 years of age was immunised and that 57% of those aged 5 - 15 years were so protected. These figures are probably fairly accurate.

Tuberculosis: -

At the end of 1942 there were 29 cases of tuberculosis on the Register, 19 pulmonary and 10 non-pulmonary. During the year 1943 16 cases, 11 pulmonary and 5 non-pulmonary, were added to the Register. Sixteen cases were removed from the Register during the year, 11 pulmonary and 5 non-pulmonary, and on the 31st. December 1943, 29 cases remained on the Register, 19 pulmonary and 10 non-pulmonary.
