TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HOUSING AND GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Statistical Report on the health of the Rural District for the year ended 31st December, 1957.

Examination of the Data available in Sections A & F does not show any startling changes, but one or two points are of interest. The standardized Birth and Death Rates are within normal limits, and the Infant Mortality Rate quite low as there were only two deaths under the age of one year. The usual outbreaks of Measles and Whooping Cough occurred during the winter months, but there were no deaths. It is hoped that the new combined Diphtheria and Whooping Cough Vaccine which is being used more extensively throughout the County will eventually eliminate Whooping Cough as Diphtheria has already been eliminated in past years.

There were ten cases of Poliomyelitis during the year and one death from this cause. Seven occurred in the parish of Claines and were admitted to Newtown Isolation Hospital during the summer months. All recovered satisfactorily. The remaining cases occurred in the parish of Bradley Green after a child had contracted the disease following Tonsillectomy. Fortunately supplies of Poliomyelitis Vaccine were made available for children under 15 years during 1957. Although only a few cases were immunised with British Vaccine that year, the majority of cases on the waiting list accepted Salk Vaccine as soon as it became available and the vaccination programme is now well under way. This vaccine has been such a success that the Ministry of Health have now extended the scheme to include adults under the age of 25 years, and it is anticipated that the number of notifications of the disease will be considerably less this year.

Asian Influenza was fairly prevalent during the Winter of 1957-1958, but cases were very mild and few complications were encountered. A specially prepared Vaccine was tried out on Doctors and Nurses with what appeared to be some success, and it is hoped that this

will be more readily available in future outbreaks. Nine new cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were notified during the year and the number of cases on the Register has increased slightly. One can only stress the importance of an early visit to the family doctor in all cases of doubt, as, with the introduction of modern methods of treatment, the disease is no longer to be feared.

Worcestershire County Council decided to close the Infant Welfare Centre held at Cutnall Green on 31st December, 1957 and replaced it by one held twice-monthly at Wychbold. This embraces Cutnall Green on the one side, and Stoke Works on the other, and so far attendances have improved considerably. Patients are transported by Ambulance Car from the outlying districts.

Despite certain difficulties at the beginning of the Year good progress was subsequently made with the Dodderhill Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme. By the end of the year the construction of the new Sewage Disposal Works was virtually complete and some difficult Main laying along the main trunk road had been dealt with. This Scheme was most essential and has fortunately been completed soon enough to allow additional Council and Private development to take place.

It is also encouraging to be able to report that the Council persued a bold Housing Policy despite high interest rates and the rising cost of materials. This has largely been possible due to the introduction of a differential rent scheme. Some 60 new council houses were under construction during the year, 38 of which were in Ombersley. It has therefore been possible to proceed with the Slum Clearance programme in this parish and to a lesser extent elsewhere (see page 12). By the end of the year some 68 houses had been dealt with.

Some difficulty has been encountered in ensuring the demolition of property after the service of notices, and the only remedy seems to be for the Council to carry out the work in default. Quite a number of the properties dealt with are still occupied due to the lack of one or two-bedroomed houses and old peoples bungalows to offer the tenants. Blocks of flats with communal facilities have been considered and would be most suitable. With a steadily ageing population they will never be left empty.

May I take this opportunity of thanking the Surveyor and his Staff for their valuable assistance during the Year. I also wish to express my appreciation, Mr. Chairman of the kind consideration shown to me by all the members of your Committee.

SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

(a) Ambulance Service

This service is provided by the County Council. Ambulance stations which serve the Droitwich Rural District are situated at Worcester, Kidderminster, Bromsgrove and Redditch. The list below shows the parishes covered by each ambulance station for non-emergency cases. Patients suffering from infectious diseases are conveyed to hospital in special ambulances which are stationed at the isolation hospitals. The hospital car service, manned in most cases by volunteers is used to supplement the Ambulance Service.

(b) Hospitals

The district is served by general hospitals situated in Worcester, Bromsgrove, Kidderminster and Birmingham.

The isolation hospital, which serves the area is situated at Newtown, Worcester.

Maternity hospitals which serve the district are situated at Stourport, Bromsgrove and Worcester.

Sanatoria for the treatment of cases of Tuberculosis are situated at Malvern, Knightwick and Worcester.

