SMALLPOX.—VACCINATION IN 1921

Of the 164 children born and registered 98 were successfully vaccinated, eight died unvaccinated, two were removed from the district, the vaccination of two was postponed by medical certificate, and 54 remain unvaccinated, because their parents had conscientious objections to vaccination and made statutory declarations to that effect.

4. CAUSES OF SICKNESS.

Influenza was the cause of several deaths from pneumonia at the beginning of the year. The following Schools were closed:—

Childs Ercall, from 11th January to February 25th, on account of Whooping Cough.

Cheswardine, from 19th January to February 18th, on account of Whooping Cough.

Childs Ercall, from 4th July to July 15th, on account of diphtheria.

Norton-in-Hales, from 19th July to July 29th, on account of Chicken Pox.

Moreton Say, from 12th October to November 4th, on account of Measles.

5. SUMMARY (FOR REFERENCE) OF NURSING ARRANGEMENTS, HOSPITALS, AND OTHER INSTITUTIONS AVAILABLE FOR THE DISTRICT.

Professional Nursing in the Home:—
 (a) General: District Nurses are provided for all the parishes of the District by local branches of the Shropshire Nursing Federation, and supported by voluntary subscriptions and contributions. The Nurses are trained by the Shropshire Nursing Association and are available as midwives and for general nursing. (b) For infectious diseases: Special Nurses are provided by the County Council for cases of ophthalmia neonatorum and in outbreaks of measles.

Health Visitors and Midwives.—These are under control of the County Council as the public Health Authority for the County

Hospitals.—An Isolation Hospital for Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever situate at Little Drayton is available for and supported by the three Districts — Market Drayton Urban, and Drayton and Blore Heath Rural. The Hospital contains four wards with sixteen beds. An ambulance for infectious cases is stationed at the hospital.

6. LABORATORY WORK.

Bacteriological examinations in cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, Diphtheria, and Enteric Fever are made at Birmingham University, by arrangement with the County Council. Diphtheria anti-toxin has been used in all cases of Diphtheria since January, 1899, and the Council defrays the cost of the anti-toxin and of its injection.
