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



TO THE CHAIRMAN 'ND MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the health of the Rural District for the year ended 31st. December, 1960.

There have been few changes, and most of the Vital Statistics show little variation from those for England and Wales. There were very few notifiable cases of infectious disease with the exception of Sonne Dysentery (15) most of which occurred in the parish of Ombersley. Also in this Parish there occurred forty-seven cases of Infective Hepatitis in the 15 months from November 59 - to February 61. Although at first sight this outbreak appeared to be centred around the two Primary schools in the area, in fact only 26 cases (55%) occurred in this age group and a considerable amount of infection must have taken place in the home. There is reason to believe that the virus is spread by faulty toilet habits in a similar manner to dysentery and for that reason alone I would recommend that wherever possible houses should be connected to the sewer. Thirty of the forty-seven houses visited were not so connected, although a number had septic tanks. Strangely enough no cases were reported among Caravan dwellers, despite a poor standard of hygiene on many of the sites.

The Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act 1960, which came into force on the 1st ugust, immediately involved the Public Health Inspetors in a considerable amount of work. A survey was carried out the results of which are published on page 14 of the Report. I have also added Table 4, which has been compiled from information supplied to me by the County Public Health Inspector. This shows that Droitwich Rural District has a very high percentage of permament residential caravans and almost as many caravans as any other district in Worcestershire.

Holiday Caravans are important for they can easily spoil the countryside, unless adequately controlled, but residential caravans require more careful consideration for as homes they vitally affect the lives of the occupants.

The Survey revealed the following points which should not be lost lost sight of -

(1) Well over half (312) of the vans were in the parish of Ombersley.
 (2) There were a considerable number of unauthorised sites and caravans (150) with unsatisfactory site conditions.

(3) There were far too many isolated dwellings (100) with unsatisfactory site conditions.

Planning consents or refusals have now been issued in the majority of cases, but I am fairly certain the position has not materially altered. Refusals must be enforced and discussions must take place with Site owners concerning the standards which are to be applied to their sites if they have been given approval. This must involve a system of regular inspection and reporting to Committee. I also feel that a large number of important questions remain unanswered, viz - (1) Where are the Caravans going from sites which have been issued with refusal notices?

(2) Should the Policy of the Council be to restrict the number of residential caravans (particularly in the Parish of Ombersley)?

(3) Should houses be built for Caravan dwellers? or

(4) Should the Council establish their own Caravan site?

These problems must be solved for directly, or indirectly, they affect the health of a considerable number of the inhabitants of the district. Also the excellent progress already made must not be lost due to a failure to keep the situation under review.

May I congratulate the Public Health Inspectors on the way they tackled this Survey. I fully appreciate the difficult problems which now face them.

SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH

SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

(a) Ambulance Service

This service is provided by the County Council. Ambulance stations which serve the Droitwich Rural District are situated at Worcester, Kidderminster, Bromsgrove and Redditch. The list below shows the parishes covered by each ambulance station for non-emergency cases. In all cases of emergency the ambulance should be summoned in the usual way that is, by asking the telephone operator for "Ambulance" or by dialling "999".

Patients suffering from infectious diseases are conveyed to hospitals in special ambulances which are stationed at the isolation hospitals. The hospital car service, manned in most cases by volunteers is used to supplement the `mbulance Service.

(b) Hospitals.

The district is served by general hospitals situated in Worcester, Bromsgrove, Kidderminster, and Birmingham.

The isolation hospital, which serves the area is situated at Newtown, Worcester.

Maternity hospitals which serve the district are situated at Stourport, Bromsgrove and Worcester.

Sanatoria for the treatment of cases of Tuberculosis are situated at Malvern, Knightwick and Worcester.

(c) Home Nursing & Health Visiting.

This service is provided by the County Council, and in most instances in the Rural District this work is done by the District Nurse/Midwife, who is also the Health Visitor. The following nurses are working in the Rural District.

(f) Public Health Laboratory Service.

The Public Health Laboratory Service situated at Worcester Royal Infirmary is under the general direction of Lieut.Col.R.J.Henderson. Specimens for any type of bacteriological or virological examination are accepted. Samples of Water and sewage are however normally submitted to the County Analyst for chemical examination as well.

