GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

a) Laboratory Services.

These are provided at the County Council's laboratory in Worcester.

b) Ambulance Service.

The district is served by the Droitwich and District ambulance association for cases of accident or general illness.

Infectious cases are removed to hospital in an ambulance provided by the Isolation Hospital authorities.

c) Nursing in the Home.

Is provided by the local District Nursing Associations.

d) Hospitals.

Cases of infectious disease needing hospital treatment are removed to Hill Top Isolation Hospital, Bromsgrove.

Cases of Tuberculosis are admitted to Knightwick Sanatorium and Hill Top Isolation Hospital.

SECTION IV

GENERAL PROVISIONS ON HEALTH SERVICES

a) Laboratory Services

These are provided at the County General Hospital Laboratory in Worcester.

b) Ambulance Service

The district is served by the District Ambulance Association for cases of accident or general illness. Infectious cases are removed to hospital in an ambulance provided by the local District Nursing Association.

c) Isolation in the Home

Is provided by the local District Nursing Association.

d) Hospitals

Cases of infectious diseases needing hospital treatment are removed to Hill Top Infirmary Hospital, Bromsgrove. Cases of tuberculosis are admitted to Kibworth Sanatorium and Hill Top Infirmary Hospital. Treatment for cases of venereal disease is provided by the County Council at the following hospitals free of charge:-

General Hospital, Steelhouse Lane, Birmingham.

Kidderminster & District General Hospital.

Worcester Royal Infirmary.

Guest Hospital, Dudley.

Corbett Hospital, Stourbridge.

e) Clinics.

The district is served by Infant welfare clinics at Droitwich, Worcester, Ombersley and Stourport and antenatal clinics at Worcester, Droitwich and Stourport.

SECTION "C"

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

a) Water Supply.

During the year the Rural District Council obtained the services of Major A. H. S. Waters, V.C., M.Inst.C.E., M.I.Mech.E., M.I.Struct.E., M.Inst.W.E., as their consultant to advise them on the question of a piped water supply to the whole area.

The following are extracts from his report to the Rural District Council "Quite apart from potential requirements involved in compliance with the intention of the Rural Water Supplies and Sewerage Act 1944, there is in some portions of your Rural District an existing acute shortage of supply.

Out of twenty-three parishes, only some seven parishes are to any important extent fed with water from publicily owned piped supplies; and your anxiety that this condition of affairs should be remedied without delay is readily appreciated."

"there is no doubt whatever in my mind that water, at practicable cost, from one source or another can and should be brought to every reasonably considerable centre of population in your District!"

b) Drainage and Sewerage.

No extension of sewerage schemes was carried out during the year, but the Council obtained the services of Mr. Arnold Brooksbank, M.Inst.C.E., M.Inst.W.E., as their consulting engineer and during the year he made a survey of the district and submitted a report to the Council on the sewerage requirements and possibilities of the Rural District.

SECTION "D"

HOUSING.

During the year, the first post-war year's housing programme was considered by the Council.

Sites were selected for the building of houses by the Council at Ombersley, Crowle, Fernhill Heath and Wychbold, Tibberton and Hanbury.

Preparation of the site for the first 20 houses to be built at Fernhill Heath and preparation of the housing sites at Ombersley and Crowle were well in hand by the end of the year.

During the year a survey of all working class houses in the district was begun, this work is reported on in detail by the Sanitary Inspector. Most useful information on the housing conditions in the district will be available when this survey is completed.

ANNUAL REPORT 1945.

Mr. Chairman and Members,

I beg to submit a report upon the work of your Sanitary Inspector and Building Surveyor's Department for the year ended 31st December 1945.

The Department was largely concerned during the year with the preparation of schemes for the post-war years. The work was exacting for in addition to this and to carrying out normal duties with a depleted qualified staff an effective start was made on a comprehensive housing survey of the rural district to implement the recommendations which has become generally known as the Hobhouse Report on Rural Housing. A great deal of time was taken up in assisting the Council's consulting engineers in the compilation of their reports upon the provision of piped water supplies and sewerage consequent upon the Rural Water Supplies and Sewerage Act of 1944. Also the preparation of the Council's initial post-war housing programme commanded much time, particularly the selection of sites and the work involved in their pilotage over the numerous obstacles incidental to approval and in drawing up detailed arrangements necessary for the first year's building schemes.

