Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1969.

The Registrar General's figure for the mid-year population was 6,940, an increase of 10 compared with last year. There were 136 live births and 135 deaths compared with 90 births and 147 deaths in 1968. The adjusted birth rate of 20.4 per thousand population compares with the national rate of 16.3 per thousand. The crude death rate is very high owing to the large number of aged persons in the population, but the adjusted rate of 11.1 per thousand population is slightly below the figure for England and Wales.

The causes of death follow the expected pattern, with diseases of the heart and circulation and cancer predominating. Nearly one third of the deaths were due to two diseases known to be associated with cigarette smoking, namely lung cancer and ischaemic heart disease. There were 4 deaths of infants under one year.

The sanitary circumstances of the area changed little during the year. Water was supplied by the East Yorkshire (Wolds Area) Water Board and was satisfactory in quantity and quality. Sewage continued to be treated at the Riverhead Sewage Works.

I wish to draw the attention of the Council to the section of the report concerning food hygiene. There are 64 food premises in the town, but it was only possible for the Public Health Inspector to pay a total of 61 visits of inspection. Few delivery vehicles were inspected, and no visits for inspection of poultry were made to the two poultry processing premises. These are serious and potentially dangerous, gaps in the public health service and should concern every member of the Council. I am not criticising the Public Health Inspector. He carries out as much of this work as is humanly possible. Adequate coverage of food hygiene depends on the provision of adequate staff, for which the Council is responsible. The Council must decide whether they are prepared to accept the present unsatisfactory state of affairs.

In presenting this Report I would like to express my thanks to Mr. Barker and the staff for their work and help during the year, and also to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE DISTRICT

HOSPITAL SERVICES

The Hospitals serving the District are as follows:-

East Riding General Hospital

This hospital is under the East Riding Hospital Management Committee and admits acute general and geriatric patients. Out-patient facilities include clinics for medicine, surgery, orthopaedic surgery, gynaecology, paediatrics, oto-laryngology, chest diseases, ophthalmology, psychiatry, dermatology, radiotherapy and diabetic.

Northfield Hospital

Under the East Riding Group Hospital Management Committee this hospital admits patients suffering from chest diseases.

Castle Hill Hospital, Cottingham

All cases of infectious diseases in the District requiring hospital care are admitted to this hospital which is in the Hull "B" Group Hospital Management Committee.

Miniature Mass Radiography

The Miniature Mass Radiography Unit of the Leeds Regional Hospital Board visited the Cross Hill Car Park on the second and fourth Mondays in each month from 10 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. 259 persons were examined during 1969.

NURSING HOMES

There are no private nursing homes in the District.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

Part III Accommodation

Accommodation for 40 elderly persons is provided by the County Council at the Limes, Driffild. Wolds House ceased to operate as a Home for the aged in March, 1969 and the patients in there at the time were transferred to other East Riding County Council Homes.

Infant Welfare Clinic

An infant welfare clinic is held at the Victoria Road Clinic each Tuesday afternoon from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. A Health Visitor is in attendance at each session of this clinic to advise mothers on the care of babies and young children, and a doctor is also in attendance on the first Tuesday of each month.

Domiciliary Midwifery Service

Three Nurse/Midwives serve this District. One resides above the Victoria Road Clinic, and two are living in private residence.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE DISTRICT

HOSPITAL SERVICES

The hospitals serving the District are as follows:-

East Riding General Hospital

This hospital is under the East Riding Hospital Management Committee and admits general and geriatric patients. Out-patient facilities include clinics for medicine, surgery, orthopaedics, gynaecology, paediatrics, ophthalmology, chest diseases, otolaryngology, psychiatry, dermatology, radiology and pathology.

Northfield Hospital

Under the East Riding Group Hospital Management Committee this hospital admits patients suffering from chest diseases.

Castle Hill Hospital, Goole

All forms of infectious diseases in the District requiring hospital care are admitted to this hospital which is in the Hill "B" Group Hospital Management Committee.

Minstons New Radiography

The Minstons New Radiography Unit of the Leeds Hospital Group is based at the Cross Hill Car Park on the second and fourth Mondays each month from 10 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. 150 persons were examined during

MURDER HOUSE

There are no private nursing homes in the District.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR THE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED

East Hill Association

Accommodation for 40 elderly persons is provided by the County Council at the East Hill Association. This home is situated on a farm at East Hill, 1955 and the patients in charge of the home were transferred from the East Riding County Council Home.

LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authority Schools in the District. In addition the following facilities are provided at the Victoria Road Clinic, Driffield:-

Speech Therapy Clinic One session per week.

OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

Buckrose Health Divisional Co-ordinating Committee.

Once every two or three months a Co-ordinating Committee, under the aegis of the County Council, meets in Bridlington to co-ordinate the work of Officers in the District who are concerned with the welfare of children. The primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of break-up of families.

On the Committee are representatives of the County Children's Department the County Health Department, the School Welfare Department, the County Welfare Department, the Housing Managers of the District Councils, the Department of Health and Social Security, the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Royal Voluntary Service, Probation Officers and a Marriage Guidance Counsellor. Representatives of other organisations are co-opted from time to time as the need arises. Your Medical Officer of Health in his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer takes the Chair of the Committee.

PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY SERVICE

Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory of the Medical Research Council at Hull.

VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS

British Red Cross

The British Red Cross Society, acting as agents for the County Council, provide a service for the loan of nursing requisites which may be needed for temporary periods for sick persons being nursed in their own homes. In the Urban District the Depot for these requisites is:-

The British Columbia Branch of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children was organized on the 15th of the month. The purpose of the Society was to protect the children and to see that the children were not abused. The Society was organized by the County.

WATER SUPPLY

Weekly routine samples from the various sources supplying the town are taken by the East Yorkshire (Wolds Area) Water Board, and submitted for bacteriological examination. The water is satisfactory in quality and well protected against contamination. Chlorine is added to all water prior to distribution, the North End bore hole accounting for the greater part of the consumption and standby supplies coming from the Kilham bore hole and the Spellowgate bore hole. The supplies are sufficient in quantity.

In addition five water samples were taken by this Authority from the town's mains and found to be satisfactory.

Two large Poultry Processing Factories are supplied by private bore holes. The water is chlorinated and three samples submitted for bacteriological examination showed the water to be of satisfactory quality.

Swimming BATHS

Five routine samples of water from the swimming baths at the Driffield County Secondary Modern School were obtained and examined at the Public Health Laboratory and the results show the water to be safe and well chlorinated. Two samples of the bath water were also taken for chemical analysis and these proved to be satisfactory.

The lack of sanitary accommodation within the swimming pool enclosure caused some concern during the year.

SEWAGE AND SEWERAGE DISPOSAL

The town's sewage is treated at the Riverhead Sewage Works, the effluent being discharged into the Canal. Details of the performance of the works are to be found in the Public Health Inspector's Sewage Works Annual Report. Trade effluent charges are made for the treatment of sewage from five premises.

RODENT CONTROL

Only 6 'takes' were recorded during the annual test baiting of sewers, a total of 41 manholes being tested. During the year 103 visits were made to infested premises although the incidence of rat infestation within the Urban District, is fortunately, low.

INSECT INFESTATION

15 complaints were received concerning infestation of insects and 13 wasps nests were destroyed.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

There are 3 public convenience blocks in the Urban District, and whilst every endeavour is made to keep them clean and fit for the public to use they are never completely satisfactory due to the attention of hooligans etc. The conveniences are visited twice daily but, although it is impossible to provide a full time attendant at each convenience, the cleanliness will never be up to standard expected by most people until this is so.
