#### SECTION B.

## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

#### Laboratory Services.

These are provided at the County Council's laboratory in Worcester.

## Ambulance Facilities.

The Droitwich and District Ambulance continues to meet the needs of the district, as regards sick and accident cases.

Infectious cases are removed to hospital in ambulances provided by the Isolation Hospital Authorites.

## Nursing in the Home.

This is provided by the LOCAL DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION.
Two District Nurse-Midwives are working in the area.

#### Treatment Centres and Clinics.

The County Council's Infant Welfare Centre is held in the Baptist Church Hall, Droitwich, every Tuesday afternoon. Children are immunised against diphtheria at this Centre.

During the year the following attendances were made at the Centre:-

Attendances of children under 1 year of age 1418
Attendances of children 1 to 5 years of age 539

The County Council's Antenatal Clinic is held on the first and third Wednesday morning in each month at the Baptist Church Hall.

During the year there were 383 attendances at this clinic.

Health visiting in the district is done by one of the

County Council's Health Visitors.

#### Hospitals.

Patients in the district attend the Worcester Royal Infirmary and the Birmingham Hospitals.

Cases of infectious disease are admitted to Hill Top Isolation Hospital, Bromsgrove.

Treatment for cases of Tuberculosis is provided by the County Council and those requiring sanatorium treatment are admitted to Hill Top Hospital and Knightwick Sanatorium.

Maternity cases can be admitted to the County Council's hospitals, the Lucy Baldwin Maternity Hospital at Stourport and the Mary Stevens Maternity Hospital at Stourbridge.

Treatment for cases of Venereal Disease is provided free of charge by the County Council at the following hospitals:-

General Hospital, Steelhouse Lane, Birmingham.
Kidderminster & District General Hospital, Kidderminster:
Worcester Royal Infirmary.
Guest Hospital, Dudley.
Corbett Hospital, Stourbridge.

## SECTION C.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

## 1. (a) Water Supply.

The supply of water from the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company has been satisfactory, both in quality and quantity, throughout the year.

Samples are taken quarterly and are sent to the County Laboratory for analysis. These samples gave satisfactory results throughout the year.

(b) Drainage, Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

No changes in these services were made during the year.

#### 2. Rivers and Streams.

The Canal bed is in a dirty condition and requires cleansing but owing to the shortage of labour, the Ministry of Health has been unable to approve the carrying out of this work. It is hoped that this work will be carried out as soon as possible.

## 3. Sanitary Inspection of the Area.

This was carried on as usual, and is reported on below by the Sanitary Inspector.

## 4. Smoke Abatement.

No action was taken in this matter during the year.

Work was begun on the Council's post-war housing programme during the year.

# of the Sanitary Work completed in the year ended 31st December, 1946.

## Housing.

The Council's Housing Programme was during 1946 getting under way and whilst no houses were completed some were occupied early in 1947, and tenders were let and work commenced upon the construction of others.

The Housing problem is becoming more ac .e as the months go by, but it is hoped that 1947 will see a good start upon the finding of homes for the many needy cases.

There are a number of houses in the Borough in a vary bad state of repair and which could doubtless have been cleared but for the war.

It is very evident that when the housing of families without houses is complete an important slum clearance programme will await the consideration of the Council.

At the close of the year the Council were considering the best method of dealing with unfit houses from which tenants had moved to Council Houses, with a view to preventing the houses again becoming overcrowded at an early date.

Repair of Houses not in all respects fit for habitation and sanitary improvements.

Due to the concentration of building, labour upon new houses it is most difficult to quickly obtain the execution of repairs of existing dwellings. The owners attention has been drawn to defects in a number of instances and repairs have been carried out after informal action.

# Scavenging and Refuse Disposal.

Refuse disposal is still carried out by controlled tipping at the old Sewage Farm. The tip is meintained in good order, and regularly treated against rat infestation.

Collection which was fortnightly has been improved to a weekly visit to each house. With the re-occupation of a number of Hotels and the influx of visitors into the Town it has become necessary to have a refuse collection team of driver and 3 men, being 1 additional man.

The maintaining of the necessary number of collectors is far from easy in the present time of labour shortage.

Your refuse collection vehicle 10 years old, requires renewal, and as this will take a considerable time I would suggest consideration be given to the matter now.

## Salvage.

The undermentioned salvage has been collected during the year.

With the ending of hostilites interest in Salvage collection dropped and the voluntary workers ceased giving their time to this work. Accordingly it is becoming more and more difficult to arrange collections without the costs incurred becoming so high as to exceed the income received from the sale of salvage collected.
