





- Milk Supply. Milk producers' premises have been visited during the year. Samples taken for bacteriological examination were satisfactory.
- (2) <u>Meat and other Foods</u>. No slaughtering has been carried out in the licenced slaughter-houses.
- (3) <u>Adulterations etc.</u> I am indebted to Mr. E. A. Spencer, Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures, for the following information regarding samples taken in this district under the Food & Drugs Act, 1938.

42 Samples of milk, 2 samples of drugs and 13 miscelleneous samples were examined and found to be satisfactory. Proceedings were taken sgeinst a farmer in respect of the sale of milk containing extraneous water, and he was fined £12 and ordered to pay costs.



Mr. Chairman and Members,

I beg to submit a report upon the work of your Sanitary Inspector's Department for the year ended 31st December, 1944.

1. The Report is divided into the following categories namely :-

- In addition to general public health and housing duties, the depertment is responsible for the administration of your byclaws in respect of new buildings, the supervision of the C ouncil's water supplies, the meintaince of sewage disposal plants, and the collection and disposal of household refuse.
- The staff of the department during the year comprised one cualified inspector, an unqualified assistant, a water inspector, one clerk and 8 manual workers.
- The work accomplished under the Public Health Acts is set out in the following table. The majority of the improvements were schieved by negotiation or preliminary notice, formal notice being served in 4 cases only.

The Council entered into a contract with the War Agricultural Executive Committee for the Pest Officer to treat the Council's refus tips during the year and these were kept free from infestations.

- Co-operation with the County Council was maintained during the year in the provention of pollution of streams, particularly in regard to the pollution of the Barbourne brock.
- 7. The accumulated effect of wer-time conditions upon housing accommodation became increasingly apparent during the year and the general suspension of new building tog ther with the limited amount of meintenance possible, due to chortege of labour and metricals, have combined to produce r general lowering of the standard of housing. The slup character provisions of the Housing Acts wire in abovance during the year.

The action taken under the Housing /cts is detailed in the re-ort of the Medical Officer of Health.

- During the year one cottage situated at Lincomb was reconditioned with the assistance of a grant under the Housing (Rural Workers) Acts.

- A total of 8 sites for tem every dwellings were licenced during the year. The permitted number of dwellings upon these sites amounted to 410.
- 11. The licenced camping grounds mainly situated near the River Severn were occupied during heliday periods and were inspected for contravintions of byelays.
- The total number of plans submitted during the year was 39.
 Of those 37 were approved and 2 r fused. 23 plans related to domestic and 16 to non-domestic buildings.
- 13. The parish of North Cleines is supplied by water purchased in bulk from the County Borough of Worcester and distributed through the Council's mains. During the year a short extinsion to the mains was made by direct labour to sup 19 20 houses in Morton Road, Fornhill Heath. The number of properties served by the mains is 464.

The booster plant continued to give efficient service during the year.

- The perishes of Upton Warren, Dodderhill and Hedger are supplied from mains of the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company. The total number of properties so served is 280.

- 16. The remainder of the Rural District depend for water supply upon wells and springs and a table showing the results of the tabeles taken is included in the report of the Medical Officer of Health. Generally those supplies have proved adecuate but an acut shortage occurred in the perish of Hanbury where it was found necessary to institute a sch me of water carting during the months of June and July. The scheme was greatly assisted by the N.F.S., who delivered water for non-demestic purposes.
- 17. The four licenced sloughter houses in the rurel district were not used during the year; meat consumed in the district being drawn from the Ministry of Food Abataic at Worcester and Kidderminster where systematic meat inspection is carried out.
- 18. A total of 7 licences to sloughter animals for fe d were renewed by the C ouncil.

- 22. Samples for the Ford and Drugs Act are collected by efficers of the C ounty Council.
- 23. Sewerase systems exist in the parishes of North Claines, Ombersley and Hertlebury. Treatment is undertaken at North Claines by a modern sewage discosal elent consisting of screening, addimentation and humus tenks, filter and sludge beds. Satisfactory effluents were obtained from this plant during the year.
- 24. A collapse of the Hartlebury sower occurred during the year. A length of 20 yerds of st newere sewer was relaced with cast iron as the depths beneath the road was insufficient at that point in view of the traffic using the road.
- 25. Cleansing and general maintenance of the small scrage disposal plants taken over by the Council was carried out.
- 26. A collection of household refuse is carried out by the Council throughout its district. Collection is made by the Council's employees with hired vehicles. A monthly collection in villages and bi-monthly in outside areas was operated.
- 27. Dispessi of refuse in by tipping and efforts ware made during the year to obtain centrally situated tips to facilitate collection. The tips used during the year were situated at Battenton, Withy Furlang, Hadzor

and Hindlip and the Hindlip tip was filled up, levelled and scaled.

- 28. Salvege operation included a voluntary monthly collection by members of the V.V.S., to central depots. The Council underteek the baling of paper and rags and the collection of bones, metals, rubber and bettles.
- 29. A successful book recovery drive tes held throughout the district in April and over 60,000 books were collected. Much of the success of the effort was doe to the teach rs and sche lehildren and to members of the W. V.S., who undertook the sorting of the books. 7765 books were sent for the use of members of the Forces, 655 to blitzed libraries, 400 to hospit 1s and 31,180 for Salvage.