By the end of the period under review much of the preliminary spadework had been accomplished and it is to be hoped the subsequent years will see the Council's schemes brought to fruition.

Rat Destruction.

5. During the year an arrangement was agreed with Bromsgrove U.D.C., for the loan of their rat catcher to deal with infestations arising within the Droitwich Rural District. Under this scheme the services of an experienced operator is available for occupiers and owners of property and a nominal charge to the owner or occupier of 3/6d per hour is made to recover the cost of the labour and materials involved. A total of 10 infestations occurring on private property was dealt with in this way.
- Maintenance treatment of the Council's refuse tips which was formerly carried out by the County War Agricultural Executive Committee under contract was taken over by the Council during the year. The tips were kept under close observation and checked by periodical test-baiting. Initial and maintenance treatment of the sewerage systems was also undertaken.
- Opportunity has been taken during the course of the housing survey to record rat infestations and as many as possible have been treated, but the labour available has been insufficient to deal with all of them.

The results of the initial treatment of the sewers shown in the following table are considered satisfactory, especially in the case of the Fernhill Heath system. The outfall works were affected by an adjoining infestation on private land.

Co-operation with the County Council in preventing the pollution of streams was maintained during the year and three cases were dealt with.

7. HOUSING.

Housing Survey

In common with all rural districts throughout the country and in order to implement the recommendations of the Hobhouse Report on Rural Housing a systematic survey of all houses in the district below a rateable value of £26 was commenced on 22nd April 1945. Standardised forms and a common policy was agreed on a county basis before the survey commenced. Briefly the object of the survey is to ascertain the state of repair of the houses in rural districts and the houses upon inspection are fitted in these categories :-

Category 1 - houses fit in all respects ;

" 2 - houses requiring minor repairs;

" 3 - houses requiring structural alterations ;

" 4 - unfit houses beyond repair at a reasonable cost.

The results of the initial inspection of the survey shown in the following table are considered satisfactory, especially in the case of the personal health survey. The initial survey was conducted by an experienced investigator on private duty.

HOUSING

Housing Survey

In common with all other districts throughout the country and in order to implement the recommendations of the Housing Survey on the Housing Survey, a systematic survey of all houses in the district below a certain value of rate was conducted on 22nd April 1913. Standardized forms and a common policy were issued to all surveyors before the survey commenced. The object of the survey is to ascertain the state of repair of the houses in each district and the houses open for occupation are listed in these categories:-

- Category 1 - houses fit for all purposes
- 2 - houses requiring minor repairs
- 3 - houses requiring structural alterations
- 4 - unfit houses beyond repair at a reasonable cost

Special note is made of overcrowded houses and houses suitable for re-conditioning with the aid of a grant under the former Housing (Rural Workers) Acts.

When the survey is complete it will reveal the number of new houses necessary to replace those beyond repair and the amount of repair required to bring other houses to a satisfactory condition.

In addition a complete record of the accommodation, amenities and state of repair of all working class property in the rural district will be available for the first time. It is intended to make a special report on the completion of the survey early in 1947, but a record of the houses inspected during the period under review is shown here:

8. New Houses.

By the end of the year a contract had been signed for the erection of 19 three-bedroomed houses and one four bedroomed house at Station Lane, Fernhill Heath and 6 three-bedroomed houses at Crowle.

Work was almost due to start at the end of the period under review.

Seven houses built under licence by private persons had been completed and occupied by the end of the year.

Special note is made of overcrowded houses and houses suitable for re-conditioning with the aid of a grant under the former Housing (Rural Workers) Act.

When the survey is complete it will reveal the number of new houses necessary to replace those beyond repair and the amount of repair required to bring other houses to a satisfactory condition.

In addition a complete record of the accommodation, amenities and state of repair of all working class property in the rural district will be available for the first time. It is intended to make a special report on the completion of the survey early in 1937, but a record of the houses inspected during the period under review is given here.

New Houses.

By the end of the year a contract had been signed for the erection of 19 three-bedroomed houses and one four bedroomed house at Station Lane, Epsall Heath and a three-bedroomed house at Gwols.

