

Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for 1970

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1970.

East Dereham Urban District occupies approximately the geographic centre of Norfolk and consists of 5,313 acres. The main industries are clock making, furniture making and engineering.

There were 140 live births of which 10 were illegitimate. This is 7% of the total births.

The birth rate of 17.6 is above that of England and Wales.

There were 115 deaths giving a natural increase (births-deaths) of 25, hence 5 new residents took up their abode in Dereham. There were 2 infant deaths.

The death rate of 11.0 is lower than that for England and Wales (11.7). Thirteen deaths occurred below the age of 55. 45.2% of deaths occurred in persons over 75 years of age.

AND THE S. LETT

Of the total of 1.5 deaths, 102 deaths (88.7%) occurred over the age of 55 years. In the 55-64 years age group, there were 18 deaths (15.7%); ages 65-74 years there were 32 deaths (27.8%) and in the over 75 years age group there were 52 deaths (45.2%)

Malignant Disease:

Cancer caused 13 deaths (11.3% of all deaths). Of these 13 deaths, there were 4 from lung cancer i.e. 30.8% of the cancer deaths were due to lung cancer. This type of cancer caused 3.5% of all deaths in Dereham.

Coronary Heart Disease:

There were 21 deaths due to this disease, one in the 45-54 age group, 7 in the 55-64 age group, 5 in the 65-74 age group and 8 in the over 75 age group. Hence 18.3% of all deaths were due to coronary heart disease. This is a decrease on 1969.

IMMUNISATION SCHEMES:

Immunisation against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, poliomyelitis, measles, German measles and tuberculosis, and vaccination against smallpox are offered by the County Council as the responsible Health authority.

In October 1968 the immunisation schedule was changed. Primary immunisation with the Triple Antigen (whooping cough, diphtheria and Tetanus) and oral poliomyelitis vaccine is commenced on the third or fourth month of life, the second dose is given two months later, and the third dose given six months later. This scheme gives adequate protection so that the "booster" dose of antigen 13 months after the primary course is no longer necessary.

The reinforcing dose of diphtheria/tetanus antigen given at 5 years of age boosts the level of immunity. School leavers in the penultimate term are given a further reinforcing dose of tetanus toxoid. In the present state of our knowledge, it cannot be too strongly emphasised that the level of immunity by reinforcing doses of tetanus toxoid be maintained.

Council House Developments

Jubilee Avenue

18 - one bedroom Old Person Bungalows were completed in April, 1970.

Littlefields Development

The first stage of the Littlefields development comprising 25 - 3 bedroom, 5 person houses and 4 - 2 bedroom 3 person bungalows was completed and the second stage for the construction of 27 houses and 28 bungalows commenced in August 1970.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

SEWAGE DISPOSAL:

The construction of temporary sludge lagoons to increase storage capacity and a dry summer helped to keep the old treatment works operational during its final winter. Stage I of the new works is expected to be completed early in 1971.

Night soil continues to be collected from a dwindling number of substandard and outlying properties.

PUBLIC CLEANSING:

The Council experimented during the year, in three areas of the town, with paper and polythene dustbin liners to establish the relative merits of both as an alternative to the present skep collection. The method was accepted with enthusiasm by the collectors and house holders and in the interest of improving the general standards of hygiene in their district, the Council have decided to adopt polythene sack refuse collection throughout the area in 1971.

The streets and footpaths are mechanically scavenged and a high standard of cleanliness is maintained.

CLEAN AIR:

New plant is being installed in a factory to prevent smoke emission.

CAMPING AND CARAVAN SITES:

Six individual caravans are licensed to stand in private gardens and there is a residential site for six caravans.

MILK SUPPLY:

The standard of service remains high and gave no cause for concern.

ICE CREAM ETC:

Sampling revealed the sale of a high-grade commodity through retail outlets.

FOOD HYGIENE AND GENERAL:

Public awareness of good hygienic practice has undoubtedly had an important influence on raising the standards. Occasional lapses have been remedied informally.

MEAT INSPECTION:

The standard of meat sold over the counter and hygiene of premises are continually under review.

AGRICULTURAL WORK:

Gang labour did not operate in the district during the year.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES:

Four new premises were registered, making a total of one hundred in the district. Thirty establishments were inspected during the year and no major contraventions were noted.

PEST CONTROL:

A constant campaign was conducted against rats and mice, commencing with a systematic area survey and treatment during the winter months and progressive follow up treatment as required. Sewers continued to be ratfree.

HOUSING AND SLUM CLEARANCE:

The Council accepted an undertaking not to relet one unfit property and three others were closed. All tenants were given Council houses.
