6. COUNTY MEDICAL SERVICES

(a) THE DOWNHAM MARKET INFANT WELFARE CENTRE

This was previously held at the B.R. Cross Headquarters—Howdale Road pending the completion of the Health Office buildings—Howdale Road. The centre is now held at the latter address.

The Assistant County Medical Officer of Health is in attendance at the session which is held from 2 to 4 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month.

I must register my warm appreciation of the voluntary help given at each session by the ladies of the local branch of the British Red Cross.

(b) SCHOOL MINOR AILMENT CLINIC

This is under the supervision of the School Nurse, who is in attendance at 10 a.m. every Wednesday during the term.

The clinic is held at Downham C.P. Mixed School.

The Assistant County M.O.H. attends one session a month or more often should the necessity arise.

(c) SCHOOL DENTAL CLINIC

This is at present closed—as no Dental Surgeon is available.

(d) HOME HELP SERVICE

The County Home Help Scheme is working smoothly and judging by results—the efforts of the five occasional Home Helps—are greatly appreciated.

DIPHTHERIA

NO case was notified during the year. As a word of warning – I should care to stress the great importance of energetically carrying on the immunisation campaign, although cases of diphtheria are unheard of in our district. This freedom from any outbreak has only been established by the immunity produced in the child population by the advent of immunisation against diphtheria. Any complacency might easily have unfortunate results.

The family doctor is always willing to immunise any infant, between the age of ten months and one year. A few children are however immunised at the Infant Welfare Centres at the parents request.

The following table gives the number of children immunised since the inception of the scheme and up to 31st December, 1950.

Report of Sanitary Inspector and Surveyor

Mr. Chairman, Ladies & Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting for your consideration my Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1950.

4. Meat Inspection

The whole of the meat supplied to the Urban District comes from the Ministry's Slaughter Houses at King's Lynn. During the year 150 lbs. of beef were condemned as unfit for human consumption.

5. Food Inspection

No adulteration of any foodstuff was reported during the year. 63 tins and packets of various foodstuffs were voluntarily surrendered as unfit for human consumption.

6. Milk and Dairies

Serving the district there are two producer retailers and three retailers. During the year there was one case of Brucella Abortus reported. For a time the sale of milk from the farm was restricted and alternative supplies of milk arranged for. The herd has now been proved negative and all restrictions on the sale of milk raised.

7. Movable Dwellings

During the year the Council issued two licences under Section 269 of the Public Health Act, 1936, in respect of two caravans. Only one of these is in occupation. The tenant of the second van having obtained alternative accommodation.

8. Public Cleansing

(a) SCAVENGING. The whole of the scavenging on both County and District roads is undertaken by the Council's employees. On the whole, the streets are kept tidy.

(b) REFUSE COLLECTION. During the year the Council took over delivery of a new side loading refuse vehicle. House refuse is collected once weekly throughout the district. A number of properties situated just outside the district in the Broomhill and Crow Hall areas are also served. Disposal of refuse is by means of tipping on land adjacent to Railway Road. Trouble was experienced of tipping by unauthorised persons. Precautions taken have now stopped the entry of lorries on to the tip.

9. Salvage

(a) PAPER. The Council continued its salvage organisation throughout the year. Collections increased over the previous year from 33 tons 4 cwts. 2 qrts. to 35 tons 10 cwts. 2 qrts. This is an average of approximately 30 lbs. per head of population, 1.12 tons per 1,000 population per month.

10. Rags and Bones

The Council do not operate a scheme for the removal of these wastes.

11. Dangerous Buildings

No cases were brought to the notice of the Council during the year.

12. Disinfection and Disinfestation

During the year four houses were disinfected at the occupier's request. No cases of Bed Bugs were reported.

13. Destruction of Rats and Mice

Your Sanitary Inspector and an employee attended a course held by the Ministry at Cambridge. Poisoning was carried out at the Refuse Tip, Sewage Works, and Sewage System. A number of premises in the town were also treated. It is still not generally realised that the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949, places on the occupiers of premises a duty to notify the Local Authority of cases where their premises are infested by rats and mice.

14. Factories and Workshops

Two cases of insufficient means of ventilation were dealt with during the year. These were remedied without resort to official action under the act.

15. Water Supply

The Water Supply in the District is from mains of the recently formed Wisbech Water Board which took over from the Wisbech Water Works Company. The supply comes from deep wells in the chalk at Marham. Six samples of water were taken from wells. Twelve properties were connected to the Boards mains during the year.

16. Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

Further trouble has been experienced with the Sewerage system during the year. The sewer through Brighton's field has been a continual source of trouble and has had to be cleared on a number of occasions. This is serious owing to the fact that there is a storm water overflow on this length which comes into operation when the sewer is blocked. The sewerage then flows into the ditch at the bottom of Priory Road Housing Site. The sewer in Priory Road is in a very bad condition. This sewer is constructed of brickwork, part of which caved in and approximately 40 feet were relaid. From the state of the kerbing in Priory Road it is obvious that there are other parts of the sewer which are suspects. Further blockages occurred in the sewers along Lynn Road and behind the houses on the south side of Railway Road.