Work was almost due to start at the end of the period under review.

Seven houses built under licence of private persons had been completed and occupied by the end of the year.

9. The total number of plans dealt with during the year amounted to 49. Of these 47 were approved and 2 rejected, both for planning reasons. 16 plans related to domestic and 33 to non-domestic buildings.
10. There were 8 sites for temporary dwellings licenced allowing a permitted number of 410 dwellings. Probably due to petrol rationing they were sparsely occupied during the year and none of the dwellings are suitable for permanent occupation.
11. The licenced camping grounds, mainly situated near the River Severn were fully occupied during the holiday periods and were inspected for contraventions of byelaws. A number of such contraventions were observed and remedied by negotiation.

12. Civil Building Licences.

In August 1945 local authorities became the agents of the Minister of Works for the partial control of civil building and appointed officers were empowered to issue licences for housing repairs and certain non-housing work.

By 31st December the following licences had been issued :—

Housing - 50 licences for work costing - £7,091. 12s. 5d.

Non-housing - 54 " " " " " " - £2,346. 4s. 6d.

13. Water Supplies.

The parish of North Claines and parts of St. Martin County, Warndon and Hindlip are supplied by water purchased by the Council in bulk from the County Borough of Worcester and distributed through the Council's mains.

The number of properties so served is 481. A booster plant is employed to supply the village of Fernhill Heath and this continued to function efficiently during the year.

14. The parishes of Dodderhill, Upton Warren and part of the parish of Hadzor are supplied from the mains of the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company, as they lie within the statutory limits of the Company's area of supply. The number of properties so served is 280.

9. The total number of plans dealt with during the year amounted to 10. Of these 17 were approved and 3 rejected both for planning reasons. 15 plans related to domestic and 2 to non-domestic buildings.

10. There were 3 sites for temporary dwellings licensed allowing a permitted number of 110 dwellings. Probably due to petrol rationing they were generally occupied during the year and none of the dwellings are suitable for permanent occupation. The licensed camping grounds, mainly situated near the River Severn were fully occupied during the holiday periods and were inspected for conventions of bylaws. A number of such conventions were observed and remedied by negotiation.

Civil Building Licences.

11. In August 1952 local authorities became the agents of the Minister of Works for the partial control of civil building and appointed officers were empowered to issue licences for housing repairs and certain non-housing work. By 31st December the following licences had been issued:

Water Supplies.

12. The parish of North Evesham and parts of St. Martin's County, Warrington and Hindlip are supplied by water purchased by the Council in bulk from the County Borough of Worcester and distributed through the Council's mains. The number of properties so served is 18. A booster plant is employed to supply the village of Evesham and this continued to function efficiently during the year. The parishes of Evesham, Upper Wotton and parts of the parish of Evesham are supplied from the mains of the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company, as they lie within the statutory limits of the Company's area of supply. The number of properties so served is 280.

15. Sixty properties within the parish of Hartlebury are served with piped water from a borehole in private ownership.

This supply again proved to be adequate during the year.

A small number of properties in the Summerfield area of the Hartlebury parish are served from the Kidderminster mains.

16. During the year negotiations were opened by the Council to acquire water mains put down to serve military establishments but the negotiations had not been concluded by the end of the period under review.

17. General maintenance and routine inspections of the Council's Works and mains was carried out during the year and a total of 17 new connections were made to the mains.

18. Apart from those parishes mentioned above, the remainder of the rural district derives its water supply mainly from shallow wells. West of the Doverdale fault and in an area amounting to approximately one third of the district these are sunk into the Keuper sandstone and generally the supply has been adequate.

East of the Doverdale fault the wells are sunk into the overlying marl and at the extreme south east of the district into the lias.

In these areas the supply is capricious both in quantity and quality but no serious difficulty arose during the year.

Sampling of private supplies was continued and the results are shown in the Medical Officer's report.

19. Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

A considerable amount of time was given up during the year to sifting information to assist the Council's consulting engineer in preparing outline schemes for sewerage the village areas.

The results of this work is shown in the consulting engineer's preliminary report which has been submitted to the Council.

