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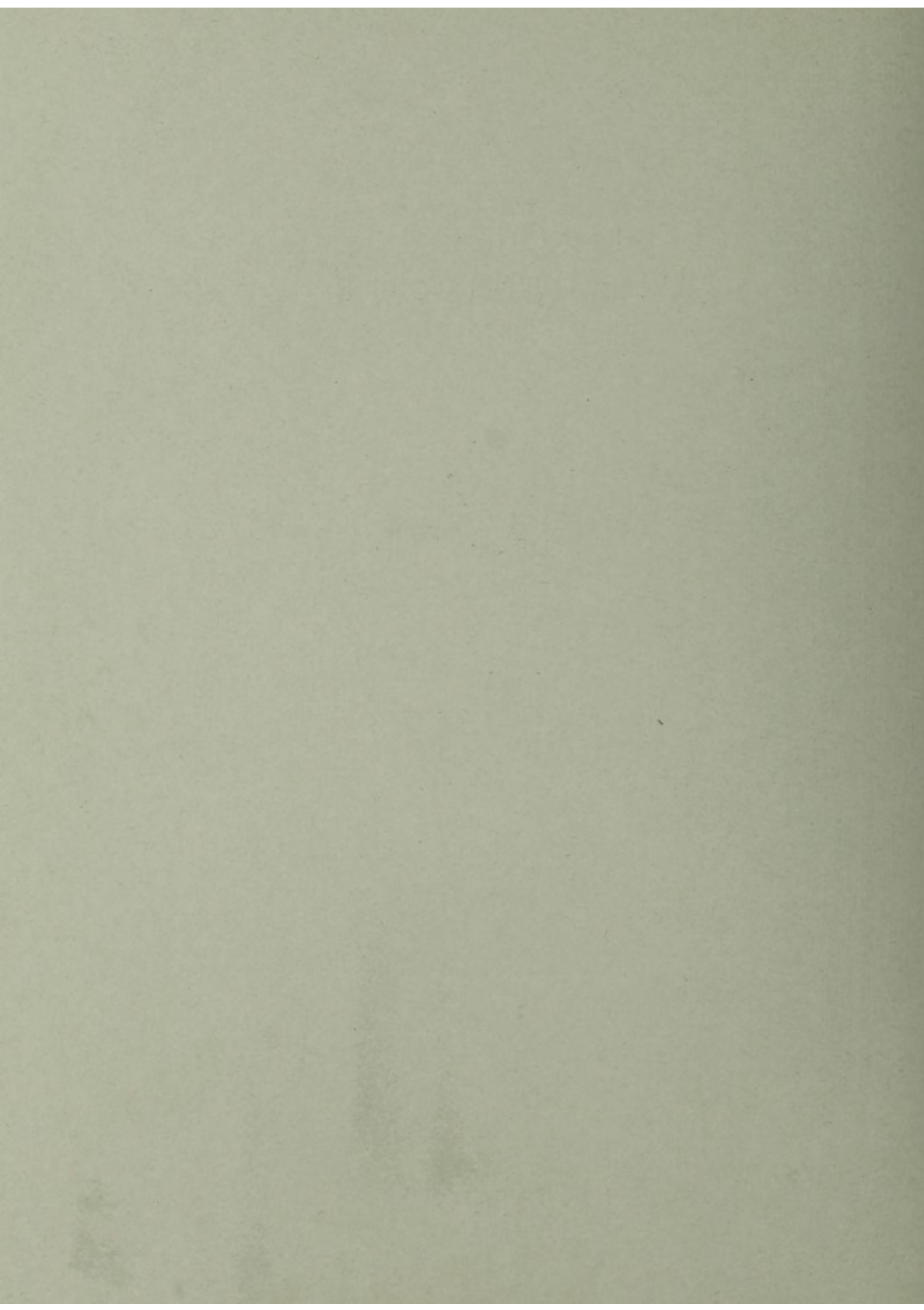

