TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HOUSING AND GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Genelemen,

I have the hone to present my Annual Statistical Report on the health of the Rural District for the year ended 31st December, 1950.

Consideration of the Vital Statistics shown under Sections A & r leads one to the conclusion that the health of the population remains good. The death rate remains quite low, the birth rate fairly high and infant deaths comparatively few. With the exception of Measles there were remarkably few cases of Infectious disease notified. There were only ten cases of Whooping Cough and no cases of Diptheria, Food Poisoning or Poliomyelitis. This does seem to indicate the success of the Immunisation and Vaccination campaigns. Certainly I have spent very much more of my time on this work than previously and this would appear to be paying dividends. Perhaps it will soon be possible to provide adequate protection against Measles; meanwhile the General Practitioners exercise constativity of the appropriate use of antibiotics are able to reduce complications to a minimum. Deaths are rare, but this does not mean that efforts should not be made to avoid spread to pre-school childress the disease can be fatal in young children.

The year has been one of change with such topics as the review of Local Government boundaries (Local Government Act 1958) under consideration, and the formation of Joint Water Boards responsible for consultations with other Authorities. It would appear that the statutory duties with regard to Water Supply are likely to be handed over to the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company.

Territorial demands have been made by the City of Worcester who wish to extend their boundary but it is too early to make predictions. The disbandment by the Ministry of Agriculture of their Rodent Control Service also gave rise to concern, but it has been possible for the Council to operate a scheme for the benefit of the farmers with few changes in the present organisation.

The Council may claim to have had a record year for Housing with the completion of cixty-two dwellings most of which were starte before the high interest rates unde building so expensive. Good progress has been made with Slum Clearance although quite a number of the properties have not yet been demolished. The closure of the Hutted Camp, Elmby Lovett was a step forward, and a small Clearance Area in Wychbold has opened the way for some old peoples bungalows. Flatlet Schemes are also being considered at Ombersley and Fernhill Heath. Priority should be given to these schemes.

Once again may I thank the Surveyor and Public Health Inspectors for their co-operation without which this report could not be completed. I also wish to express my appreciation of the considerati you, Mr. Chairman have shown to me during the year.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH

SERVICES FOR THE KREA

(a) Ambulance Service

This service is provided by the County Council.

Patients suffering from infectious diseases are conveyed to hospitals in special ambulances which are stationed at the isolation hospitals. The hospital car service, manned in most cases by volunteers is used to supplement the Ambulance Service.

(b) Hospithls

The district is served by general hospitals situated in Worcester, Bromsgrove, Kidderminster and Birmingham.

The isolation hospital, which serves the area is situated at Newtown Worcester.

Maternity hospitals which serve the district are situated at Stourport, Bromsgrove and Worcester.

Sanatoria for the treatment of cases of Tuberculosis are situated at Malvern, Knightwick and Worcester.

(e) Vaccination and Immunisation

Vaccination against smallpox and immunisation against diptheria and whooping cough is carried out free of charge at any of the County Council's Clinics or by the patient's own doctor.

(f) Public Health Laboratory Service

The Public Health Laboratory Service situated at Worcester Royal Infirmary is under the general direction of Lieut. Col. R. J. Henderson. Specimens for any type of bacteriological or virological examination are accepted. Samples of Water and Sewage are however normally submitted to the County Analyst for chemical examination as well.

(g) Care of the Aged

The Supervision of aged persons living alone in need is the responsibility of the County Welfare Officer who is able to provide Residential Accommodation. On occasions it is necessary for the Council to use their special powers under Sect 47 of the National Assistance Act 1948, to ensure admission. This was not necessary during 1958.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

1. Water Supply

Careful consideration was given to the various possibilities which had arisen as the result of the Circular issued by the Ministry on the Regrouping of Water Undertakings. It was eventually decided that it would not be in the interests of the Rural District to participate in the formation of a joint Board as proposed by Worcester City but that the Southern area of the District would be best served by the transfer of the area of supply to the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company. This had the advantage that there would be one water authority for the whole of the Rural District, together with the Borough of Droitwich who were already within the Company's statutory area of supply. There was an 8" Main available in Droitwich which could be extended to afford a supply to those parishes already supplied from Worcester City, and in addition any "Overspill" accommodation which might be provided on the fringe of the town could be catered for.