12. Since properties within the parish of Haverhill are served with piped water from a borehole in private ownership, this supply again proved to be adequate during the year.
13. A small number of properties in the Haverhill area of the Haverhill parish are served from the Haverhill mains. During the year negotiations were opened by the Council to acquire water mains in order to serve military establishments but the negotiations had not been concluded by the end of the period under review.
14. General maintenance and routine inspection of the Council's works and mains was carried out during the year and a total of 17 new connections were made to the mains.
15. Apart from the properties mentioned above, the remainder of the parish district derives its water supply mainly from shallow wells. Most of the boreholes failed and in some instances so approximately one third of the district these are sunk into the Knapton reservoir and generally the supply has been adequate.
16. Most of the boreholes failed the wells are sunk into the overlying main and at the extreme south end of the district into the main.
17. In some cases the supply is capricious both in quantity and quality but no serious difficulty arose during the year.
18. Supply of private supplies was continued and the results are shown in the Haverhill District's report.
19. Haverhill and Borehole District.
A considerable amount of time was given up during the year to obtaining information to assist the Council's consulting engineer in preparing outline schemes for serving the village area.
20. The results of this work is shown in the consulting engineer's preliminary report which has been submitted to the Council.

20. Sewerage systems exist in the parishes of North Claines, Ombersley, Hartlebury and Dodderhill, but treatment is undertaken only in the case of North Claines where a modern sewage disposal plant was laid down in 1938. Satisfactory effluents were obtained during the year. The Ombersley system constructed in 1900 is in excellent condition, but provision for proper treatment is an urgent necessity. The Hartlebury system is a piecemeal affair and a comprehensive scheme is long overdue. The latter remarks apply in the parishes of Dodderhill and Crowle.
21. Cleansing and general maintenance was undertaken at the many small sewage installations existing in the district. The one situated at Waresley was a constant source of trouble and extensive reconstruction is necessary before a satisfactory effluent can be expected.

24. 7 licences to slaughter animals for food were renewed by the Council.

Inspections of catering houses was carried out and in one case the place was in such a bad condition and the owner so un-co-operative that it was necessary to take out a summons under the Food and Drugs Acts. A fine of £20 was imposed by the County Court and the place was closed pending complete reconstruction.

20. Sewerage system existing in the parishes of North Orlanney, Caberlay, Ballybally and Boddanhill, but treatment is undertaken only in the case of North Orlanney where a modern sewage disposal plant was laid down in 1938. Ballybally effluents were retained during the year. The Caberlay system constructed in 1900 is in excellent condition, but provision for proper treatment is an urgent necessity. The Ballybally system is a piecemeal affair and a comprehensive scheme is long overdue. The latter remarks apply to the parishes of Boddanhill and Croyle.

21. Cleansing and general maintenance was undertaken at the many small sewage installations existing in the district. The one situated at Ballybally was a constant source of trouble and extensive reconstruction is necessary before a satisfactory effluent can be expected.

22. The four licensed slaughterhouses in the rural district were not in use during the year. Meat consumed in the district was drawn from the certified Ministry of Food Abattoirs at Worcester and Kidderminster where systematic meat inspection is carried out by the officers of those authorities.

23. The carcasses of two pigs which were slaughtered for emergency reasons were examined and passed as fit for human consumption. 24. 7 licences to slaughter animals for food were renewed by the Council.

25. An inspection of the bakeries of the district showed that these places were kept in good condition and that periodic licensing was carried out.

Inspections of catering houses was carried out and in one case the place was in such a bad condition and the owner so un-co-operative that it was necessary to take out a summons under the Food and Drugs Act. A fine of £20 was imposed by the County Court and the place was closed pending complete reconstruction.

In another case sanitary accommodation was provided by the occupier.

32. A case of filling milk bottles in the street was detected and the case proved in the court.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

33. Collection of household refuse is carried out by the Council in the whole of the district. Collection is made by the Council employees using hired vehicles. In order to improve the collection the lorries employed were replaced by tipping vehicles during the year so that the time lag at the tips could be reduced. By the end of the period under review the collection periods were 3 weeks in the village areas and 6 weeks in outside areas.
34. Disposal of refuse is by tipping. Most of the tips are open to use by private individuals and are far from satisfactory. This is especially the case at Battleton Green where indiscriminate tipping made the tip an eyesore. The Withy Furlong tip was sealed during the year.
