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



Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for 1969.

The report is a favourable one—the population of the District has continued to increase, (12% over the past decade) and while the Birth Rate has fallen slightly so has the Death Rate and both approximate to the similar rates for Durham County and to those for England and Wales as a whole. The Infant Mortality Rate is low, corresponding to that for Durham County and while the Peri-natal Mortality Rate has risen somewhat, perusal of the table showing these rates over recent years indicates this to be of no significance.

There was little occurrence of notifiable infectious disease and no serious occurrence. The gratifying fall in numbers of new cases of tuberculosis notified which has been a feature of recent years, continued in the year under review.

The report contains a good record of voluntary work undertaken for the elderly people and it refers also to the Council's very considerable efforts in providing special housing with Warden Service and other facilities.

I am most grateful to Mr. A. R. Moorhouse, Chief Public Health Inspector and Cleansing Superintendent (whose report is incorporated in this) and the members of the Health Department for their continued efforts and application during the year and I am pleased to have this opportunity again of thanking you, Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen for your support and the Officers of the Council for their co-operation.

Section A—NATURAL AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS AND VITAL STATISTICS.

(1) Natural and Social Conditions.

Area. 34,057 acres. The District is composed of eighteen parishes surrounding for the most part the City of Durham and the Urban District of Brandon and Byshottles. It borders also with Lanchester, Chester-le-Street, Easington and Sedgefield Rural Districts and the Urban Districts of Hetton, Spennymoor and Crook and Willington.

Industries. Coal Mining, Agriculture and Light Industries.

Population. The Registrar General's estimate of the mid-year population is 39,360, an increase of 670 over 1968.

The figure for 1969 represents an increase of 12.0% since 1959, which is 4,730 persons.

These figures are a means of adjusting the rates for births and deaths, so that the population of the District is directly comparable with the population of England and Wales as a whole, in so far as distribution by age and sex is concerned. The adjusted rates are those to be compared with the rates for England and Wales and with the similarly adjusted rates for other areas.

During the year 669 births were registered, 29 less than the previous year. 34 were illegitimate.

The birth-rate (adjusted) of 15.9 is less than that for 1968 (16.9).

The birth-rate for Durham County as a whole is 15.5, and the rate for England and Wales 16.3.

Table I shows the figures for births over the past 10 years in comparison with those for England and Wales and County Durham over the same period.

Deaths.

397 deaths were registered during the year, 238 males and 159 females. The number in 1968 was 432. The death rate (adjusted) of 12.0 is less than that of the previous year (13.3).

The rate for County Durham is 12.1, and the rate for England and Wales 11.9 (Table I).

Individual causes of death are shown in Table II.

Diseases of the Heart and Circulation accounted for 147 of the deaths registered or 37% of all deaths registered. In 1968 the figure was 41%.

Cancer accounted for 65 of the deaths which represents 16.3% of all deaths. In 1968 the figure was 20.8%. The deaths from Cancer in all forms is 1.6 per 1,000 population.

There were 16 deaths from Lung Cancer (23 in 1968) which represents a rate of 0.4 per 1,000 of the population.

1 death was registered from Pulmonary Tuberculosis. Two deaths were registered from Pulmonary Tuberculosis in 1968.

The rate for Durham County is 16.23 and for England and Wales it is 18.0 The rate for this district is 16.4.

11 children died before reaching the age of one year, 7 of whom were less than one week old.

There was one death of an illegitimate child under the age of one year during 1969.

These numbers should be read in conjunction with the rates given in Table I and should be borne in mind in assessing the change in the rate over the years.

Too great significance should not be attached to a single rate owing to the comparatively small numbers of deaths each year.

Neo-Natal Mortality (deaths occurring in the first four weeks of life).

There were 8 deaths of children under one month which represents a rate of 11.9 per 1,000 live births. In 1968 there were 5 deaths giving a rate of 7.2. The rate for Durham County is 10.8 and the rate for England and Wales 12.0.

Early Neo-Natal Mortality (deaths occurring during the first week of life).

There were 7 deaths of children under one week old. This gives a rate of 10.4 per 1,000 live births.

Perinatal Mortality.

(Stillbirths and children who died in the first week of life).