Under the terms of the proposal transfer the following provisions were made. That the Company would:-

- Provide a water supply for the parishes of North Claines, Hindlip, Martin Hussingtree, and Salwarpe in due course.
- 2. Implement a scheme to supply the Southern parishes of Crowle, Himbleton, Huddington, Oddingley and Tibberton.
- 3. Lay mains to supply the parish of Hadzor subject to the usual revenue guarantee.
- Carry out the proposed scheme for extension of mains in the parish of Ombersley to serve Oldfield, Holt Fleet and Uphampton.
- 5. Take over the whole of the Council's mains and works including those in the parishes of Hartlebury and Ombersley.

At the end of the year negotiations had virtually reached a successful conclusion but there was some doubt as to whether the Minister would approve the transfer of Hartlebury parish or North Claines. Hartlebury lies in the catchment area of the proposed North West Worcestershire Joint Water Board.

The Water supplied by the Company is drawn from boreholes situated at the Washingstocks Catshill, Burcot, and Brockhill. Chemical analysis of a sample is submitted overleaf.

(2) Severage and Parent Meters

The major work in progress during 1958 was the completion of the Dodderhill Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme. A fairly comprehensive layout of sewers in Wychbold and Rashwood has catered for most of the existing development in the parish, and made provision for additional Council house and Private buildings in the future. The Sewerage Disposal Works is of the most up to date design incorporating twin detritus channels, a pair of Dortmund Sedimentation Tanks, two percolating filters, and settlement in small Humus tanks before discharge of the final effluen into the brook. There are adequate Sludge Drying facilities and provisions for the treatment of Storm Water,

No further progress has been made with a scheme for Hanbury due to the reluctance of the County Planning Committee to allow further housing developments in this part of the Green Belt. The sch for the village of Tibberton is now in the hands of the Consulting Engineer.

4. Refuse Collection and Disposal

A Scheme to provide for an overall improvement in the Refuse Collection Service was approved in November 1958, and is now being brought into operation. A weekly collection service has always been operated in the larger villages but this should incorporate some of the smaller villages and provide a fortnightly service to the more outlying parts of the District. With four vehicles in service it should be possible to reduce the amount of overtime worked but additional demands are always being made. A scheme for the provision and clearance of litter bins from suitable points is also being put into operation. Controlled Tipping of all the refuse collected from the whole District is carried out at Westwood Coppice which will provide adequate space for a number of years when all the trees are felled.

5. Rodent Control

Following the receipt of information from the Divisional Office of the Ministry of Agriculture concerning the termination of their Rodent Control Service it was decided that the Council must provide facilities for the farmers as and when their Contracts expired. There was a duty under the "Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949" to inspected Agricultural premises and arrange for the treatment of any infestations found. It was considered that not a great deal of extra work would be involved in running a Contract Service, but that the Rodent Operator would be fully employed and additional supervision would be necessary by the Public Health Inspectors. Details of the work carried out by the Rodent Operator is shown opposite.

4. Housing Needs of the District

Consideration has been given to future building proposals in relation to the total housing needs of the District. As good progress has been made in the last two years with houses at Wychbold and Ombersley it has been decided that sites should be sought at Hartlebury and Fernhill Heath, for the future. Immediate attention is however being given to the provision of old peoples bungalows or flats at Ombersley, Wychbold and Fernhill Heath. A House Purchase Scheme has been approved and buildings of sixteen houses for sale will commence as soon as possible on an approved site at Ombersley. The Table shown opposite indicates the position of Housing Applicants at October 1958, when the last review took place.

Inspection and Supervision of Food

Food Premises.

Routine inspection of Food Premises was carried out by the Public Health Inspectors during the year. Generally speaking conditions were found to be fairly satisfactory, but there was a need for education in hygienic practises. A number of leaflets and posters on Food Hygiene were therefore distributed during the year.

Milk

Milk Production is the responsibility of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. The County Council also control the licencing of Pasteurising Plants of which there are three in the District. Samples taken are made known to this Authority whose Officials are called in on occasions for consultation.

Ice-cream

Thirty-nine premises are registered for the sale of Ice-cream under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act 1956. There are no large scale producers and all premises sell the prepacked product only.

Meat Inspection

There is only one licens d slaughter house within the District. These premises are at Ombersley where 100% meat inspection was carried out. It revenuents have recently been made to the retail premises and additional refrigeration space provided adjacent to the slaughterhouse. The meat Inspectors experience little difficulty in carrying out their duties effectively. The amount of Meat inspected is shown in the Table opposite.
