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
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Report for the year ending 31st December 1942.

Mr. CHAIRMAN and GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit the Annual Report for the year ending 31st, December, 1942.

This report is prepared on the lines indicated in circular 2773, which was issued by the Ministry of Health in March 1943. Circular 2773 did in fact suggest that the report should be prepared as set out in Circular 2601 of March, 1942.

SECTION "B"

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Public Health Officers of the Authority.

(a) Medical. I took up duty as your Medical . Officer of Health on June 29th.

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(b) Others. Mr. F.W.I. Whitehouse, Cert. S.I.B., M.S.I.A., commenced duties as Sanitary Inspector and Building Surveyor on December, 21st 1942., in place of Mr. W. Pembleton.

Mr. Ilsley has continued to act as an unqualified assistant to the Sanitary Inspector during the year.

There have been no changes in the Laboratory, Ambulance or Nursing Services or in the Clinics or Hospitals which continue to be satisfactory.

SECTION "C"

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES of the AREA

- 1, (a) Water. Cases of minor contamination of wells in the district have been remedied after the attention of the owners has been drawn to existing conditions.
- (b) <u>Drainage & Sewerage</u>. The sewerage scheme at Fernhill Heath has continued to operate efficiently during the year. Samples of effluent have all been satisfactory.
- 2. Rivers & Streams. Possible sources of pollution of streams have been kept under observation and co-operation has continued between the officers of the County Council and the Local Sanitary Authority.
- 3. (a) Public Cleansing. Salvage operations have again demanded considerable attention from the Sanitary Inspector and imposed a certain strain upon the vehicles used normally for the scavenging services. Scavenging has been carried out as efficiently as possible under existing conditions, but particular attention has been paid to the more thickly populated areas.
- (b) Sanitary Inspection of the Area. The report on this work prepared by the Sanitary Inspector is attached.
- (c) Shops. No action was taken under the Shops Act, 1934, during the year.
- (d) Camping Sites. These were kept under observation but the number of persons camping has been reduced owing to wartime conditions.
- (e) Smoke Abatement. It was not found necessary to take any action during the year.
- (f) Swimming Baths and Pools. The only privately owned swimming pool in the area has remained closed.

	up- hou inc	The housing problem is one which will demand considerable tention after the cessation of hostilities as there is no to-date survey of housing conditions in the area and many uses, condemned years ago, are still occupied and becoming creasingly unfit for human habitation. Efforts are made to relieve the worst cases of overcrowding to in the absence of a housing building programme, it is often efficult.

INSPECTION and SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

- (1) Milk Supply. Milk producers' premises have been visited during the year. Samples taken for bacteriological examination were satisfactory.
- (2) Meat and other Foods. No slaughtering has been carried out in the licensed slaughter-houses.
- (3) Adulterations, etc. I am indebted to Mr. E.A. Spencer, Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures, for the information that 45 samples of milk and one of other foods were taken under the Food and Drugs Act, 1938.
- (4) Chemical and Bacteriological Examination of Food. This work is carried out by the County Analyst and Bacteriologist at the County Laboratory, Worcester.

The percentage of the child population immunised in the groups 0-5 years and 5-15 years was estimated at the end of the year as being 43.2% and 58.6% in the respective groups. These figures and the number of children immunised may appear low but an intensive propaganda programme was carried out throughout the area and a considerable improvement should be shown for the year 1943.

It is again pleasing to acknowledge the valuable assistance given by the school teachers, district nurses and general practitioners in the propaganda carried out and the setting up of centres for immunisation.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES

The following table shows the incidence of infectious disease in the area, from which it will be seen that no disease reached epidemic proportions.

The single case of paratyphoid fever B which occurred, together with another case in an adjoining area, originated presumably from the same source as those reported last year in the area. All necessary investigations were carried out with negative results.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1942.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE DROITWICH RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr, Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit the Annual Report in an abridged form for the year 1942, during which period my predecessor, Mr. W. Pembleton was in office until September, and I commenced duties on the 21st December. I am, thus, therefore, indebted to Mr. J. Ilsley, Assistant Sanitary Inspector, for much of the information contained in this Report.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES

WATER SUPPLY. The major portion of the District is dependent upon shallow wells for its source of supply. Parts of Dodderhill and Upton Warren parishes are served by the mains of the "East Worcestershire Waterworks Company", and in North Claines the Council have installed a public water supply, which is received in bulk from the City of Worcester and distributed through your Council's main. There are 458 properties connected to this supply, 10 of which were made during the period under review. Other parts of the District immediately adjoining the city, receive supplies direct through meter.

The Council's Water Inspector carries out the maintenance of the Booster Plant, meter readings and repairs, connections to mains and their maintenance.

Dairies and cowsheds were visited during the year to ensure clean milk production, concentrating upon the methods of production and provision of sterilisation. 144 Samples of

Graded Milk were taken by the County Council, of which 14 proved to be unsatisfactory.

MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

No slaughtering of animals for sale for human consumption took place in the area, all animals being slaughtered at the Ministry of Food's centralised depot.

Slaughtering of animals by private owners for their own use under licence from the Ministry of Food continued and

inspection was carried out when requested.

Seven licences were issued by the Council to slaughtermen under the Slaughter of Animals Act.

It is pleasing to note that only 32 - 61b tins of Corned Mutton and 7 tins of Carrots were condemned as being unfit for human consumption during the year.

NEW BUILDINGS.

The amount of development continued to be small. Plans for 13 new buildings were deposited and dealt with, of which only 6 were dwelling-houses.

The Department worked in close collaboration with the

County Planning and County Highways Departments.

SCAVENGING AND SALVAGE.

The collection of domestic refuse was reasonably satisfactory in view of the scattered nature of the District and shortage of manpower. The populous areas received prior consideration at the expense of

the outlying districts.

The system of salvage collection, commenced in 1941, continued to prove successful. It will be remembered that representatives of the Women's Voluntary Service collect the salvage in their own regions, and leave it at a district salvage depot from whence it is collected every month by the Council's vehicle. The materials are then taken to the Central Depot at Station Road, Fernhill Heath, for sorting and despatching. The successful working of the scheme depends to a very high degree upon the efforts of the Women's Voluntary Service, and the undermentioned table demonstrates how very energetic they proved to be:- viz.
