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



TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the health of the Rural District for the year ended 31st December, 1959.

The Vital Statistics set out under Section A show some variations from the figures for England and Wales. There were rather more deaths than usual and this also applies to the Infant Mortality and Stillbirth Rates which are raised, although here numbers are so small that they are not of great significance. Of the adult deaths, the majority were due to vascular, cardiac or circulatory changes in elderly people. Influenza was only responsible for four deaths and Tuberculosis for one. Once again there were no deaths due to Acute Infectious diseases; in fact with the exceptior of measles very few cases were notified.

Vaccination against Poliomyelitis proceeded steadily and the number of children dealt with have been fairly satisfactory. The response from adults between 25-40 Years has however been disappointing. Further details are published in the Annual Report of the County Medical Officer who is responsible for these arrangements. I have for the first time included full details of the Diptheria immunisation state of the child population (F.7). This shows that the Immunity Index is 45% which is far too low, (over 60% being essential to guard against an outbreak of the disease). It will be observed that many children were immunised more than 5 years ago, and are not included in the calculations. For this reason I strongly recommend a booster at 10 Years old in addition to the usual doses in infancy and at 5 Years.

Protection against Smallpox is far more satisfactory approximately 84% of children under 1 year having been vaccinated.

Dudley Miniature Mass Radiography Unit visited the District at the end of July (see P.21) No active cases of the disease were discovered although a number of other conditions were referred to the Chest Clinic. The response to the Unit's visit was not good but s there was only one new case of Pulmonary Tuberculouis notified by Medical Practitioners during the Year, one can only assume that there is little to detect.

The Council's water undertaking has now been handed over to the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company. An assurance was given that steady progress would be made with the Southern Parishes Scheme and it is fairly certain that other improvements will be made within the next two or three years.

Apart from a small Sewerage scheme in the Summerfield area, no major projects were carried out in this field during the year.

There was no Council house building, but numerous plans have been considered for Old People's accommodation and for houses for sale in the near future, twelve houses are also to be erected at Cutnell tesen. In the meantime steady progress has been made with the Sinh Clearance programme, which may be said to be two-thirds complete. More houses will have to be constructed however before completion is possible, as there are at present quite a number of tenants whom it has not been possible to move.

With the establishment of this Committee concerned solely with Fublic H<sub>e</sub>alth I hope there will be more time devoted to health matters. At the same time I would like to thank the Chairman of the Housing (and General Purposes) Committee for the consideration he has shown me in the past and in fact all members of the Council for their courtesy.

#### SECTION B.

#### GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH

#### SERVICES FOR THE AREA

#### (a) Ambulance Service

This service is provided by the County Council. Ambulance stations which serve the Droitwich Rural District are situated at Worcester, Kidderminster, Bromsgrove and Redditch. The list below shows the parishes covered by each ambulance station for nonemergency cases. In all cases of emergency the ambulance should be summoned in the usual way that is, by asking the telephone operator for "Ambulance" or by dialling "999".

Patients suffering from infectious diseases are conveyed to hospitals in special ambulances which are stationed at the isolation hospitals. The hospital car service, manned in most cases by volunteers is used to supplement the Ambulance Service.

## (b) Hospitals

The district is served by general hospitals situated in Worcester, Bromsgrove, Kidderminster and Birmingham.

The isolation hospital, which serves the area is situated at Newtown Worcester.

Maternity hospitals which serve the district are situated at Stourport, Bromsgrove and Worcester.

Sanatoria for the treatment of cases of Tuberculosis are situated at Malvern, Knightwick and Worcester.

#### (c) Home Nursing and Health Visiting.

This service is provided by the County Council, and in most instances in the Rural District this work is done by the District Nurse/Midwife, who is also the Health Visitor. The following nurses are working in the Rural District.

# (f) Public Health Laboratory Service

The Public Health Laboratory Service situated at Worcester Royal Infirmary is under the general direction of Lieut. Col. R J. Henderson Specimens for any type of bacteriological or virological examination are accepted. Samples of Water and Sewage are however normally submitted to the County Analyst for chemical examination as well.

# (g) Care of the Aged

The Supervision of aged persons living alone, in need, is the responsibility of the County Welfare Officer who is able to provide Residential Accommodation. On occasions it is necessary for the Council to use their special powers under Section 47 of the National Assistance Act 1948, to ensure admission. This was not necessary during 1959. Sanitary Circumstances of the Area

#### 1. Water Supply

Negotiations with the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company continued during the year, and were brought to a successful conclusion with the signing of the East Worcestershire (Droitwich Rural) Order 1960. This resulted in the transfer of all the water undertakings of Droitwich Rural District Council to the Company with the exception of the parish of Hartlebury, which is to be included in the proposed North West Worcestershire Joint Water Board's area.

