4 beg to submit my Annual Report for the year 1944:-

1. General Statistics: Area (acres) 2420. Average number or persons per inhabited building 3.24. Total number of separate occupiers 1881. Rateable Value £29,197. Sum represented by a penny mate £ 111.14.12d.

2. Extracts from vital statistics .- The Registrar General estimates the resident population at 6,083.

Birthsi- During the year there were 101 births, registered (93 males and 48 females) compared with 137 (70 males and 67 females) last year. Legitimate 88 (49 males and 39 females) illegitimate 13 (4 males and 9 females) The birthrate was 16.83 per 1,000. Jast year it was 20.91. For England and Wales the birthrate was 17.6 per 1,000 total population. Stillbirths in the District 3 (3 legitimate females)

Deaths:- During the year there was 81 deaths (37 males and 44 females) The deathrate was 15.16 per 1,000. Last year the deathrate was 15.72 per 1,000 The number of deaths of infants under 1 year was 6 (4 males and 2 females), the deathrate of infants under 1 year per 1,000 live births was 59.45 For England and Wales it was 46 per 1,000

The efficiency of notification of Tuberculosis in the area is well maintained,

4. An Association is in operation in the town known as the Driffieb Nursing Association by whom a full-time nurse is employed whose services are available to subscribers. Very good work is being done by the nurse.

In addition one C.M.B. nurse is working in the District.

Maternity and Child Welfare: There is a Home in Driffield with 12 beds for lying-in cases. There is also a Maternity Ward in the Driffield Public Assistance Institution.

Diphtheria - Immunisation.

The number of children undergoing immunisation against Diphtheria remains at a considerably high level and it is estimated that of the children in the town of school aga and under, about \$50 have received treatment.

Tuberculosis Clinics: Clinic belonging to County Council available once a week in Beverley.

Mental Diseases Clinic: Weekly at East Riding Mental Hospital, Beverley

Orthpaedic cases: Clinic monthly at Maternity Home, Driffield Veneral Diseases treated in Hull Royal Infirmary and York County

Hospital free of charge.

Bacteriological Examinations carried out at the Scarborough North
Riding Laboratory and the Laboratory at the Driffield Base
Hospital.

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Hospitals: The Sanatorium at Raywell belonging to the County Council is open to the district and East Riding generally. There is an Isolation Hospital for infectious diseases at Driffield upon to the East Riding.

Small-pox: The County Council has a Smallpox Hospital at Shipton for the whole district. There is a Motor Ambulance kept in Driffield for cases of infectious diseases.

Ambulances - Whilst no ambulance service is provided by the local authority, a whole-time C.D. ambulance has been made available for accident cases and there is also a privately owned ambulance in the town.

Schools: The sanitary condition and water supply (which is from the mains of the Driffield Water Company) of the Public Elementary Schools is good

5. Drainage and Sewerage

There has been no extension of the sewers during the year. The sewage disposal works have been maintained as efficiently as possible but considerable improvements to the plant are desired. The Council are at present considering plans to bring the Area up to date, so as to make it more efficient.

Rivers and Streams

Considerable pollution of the stream running through the centre of the town was found to be taking place. This pollution proved to be from the Cattle Market, and informal action was taken with the result that all emillings are now discharged into the sewer. One other property in Albien Street has also been disconnected from the stream and the drains connected to the sewer.

Cleset Accommodation

The Council have announced their intention of making a grant towards the nest of converting earthclosets into waterclosets. This step will have far-reaching effects in removing the most insanitary feature of the town. The announcement was only made in September and at the end of the year applications for the conversion of 59 carthclosets had been received.

A report was prepared by the Sanitary Inspector in August, 1944 which was placed before the Committee in September, 1944. This report shows that 976 Farthelesets were in use, and that the cost of collection of nightseil was 3.95 pence per closet per week with a total annual cost of £837.12s.8d

Public Cleansing

Scavenging of both nightsoil and refuse is undertaken throughout the town, and consists of a weekly collection of nightsoil, and in certain cases a twice weekly collection.

Refuse is divided into two categories viz:- non-salvageable and salvageable. A bi-weekly collection is maintained of each type which amounts to a weekly collection of Household Refuse. A weekly collection of non-salvageable refuse is carried out in Middle Street only.

The amount of salvage disposed of during the year was made up as follows:-

The total value of this salvage emounted to £302.3s.6d

Food Inspection is carried out by the Sanitary Inspector who is the authorised officer for the purpose.

6. Water Supply

The principle supply to the town is by means of the Driffield Water Company. In addition there are about 150 private pumps in the district, the majority of which are connected to bores sunk into the chalk to a depth of approximately 45 feet.

Samples of water (both chlorinated and unchlorinated) from the Company's supply are sent for analysis every menth and these shew the water to be of excellent purity.

Consequent on the establishment of military training camps on the Wolds, with attendant risk of pollution of the town's water water supply, chlorination of the piped supply was "stepped" up and a regular system of analysis of water from private pumps was instituted.

Samples were submitted for bacteriological examination to the North Riding Laboratories at Scarborough as follows:-

Result of analyses

Number of pumps found to be unfit for domestic use 12 serving 52 houses. Number of pumps slightly polluted but safe - 11 serving 25 houses ' Number of pumps supplying good water - 34 serving 125 houses.

Informal action was taken in respect of the 12 Unfit Samples and in 8 cases a service has been laid on from the Water Company's mains. Applications in respect of the other 4 cases, have been made to the Water Company for a supply, but the difficulty of obtaining the necessary labour and materials bas prevented this being done during the year.

Of the 11 slightly polluted samples, 6 were dealt with by submitting repeat samples which did not shew any deterior tion in the purity of the water, 2 were taken off and supplies laid on from the Water Company's mains, and the other three will be dealt with in 1945.

7. Housing

The War has prevented any new houses being erected and the condition of the old houses i deteriorating due to lack of labour and materials to maintain them in a proper manner. A survey of the town should be made to ascertain those houses not fit for occupation or capable at a reasonable expense of being made fit and

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those requiring supairs to bring them up to a desired standard.

There is a great deal of overcrowding in the town, the new houses are needed as soon as possible, to provide the improved housing conditions necessary.

Since the crebreak of war routine housing inspection has of necessity been greatly curtailed, but informal action has been taken when complaints have been received.
