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SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

1. (i) Public Health Officers of the Authority.

a. Medical. I took up duty as Medical Officer of Health on 29th June, 1942.

b. Others. Mr. R. E. Hulse, Cert.R. San.I., is a wholetime Officer and combines the duties of Borough Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector.

b. Ambulance facilities. These have been good, and have only been used for the transport of sickness and accident cases. All infectious cases were removed by special ambulances provided by the Bromsgrove, Droitwich & Redditch Joint Hospital Board.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

1. (1) Water.

The water supply has been satisfactory, both as to quantity and quality, throughout the year.

(11) Drainage, Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

The Sewage Disposal Works have continued to operate satisfactorily during the year and all effluent samples were very satisfactory.

2. Rivers and Streams.

The River Salwarpe, a stibutary of the River Severn, passes through the town. No pollution has occurred, the condition of the canals has been satisfactory and prophylactic measures are still applied to prevent larvæ from breeding.

3. (1) Closet Accommodation.

Twelve additional W.C.s have been put in during the course of the year.

(11) Public Cleansing.

The methods in use for the collection and disposal of refuse have been satisfactory.

(111) Sanitary Inspection of the Area.

Details of this will be found in the attached Tabular Statement.

(iv) Shops.

Inspections have been carried out and any necessary alterations have been done.

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(v) Camping Sites.

There are no sites in the area used for camping purposes.

(vi) Smoke Abatement.

No action has been necessary in this matter.

(vii) Swimming Baths and Pools.

There is one privately owned Swimming Pool in the Borough. All samples of water taken for baoteriological examination proved satisfactory.

(viii) Eradication of Bed Bugs.

Action was taken where necessary in connection with this matter during the year.

4. Schools.

The sanitary condition of the schools is fair; the water supply good. The scholars were inspected regularly during the year and all cases of infectious disease, together with immediate contacts of notifiable diseases were excluded according to schedule.

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SECTION E.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) Milk.

All premises used in connection with the production or sale of milk were inspected regularly by the Sanitary Inspector during the year. 164 tins of Milk were condemned as unfit for food.

(d) Meat.

Meat inspection has been confined to that in butcher's shop and stores as no slaughtering now takes place in the local slaughterhouses.

During the year 175 lbs. of meat and fish were condemned as unfit for human consumption.

(c) Adulteration.

No action was taken during the year.

(d) Chemical and Bacteriological Examination of Food.

This work is carried out by the County Analyst at and Bacteriologist at the County Buildings, Worcester.

AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS PREVALENCE OF. DISEASES.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

During the year, the diphtheria immunisation campaign was continued and a further 68 children completed their course of injections.

The diphtheria prophylactic used was A.P.T. which had been supplied by the Ministry of Health.

It is again a pleasure to pay tribute to the help and co-operation of the general practitioners, health visitors, district nurse and school teachers in connection with immunisation propaganda. Every effort has been made to contact the parents of children under 15 years of age and it is hoped that by the end of 1943 the percentage figures of immunised children will be highly satisfactory.

Notifiable Diseases during the year 1942.

In the early part of the year Scarlet Feber was epidemic since then there has been no serious outbreak of any infectious disease.

So far as we can ascertain, the four cases of diphtheria which occurred during the year had not previously been immunised.