Future proposals by the Company include the construction of a 150,000 gallon reservoir and a 100ft. water tower on Yew Tree Hill, Newland, Droitwich as part of the long term scheme for supplying the Southern Parishes and North Claines. There was a shortage of Water in Himbleton and Earls Common during the summer and assurances were given that a start would be made on the Southern Parishes Scheme early in 1960. A bulk-supply is at present afforded by the Corporation of Worcester to the parishes of North Claines, Hindlip, Martin Hussingtree and Salwarpe. The Company has taken over this area, but intends to lay mains and provide their own supply to these parishes by 1961.

The Council obtained approval from the Ministry of Housing and Local Government to provide an extension of the water mains from Ombersley to serve Holt Fleet, Oldfield, Sinton Lane and Suddington. This work is being carried out by the Council, but the extension to Uphampton is to be carried out later by the Company as it involves the construction of a pumping station.

The water supplied by the East Worcestershire Waterworks Company is drawn from four boreholes close to the Lickey Hills near Bromsgrove. Bacteriological samples are taken weekly and the results for 16th November, 1959 are submitted below:-

Bacteriologically the above samples are satisfactory.

#### 2. Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

The Council entered into an agreement with Kidderminster Rural District for the provision of a joint sewerage scheme for the Summerfield area which lies on the fringe of the parish of Hartlebury. Over 1,000 yds. of sewers were laid along Stanklyn Lane, Summerfield Lane and Kidderminster Road, a pumping station being constructed to discharge sewage to the Kidderminster Disposal Works. A scheme has also been prepared by the Consulting Engineer for the sewerage of mother part of Hartlebury parish, by means of an Ejector station in Moors Avenue discharging sewage into existing sewers of Inn Lane from the Station Road area, and the Kidderminster Road near the Talbot Inn. This scheme is awaiting Ministerial approval.

The village of Tibberton has been waiting for a Sewage Disposal scheme for sometime. Originally it was proposed to connect private houses to the existing sewage disposal plant provided for the Council houses, but the Consulting Engineer has now been asked to prepare a new scheme.

The Hanbury Sewerage and Sewage Disposel scheme is held up while a new site is found for the Disposal works farther away from the road. No agreement has yet been reached with regard to building in this village which may be released from the "Green Belt" restrictions.

Fortunately some progress is being made with the laying of sewers in Uphampton and Oldfield. It has been agreed that the sewer should be extended to provide for the Mouiterers Arms Caravan Site. These sewers will drain towards the Ombersley Disposal Works.

# 4. Refuse Collection and Disposal

A scheme to provide for an overall improvement in the Refuse Collection Service was approved in November 1958, and is now being brought into operation. A weekly collection service has always been operated in the larger villages but this should incorporate some of the smaller villages and provide a fortnightly service to the more outlying parts of the District. With four vehicles in service it should be possible to reduce the amount of overtime worked but additional demands are cloways being made. A scheme for the provision and clearance of litter bins from suitable points is also being put into operation. Controlled tipping of refuse collected from the whole District is carried out at Westwood Coppice which will provided adeprete space for a number of years when all the trees are felled. Another small tip is being used temporarily at Hadley.

#### 5. Rodent Control

Esturns are now submitted to the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food for a complete Calendar Year whereas previously they were required on 31st March. The report shown over the page is therefore for a pariod of 9 months only, the period from January to March, 1069 already having been published. Now that this Council is responsible for all Agricultural premises the figures for inspection and treatment have been practically doubled (in this column) whereas for dwelling bouses and business premises they remain much the same.

Slum Clearance

The Council's Slum Clearance programme has virtually been completed in the following parishes:-Crowle, Dodderhill (except Causeway Meadows) Doverdale, Elmbridge, Elmley Lovett, Hampton Lovett, Hindlip, Huddington, Martin Hussingtree, Oddingley, Ombersley, Stock and Bradley, Tibberton, Upton Warren and Warndon.

Work remains to be done in the Parishes of Hanbury, Hartlebury Himbleton, North Claines and Salwarpe.

It was estimated in 1956 that 197 houses were classified as unfit, of which 126 needed to be replaced. The following table shows that substantial progress has been made towards this end. It is obvious that a number of scattered dwellings will have become substandard since that date, and further proposals will have to be submitted to the Minister on completion of the present programme.

The only difficulty encountered is the reluctance of owners to demolish empty properties and this is eventually being done in default by the Surveyor.