During 1969 there were 13 stillbirths and 7 deaths of children under 1 week old. This gives a rate of 29.3 per 1,000 live and still births. The rate for 1968 was 21.2.

The perinatal mortality rate—the combined still births and deaths in the first week of life per 1,000 live and still births is shown in the following table covering a period of 10 years and also the rates for England and Wales and Durham County:—

(e) Domestic Help.

Domestic Help is provided for households where it is required owing to the presence of any person who is ill, an expectant mother, lying-in, mentally defective, aged or a child not over school age.

During the year 188 home helps were employed, attending 308 cases, at the beginning of the year 141 new cases were added during the course of the year and 104 cases were terminated. At the end of the year there were 345 cases being attended.

6. National Assistance Acts, 1948 and 1951.

No statutory action was taken during the year involving Section 47 relating to removal of persons in need of urgent care and attention.

7. Domiciliary Laundry Service for Old People.

This service which was commenced during 1957, has the aim of helping elderly infirm and ill persons in the area. It is provided by the British Red Cross Society, the Hospital Authority and the Local Health Authority (Durham County Council) acting in conjunction.

There were 20 households being served at the beginning of the year and 26 at the year end.

8. Meals for Old People.

In December, 1969, a Luncheon Club was formed at Mill House Court, Belmont. The cost of each meal to the recipient being 1/-d. and the remaining operating and capital cost being shared between Durham Rural District Council and Durham County Council respectively.

Details of the meals schemes (Meals-on-Wheels and Luncheon Clubs) operating in the various parishes of the District are shown in the Table.

It is a tribute to the work of the Volunteers concerned that all the schemes operate so well.

9. Chiropody.

1. Water Supply.

The District is supplied by the Durham County Water Board. The supply has been satisfactory both in quality and quantity during the year.

Mr. D. G. Drummond, Chief Engineer of the Durham County Water Board, has kindly supplied the following information relating to the water supply.

The consumption of water in the Board's area again showed a substantial increase. The unmetered consumption amounts to 31.16 gallons per head per day (29.96 in 1968) and the metered consumption 16.00 (14.95 in 1968), a total of 47.25 gallons a day for each of the consumers in the area of supply (44.91 in the previous year).

There were tested, 2,468 bacteriological samples, of which 519 were distribution samples (i.e. samples taken from mains or from service pipes to properties).

Closet Accommodation.

There are 57 ash closets/Elsons in the District, the majority of which are in houses scheduled for clearance and demolition or houses in outlying parts of the District with no sewage facilities.

No conversions to water carriage system were carried out during the year making a post-war total of 526. At the end of the year there were 13,255 domestic premises out of a total of 13,312 on the water carriage system which represents approximately 99.5%

Collection and Disposal of Refuse.

The reorganisation of the Cleansing Section of the Health Department continues, the fourth 35 cu. yd. Pakamatic Compression Vehicle was brought into service.

A weekly collection of refuse is still carried out, disposal being by controlled tipping.

A new tip has been opened at Sherburn Hill and the gradual run-down of the tips at Kelloe and Pity Me has commenced with the aim of centralising tipping at Sherburn Hill.

A new Weatherall tip vehicle is expected to be delivered early in the year to assist in controlling the tips.

Work is expected to be completed on the extensions to the Cleansing Depot at Sherburn in the late Summer of 1970, when complete centralisation of the Cleansing Service will be affected and the last outlying garage at Coxhoe will be closed.

Trade Refuse, etc.

Trade refuse collected from Factories and Shops, etc., on a rechargeable basis has increased as has also the amount of old furniture and bulky refuse removed free of charge from households.

Municipal Dust Bin Scheme.

The Municipal Dust Bin Scheme continues to proceed satisfactorily—although difficulties have been experienced in delivery of bins.

Joint Refuse Disposal.

Talks between officials responsible for Refuse Collection and Disposal in this and neighbouring Authorities have taken place to discuss the possibility of a joint scheme for refuse disposal with the aid of mechanical plant.

These discussions are the preface to elected representatives meeting in future to discuss the problem.

5. Salvage.

The collection and sale of salvaged goods was continued during the year, and below are given the details of the various materials sold, bonus to workmen and balance to Council.