(c) Home Nursing and Health Visiting

This service is provided by the County Council, and in most instances in the Rural District this work is done by the District Nurse/Midwife, who is also the Health Visitor. The following nurses are working in the Rural District:-

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

1. Water Supply

(a) Regrouping of Undertakings

Discussions continued in Worcestershire following the issue Ministry Circular 52/56 and the Council took an active part in most of them. It seems apparent that schemes for regrouping will be formulated very soon. These discussions have had one unfortunate result, namely that the Southern Parishes Scheme has been held in abeyance awaiting the outcome of regrouping proposals.

(b) New Schemes

In other ways however, progress has been made in extending piped water supplies in the district. The most notable extension being the one to Salwarpe which is an extension of 42 miles to the Fernhill Heath mains. Another extension was that to the Police Headquarters at Hindlip.

Altogether 101 houses were covered by these extensions.

(c) Projected Schemes

At the close of the year the following projected schemes were receiving consideration: -

- Westwood extension to serve a number of agricultural properties.
- Himbleton 2.
- Ombersley extension to serve Oldfield, Holt Fleet and Uphampton.

(d) Maintenance

The new arrangements for maintenance of the Council's undertaking set up last year have worked very smoothly, and special attention has been given to waste detection.

In the Council's area of supply there are now:-

5 pumping stations - 10 pumps

5 reservoirs capacity 40400 gollons

16 bulk supply motors

205 consumer meters 1303 domestic supplies

(2) Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

Dodderhill

After a series of setbacks progress was made on this the last necessary major scheme in the Rural District. At the end of the year the majority of the sewers had been laid and a start made on the sewage disposal works.

Tibberton and Hanbury

Little progress was made with these schemes the main trouble being that little information is available to the Council on the amount of development which will be allowed in these areas by the County Planning Committee.

Maintenance

The maintenance arrangements set up last year have worked well, but additional labour will be required when the Dodderhill works are completed. It is also desirable that some mechancial method of desludging should be adopted.

(3) Refuse Collection and Disposal.

Demands have increased considerably since the last complete review of the service by the Council in 1951 and the collection schedules are maintained only by regular overtime working.

The service covers the whole of the district, a weekly collection being given in the compact village areas, fortnightly in some other centres of development, and monthly elsewhere. The number of loads collected during the year amounted to 1905.

The Westwood tip will provide a place for disposal of refuse for many years ahead. The first stage of afforestation was carried out by the planting of Japanese Larch and Sycamore in alternate rows, the planting being based on advice of the Forestry Officer of the County Council. The 'take' has been excellent.

Cesspool Emptying

A new 1100 gallon S.D. vehicle was purchased and commenced operations in November to replace the seven year old Karrier. Details of the work carried out in addition to night soil collection in the Parish of North Claimes were:-

Routine inspection of Food Premises was carried out by the Public Health Inspectors during the year. Generally speaking conditions were found to be fairly satisfactory, but there was a need for education in hygienic practices. A short series of four lectures on Food Hygiene were accordingly arranged, and held in the Council Offices in February, but attendances were poor. The Classes of Food Premises visited included Butchers, Shops, Cafes, Hotels, Public Houses and Bakehouses.

Milk

Milk Production is the responsibility of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. The County Council also control the licencing of Pasteurising Plants of which there are three in the District. Samples taken are made known to this Authority whose Officials are called in on occasions for consultation. A reprimand was issued to the owner of one of the plants whoalso distributes milk within the District, due to faulty capping of broken bottles, and complaints of dirty bottles on delivery Samples taken of the milk were satisfactory however and the County Public Health Inspector did not recommend any further action. Ice-cream

Forty two premises are registered for the sale of Ice-cream under Section 16 of the Foodand Drugs Act 1955. There are no large scale producers and all premises sell the pre-packed product only.

Meat Inspection

There is only one licenced slaughterhouse within the District. These premises are at Ombersley where 100% meat inspection was carried out. Improvements have recently been made to the retail premises and additional refrigeration space provided adjacent to the slaughterhouse.

A meeting was held at Worcester of all the Local Authorities in Worcestershire likely to require facilities at the Worcester City Abbattoir. The Government White Paper on "Slaughterhouses" was discussed from which it was evident that a much higher standard would be required once Regulations were made. It was decided however that if these standards could be provided, then it was better to retain slaughtering facilities in the District. Further discussions are likely once the Slaughterhouses Bill becomes law.
