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



J. H. WILKINSON, Medical Officer of Health

FOR THE

COUNTY BOROUGH OF DUDLEY.

To the Chairman and Members of the Sanitary Committee of the Dudley Town Council.

Gentlemen,

I beg to submit to you my Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1897.

The total number of Deaths registered during the year has been 895. 470 were males, 425 were females.

The Death Rate per thousand deducting 38 not belonging to Dudley Parish is 17.87 if calculated on the estimated population in 1897 (47,955); calculated from the Census Return of 1891 it is 18.73.

The Births registered during the year have been 1,735. Males numbered 879, females 856.

The Births exceed the Deaths by 840. The Birth Rate per thousand of the estimated population is 36.01; calculated from the last Census Return the Birth Rate is 37.93.

The number of Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases has been 113 as compared with 170 last year, giving a Zymotic Death Rate of 2.3 per thousand of the estimated population, a rate which compares very favourably with that of surrounding districts or larger towns. The diminished number of Zymotic Deaths this year is chiefly in Enteric Fever, Scarlatina, and Measles; only two fatal cases of Measles have occurred, as compared with 43 in 1896, while the Deaths from Enteric Fever and Scarlatina have been 8 and 12 respectively; last year the numbers were 15 and 22. The mortality from Diphtheria and Croup is almost exactly the same as in the previous year. There has been an increase in the number of fatal cases of Diarrhea, 54 Deaths being attributed to this cause, the number last year was 36; 48 of the 54 Deaths from Diarrhœa this year were under 5 years of age, and the mortality was greatest in Netherton and St. Thomas's Wards. Only I Death has been certified as due to Puerperal Fever, in the previous year there were 5 Deaths from this disease.

In the Non-Zymotic class a notable feature is the increased number of Deaths from Phthisis, there being 51 Deaths from this cause, last year the number was 33; there does not appear to be much difference in mortality from this disease in the different Wards, if we consider the population of each. The number of Deaths from Bronchitis is 123, last year it was 189, the much smaller number of deaths from this cause is probably to be attributed to the mild autumn and winter. There has been a marked increase in the number of Premature Births for the year, 44 Deaths being attributed to Prematurity, in 1896 the number was 28.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

During the last three months of the year I have carefully inspected many of the Factories and Workshops and have found the general sanitary condition to be good, several of the newer factories are admirable in construction, the greatest care having been taken to prevent injurious effects to the workers.

BAKEHOUSES.

I have visited the whole of the Bakehouses in the Borough, and with three exceptions, found them to be in a sanitary state; in the three unsatisfactory ones the water supply is bad in one case, and there are closets within a yard of the Bakehouse in the other cases; notices have been served to remedy these defects.

DAIRIES AND MILKSHOPS.

These appear to be in fair sanitary condition.

CANAL BOATS.

The number of Boats inspected during the year was 152, all these were found complying with the Acts.

The total number is considerably less than last year, and there have been some complaints of the work not being done, but a better system of working and management has now been arranged, and it is hoped there will not be any further ground for dissatisfaction.

During the year 158 Houses have been newly connected to the Main Sewers, 108 additional Houses have been supplied with South Staffordshire Water, and notices have been deposited with the Public Works Committee for the erection of 74 new Houses.

GENERAL SANITARY CONDITION.

The most pressing sanitary requirement at the present time is the need of better Housing accommodation for the poorest class of inhabitants, people who are unable to pay a weekly rental greater than 1/6 to 2/6 or 3/-, and who at present occupy the wretched tenements in narrow courts and alleys which are deficient in light and air, with unpaved yards, defective drainage, and dilapidated sanitary conveniences; this class is not a very numerous one comparatively speaking, but it is impossible to erect new houses at such low rentals. I believe that if one or two blocks of Industrial Dwellings which could be let in tenements of two or three rooms, were built in the poorest quarters of the town under the supervision of the Sanitary Committee, and some of the worst courts and dwellinghouses by a gradual process demolished, a much needed sanitary reform would be effected; one such block might be erected as an experiment, upon land belonging to the Corporation; such undertakings in other towns have been a success financially; the sanitary conditions in such dwellings can be easily controlled.

Increased housing accommodation is also needed for working people who are able to pay a weekly rental of 3/6 to 4/6.

There are at present a considerable number of houses in Courts and "back" houses which are tenantless and falling to decay, apparently abandoned by owners and tenants; where possible these should be pulled down to make room for new houses, or to give free access to wind and sunlight, great improvement in this respect has been recently effected in Vicar Street by the removal of some old property; one or two of the worst courts are at present being dealt with by the Sanitary Committee, but the matter is one of considerable difficulty.

The present condition of the Privies and Ashpits in some parts of the Borough is unsatisfactory, owing to a bad state of repair, which allows of filth percolating and polluting surrounding earth; it is to be regretted that property owners do not give more consideration to their responsibilities in this direction as such a condition of polluted ground is not unattended with danger.
