No records have yet been obtained concerning many premises now overcrowded owing to war-time conditions.

(e) No records are available regarding the state of overcrowding but it is felt on the whole that the general position, brought about by war-time conditions, has not deteriorated during the year although there are still numbers of evacuees, both official and unofficial, resident in the area. Three cases of overcrowding have been abated, but it has only been possible to deal effectively with the worst cases as there is no alternative accommodation in the district.

All premises used in connection with the production or sale of milk were inspected regularly by the Sanitary Inspector during the year and all samples taken by him were satisfactory.

Meat inspection has been confined to that in butchers' shops and stores as no slaughtering now takes place in the local slaughter-houses. During the year, 31½ lbs. of meat were condemned as unfit for human consumption.
