To the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Dukinfield.

Mr. Mayor, Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Report on the health of the Borough for the year 1943.

An outbreak of Diphtheria occurred in October and 16 cases were removed to Hospital during the three months ended December, 1943.

The Diphtheria immunisation campaign was continued. The percentage of child population immunised at the end of 1943 was:-

 $75\frac{1}{2}$  % of the children between the ages of 5 and 15 years  $61\frac{1}{2}$  % of children under 5 years of age.

Comparing the statistics for Measles and Whooping Cough with those for the previous year it is apparent that there was a great increase in the number of cases, but I am happy to report that these were of a very mild type, there being only two deaths from Whooping Cough.

For the various statistics I would refer you to the appropriate sections of the report.

#### FOR THE YEAR 1943

During the year 746 complaints were received at the Public Health Office which were investigated and dealt with.

One workmen is now employed in the Department and his work consists of releasing blockages to W.C.'s, drains, gullies, disinfection of rooms after infectious disease, disinfestation of verminous houses, sale of disinfectants and the cleansing of Public Conveniences in the town.

#### Farms

There are 14 Farms in the Borough which have been inspected at intervals during the year. One farm produces Tuberculin Tested Milk. Four farms produce Accredited Milk.

### Meat Inspection

There is one Ministry of Food Slaughterhouse in the Borough where cattle, sheep and calves are killed. At one other Slaughterhouse pigs are killed, the proprietor acting as a slaughtering contractor.

The system of Joint Meat Inspection which was inaugurated in October of last year in conjunction with the Boroughs of Ashton-under-Lyne and Stalybridge still continues to be worked in a very satisfactory manner.