The amount of salvaged material collected both waste paper and other materials (scrap, rags etc.) has gradually increased, and when the extensions to the depot are completed it is anticipated that the amount of waste paper salvaged will increase considerably.

Two maintenance treatments were carried out at the Council's Sewers and Sewage Works during the year.

264 premises were found to be infested with rats and 75 with mice. Many visits were made in the course of the successful treatment of these premises.

12 contracts were entered into, with owners or occupiers of agricultural holdings, to carry out a minimum of two treatments per year at a fixed price.

Treatments were carried out in respect of sewers infested by rats.

Section D.—Housing.

During the year 64 houses were built by the Council. (As shown in the Table).

278 houses were built by private owners.

15 houses were made fit as a result of informal action under the Public Health and Housing Acts.

8 demolition orders were made during the year making a postwar total of 880; 6 Closing Orders were made.

12 houses subject to demolition orders, were demolished. 5 houses subject to a Closing Order were closed.

Overcrowding.

There was one case of overcrowding revealed during 1969.

13 families (47 persons) were rehoused from houses subject to demolition order, and 6 families (19 persons) from houses subject to Closing Order.

Included in the Council's scheme for rehousing is the provision for priority to be given to families in which there is a case of pulmonary tuberculosis and the Medical Officer of Health represents that rehousing would be beneficial. There is a residential qualification of one year.

The scheme, without doubt, is a most beneficial provision in this disease where the relationship with housing conditions is considered to be close.

Alterations to Houses.

(a) A scheme is in operation whereby alterations may be effected to any house in which there lives a disabled person, alterations which will enable that person more easily to overcome the disability.

Examples are, the extra provision of handrails to staircases, ramps in place of steps in houses where there is a wheelchair, bath seats, fixed handrails beside baths and waterclosets, widening of gateways, lowering of kitchen fixtures.

This Council and the County Council each contribute 50% of the cost of carrying out the works of adaptation. During 1969 the Surveyor to the Council, carried out on this basis alterations to 8 Council houses.

(b) Under the Acts the Council is empowered to make Grants to owners who wish to improve their property.

HOUSING—COMPREHENSIVE SCHEMES

There were 17 licensed slaughtermen registered in the District and 6 Slaughterhouses.

Section F.—PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES

Scarlet Fever.

14 notifications were received during the year compared with 27 in 1968. There were no deaths from the disease.

Acute Poliomyelitis.

As in the nine previous years no cases of poliomyelitis were notified in the District.

During the year vaccination against poliomyelitis was continued by general practitioners in their surgeries under their own arrangements and in Maternity and Child Welfare Centres.

In the Durham Rural District all children vaccinated against poliomyelitis had oral vaccine.

Measles.

64 cases were notified during 1969 in the area compared with 157 in the previous year. There were no deaths.

Dysentery.

There were 7 cases of Dysentery in 1969 in the Area, compared with 5 cases notified in 1968.

Acute Meningitis.

There was 1 case of acute meningitis notified during 1969.

Diphtheria.

For the fifteenth consecutive year there were no notifications of diphtheria.

The County Medical Officer arranges that propaganda leaflets drawing attention to the need for children to be protected against smallpox, whooping cough and diphtheria are sent to parents by post when their children attain the age of three months. Further propaganda regarding immunisation against diphtheria is despatched when children are one year old and again at four years, nine months.

The tables of diphtheria immunisation show that records were received of 387 children under the age of 5 years having received a full course of primary immunisation during the year, compared with 360 during 1968. 61 children between the ages of 5 and 15 years received booster injections during the year.

Food Poisoning.

There were no cases of food poisoning notified during the year.

Whooping Cough.

11 cases of whooping cough were notified during the year, 29 in 1968. One notification was in respect of a child aged from 1 to 2 years. There were no deaths from whooping cough.

Immunisation against the disease may be obtained from general medical practitioners and local health authority clinics.

It may be in the form of a combined injection against diphtheria and tetanus also.

Infective Jaundice.

There were 27 cases of Infective Jaundice notified under the Public Health (Infectious Diseases) Regulations 1968, the distribution in the various parishes being:—