(g) Care of the Aged.

The Supervision of aged persons living along, in need, is the responsibility of the County Welfare Officer who is able to provide Residential Accomodation. On occasions it is necessary for the Council to use their special powers under Section 47 of the National Assistance Act 1948, to ensure admission. This was not necessary during 1960.

Sanitary Circumstances of the rea.

1. Water Supply.

The East Worcestershire (Droitwich Rural) Water Order 1960, The East Wordestershire (Droltwich Rural) water Order 1960, came into operation on lst.April. This transferred the water undertaking to the East Wordestershire Waterworks Co., with the exception of the parish of Hartlebury which is to be included in the proposed North West Wordestershire Joint Water Board's area. The Company's Chief Engineer has supplied me with the following report on the progress of the Southern Parishes Scheme. The construction of the new Water Tower at Yew Tree Hill, Droitwich, is almost completed. The water tower, which is constructed of re-inforced concrete is approximately 100 ft. high and will have a capicity of 150,000 gallons. This constitutes about one days supply for the anticipated demand in the Southern Parishes and North Claines areas which are the particular zones to be connected to the tower supply.

The water will be pumped by means of duplicate electrically driven submersible pumps from the adjacent Yew Tree Hill Reservoir into the tower. The rate of pumping will be automatically controlled by float units located in the tower. The top water level is 351 O.D., and the depth of water when full is 15 ft.

The water supplied by the East Worcestershire Waterworks Co., is drawn from four bore holes close to the Lickey Hills. Bacteriological Samples are taken weekly and the results for 21st. November, 1960 are submitted below -

Bacteriologically the above samples are satisfactory. 2. Sewerage & Sewage Disposal.

Little progress was made in this field during 1960.

A small scheme for the extension of sewers to the villages of Uphampton and Oldfield in the parish of Ombersley was completed.

The provision of a scheme for Station Road and Moors Avenue in the parish of Hartlebury is hold up while negotiations take place with Kidderminster Rural District concerning the reception of Sewage.

A scheme has been prepared for the village of Tibberton, but it is held up while consideration is being given to suitable access to the new site for the works.

The site for the proposed Hanbury Sewage Works has also had to be re-sited due to difficulties from flooding and this has been delayed due to the necessity to divert a Public footpath. A Ministerial Enquiry has just been held on this scheme and the outcome is awaited, but the issue is clouded by the doubt as to whether Hanbury Parish will be released from Green Belt restrictions or not. Whether new development is to be allowed there or not, it is essential that the drainage problems in the central village area be remedied.

(4) Refuse Collection and Disposal.

There has been some improvement in this service during the last twelve months. A weekly collection service is operated in the larger villages and a fortnightly service in the more outlying parts of the district. A central Refuse Tiplat Westwood Coppice is still used for the disposal of most of the refuse, but a smaller one has also been used at Hadley.

Consideration was given to the possibility of changing over to the Paper Sack system of refuse collection, but it was decided that it would not be an economic proposition.

(5) Rodent Control.

One Rodent Operator is employed full time on this work. A report on his work during the year ended 31st. December, 1960, follows -

Slum Clearance.

The Council's Slum Clearance programme has virtually been

completed in the following parishes:-Crowle, Dodderhill (except Causeway Meadows) Doverdale, Elmbridge, Elmley Lovett, Hampton Lovett, Hindlip, Huddington, Martin Hussingtree, Oddingley, Ombersley, Stock and Bradley, Tibberton, Upton Warren and Warndon.

Work remains to be done in the parishes of Hanbury, Hartlebury, Himbleton, North Claines and Salwarpe.

It was estimated in 1956 that 197 houses were classified as unfit, of which 126 needed to be replaced. The following table shows that substantial progress has been made towards this end. It is obvious that a number of scattered dwellings will have become substandard since that date, and further proposals will have to be submitted to the Minister on completion of the present programme.

The only difficulty encountered is the reluctance of owners to demolish empty properties and this is eventually being done in default by the Surveyor.
