Report for the Year Ending 31st December 1943

Mr. CHAIRMAN and GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in submitting the Annual Report on the Sanitary Administration of the district for the year 1943.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

Water Supply. During the year 16 properties were connected to the Council's main in the Parish of North Claines, making a total 474 properties which are now deriving a piped supply. The remainder of the district with the exception of parts of Dodderhill and Upton Warren Parishes, which are served by the mains of the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company, derive their supply, in the main, from shallow wells.

The maintenance of the North Claines supply devolves upon the Council, and the Water Inspector is fully equipped to enable him to cope with burst pipes, carry out connections and other incidentals that may arise.

A survey of the whole area was made during the year when statistics were compiled chiefly with the idea of ascertaining the various groups of properties of reasonable dimension. This information will prove of value when post-war water supplies are under consideration.

DRAINAGE, SEWERAGE & SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The disposal installations throughout the Area received constant supervision. In some of the parishes the drainage systems are entirely inadequate to deal with the demands placed upon them and require complete reconstruction when times are more propitious, especially to meet the demands of new housing needs.

The Fernhill Heath Sewage Works continued to operate efficiently during the year but necessitated a workman being in constant attendance for pumping purposes, etc.

SCAVENGING.

The collection of house refuse is carried out by private lorries on hire to the Council, the Council providing the scavengers. An endeavour is made to obtain tips in close proximity to centres of collection and as far as labour conditions permit, controlled tipping is carried out. The existing system whereby urbanised areas are visited fortnightly and outside areas at intervals of from 2 to 3 months proved reasonably satisfactory.

A total of 158 inspections were made in connection with cowsheds and dairies for the period under review.

142 Milk Samples were taken by the County Council of which 21 failed to pass the prescribed tests.

MEAT AND OTHER FOODS

The suspension of slaughtering of animals for sale for human consumption at private slaughterhouses continued during the year, all slaughtering taking place at the Government Slaughterhouse outside the area.

Seven Slaughtermen's licences were issued by the Council under the Slaughter of Animals Act.

Routine visits were made to food preparing establishments during the year when conditions were found to be satisfactory.

RATS AND MICE DESTRUCTION.

Directions were received by the Council under the infestation Order of 1943 from the Ministry of Food requiring a full report of the extent to which non agricultural land and buildings were infested with rats.

A comprehensive survey was carried out when infestations were grouped under three categories namely "Reservoir", "Major Primary" and "Minor Secondary" types.

The result of the survey demonstrated that the majority of infestations were of a minor character.

Later directions required the Council to remedy all Rat and Mice infestations in the administrative area, which job had been previously carried out by the County Council under the Rats and Mice Destruction Act of 1919.

To facilitate their work under the Infestation Order the Council applied for and received delegated powers to operate the provisions of the Rats and Mice Destruction Act.

NEW BUILDINGS

Plans for 18 new buildings were deposited and dealt with during the year.

In addition to the above, building operations were commenced on the construction of eight agricultural cottages, being built under the auspices of the Ministry of Health.

HOUSING (Rural Workers) ACT.

One Cottage was reconstructed during the year under the provisions of the Act.
