To His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Dunstable.

Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report for 1963.

According to the Registrar General's figures the population increased by 720 over 1962. This is almost the same figure as for the preceding year (740) so it is apparent that the population of the Borough is gradually becoming stabilised.

Except for measles, which was very prevalent, there were no outbreaks of any infectious diseases during the year.

Circulatory and malignant diseases are still the commonest cause of death. There were nine deaths from lung cancer compared with eleven in 1962.

I wish to acknowledge the help that has always been given to me by the Town Clerk and the Public Health Inspectors.

#### BIRTH RATE

The number of births is largely determined by the number of women of child-bearing age resident in the area, thus the birth rate cannot be compared with another area unless it is of a similar sex and age structure or until some allowance is made in the calculation. This is the function of the comparability factor, this being supplied to all areas by the Registrar General.

The birth rate for 1963 was 18.9 after multiplying by the comparability factor of 0.86. The crude rate for the year under review was 23.9.

The total number of live births was 652.

#### STILL BIRTHS

The number of still births was 10 and the still birth rate 0.36 per 1,000 population. The corresponding rate for 1,000 total live and still births was 15.2

#### DEATH RATE

The uncorrected death rate was 8.8 as compared with 8.1 for the previous year. To make allowances for age and sex constitution the Registrar-General has allowed correction of this figure by the comparability figure of 1.42 by which a corrected death rate of 12.5 obtained.

#### MATERNAL MORTALITY

No deaths occurred in 1963.

#### INFANT MORTALITY

The total number of infant deaths was 9 of which 6 were male and 3 female giving an infant mortality rate of 13.8 per 1,000 live births over the year. Three infant deaths were due to prematurity, 2 to congenital malformations, 1 to heart disease, 1 to intestinal obstruction, 1 to broncho-pneumonia and 1 to asphyxia.

The number of neo-natal deaths, or those occurring under one month was 5 corresponding to a rate of 7.6 per 1,000 live births.

# NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948 - SECTION 47

# Persons in need of care and attention

This section provides for the necessary care and attention of persons who:

- (a) are suffering from grave chronic disease or, being aged and infirm or physically incapacitated, are living in insanitary conditions; and
- (b) are unable to devote to themselves, and are not receiving from other persons, proper care and attention.

It was not necessary to take steps for cumpulsory removal to hospital of any persons during the year.