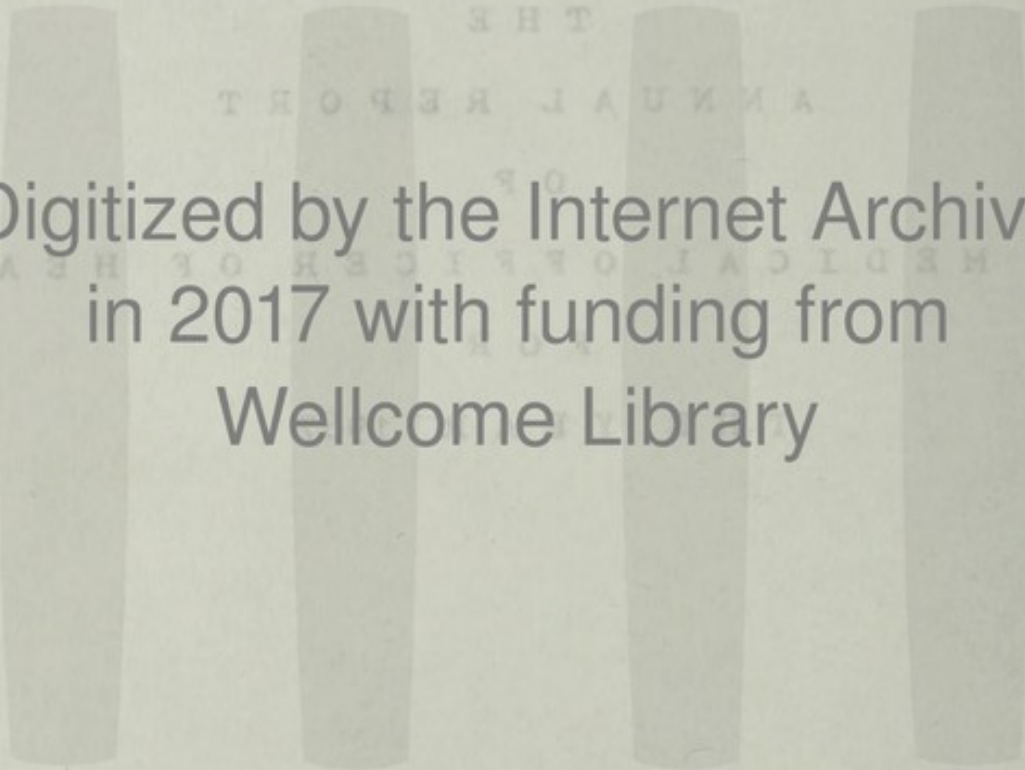
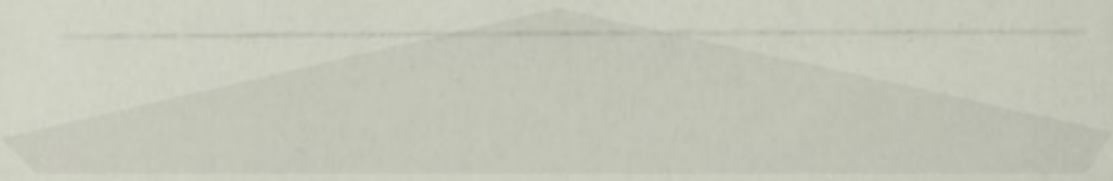

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE
YEAR 1967

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE EAST GRINSTEAD URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report for the year 1967.

The Report is prepared as indicated in the Ministry of Health Circular No. 1/1968 dated January 1968.

The Crude Death Rate is 12.27 as compared with 11.51 for 1966.

The Standardised Death Rate is 12.3 compared with 11.2 for England and Wales. The Standardised Death Rate is obtained by the application of a 'comparability factor' making allowance for the age and sex distribution of the district for comparison with England and Wales as a whole.

The Infantile Mortality Rate is 9.93 compared with 6.8 for the previous year.

The Birth Rate is 17.06 compared with 17.21 in 1966.

The Standardised Birth Rate is 17.7 compared with 17.2 for England and Wales.

There were no deaths from Scarlet Fever, Typhoid Fever, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough or Measles.

There were no deaths amongst children under two years of age from Enteritis and none from maternal causes.

For the twenty first year no case of Diphtheria was notified.

Six cases of Food Poisoning were notified during the year.

COUNCIL HOUSING

The following information is given by Mrs O. Wren, Housing Manager.

The Sunnyside Estate comprising 62 units of accommodation was completed and let during the year. The Council's new venture into industrialised building has provided an attractive estate of houses and flats, to Parker Morris standard, with Halcyon warm air central heating and a garage for each unit of accommodation. Tenants on this estate are required to have a garage if they own a motor vehicle.

Council owned accommodation now totals 1010 houses and flats, 5 shops and 304 garages and a further 24 flats and 34 garages will be completed and ready for letting next year. There are 5 houses not in use, pending demolition.

REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE

The Council's direct labour force is responsible for all maintenance of Council properties and the following work was carried out:

A decision has been made to terminate the internal decorating scheme which has run so smoothly and successfully since 1956. The scheme will be gradually wound up and, in future, tenants will be entirely responsible for this part of maintenance. To assist the retired and those physically incapable, a scheme has been offered to tenants which provides for internal decoration by direct labour, the cost of which can be paid over a reasonable period.

THE COUNCIL'S WAITING LIST

At the end of the year, 236 applicants remained on the list who required 131 one/two unit flats, 65 two-bedroomed and 40 three/four bedroomed accommodation.

During the year, lettings totalled 212 and of these 19 families were rehoused from unfit properties.

The number of Council tenants awaiting transfer to other types of accommodation totalled 163 and during the year 97 transfers were effected.

WELFARE

During the year, the meetings of the County Co-Ordinating Committee continued but only 8 cases needed assistance. It is apparent that the major proportion of problem families have received the kind of help which has enabled them to become more self-supporting.

The Voluntary Laundry organised by Mrs G. Taylor under the auspices of the Co-Ordinating Committee for the Welfare of the Aged, carried out household washing for 25 homes where elderly people were without the assistance of any friends or relatives. There are now 32 voluntary helpers in the Laundry, 7 drivers who collect and deliver the laundry and help is given by members of the Rotary Club on a rota system.

At Christmas, over 450 homes were provided with extra comforts including coal, groceries, sweets, tobacco, clothing etc. through the local Rotary, Soroptomist and Youth Clubs and Women's Royal Voluntary Service.

The Co-Ordinating Committee for the Welfare of the Aged, under the Chairmanship of Mrs Beryl Brown, had an active year. It was decided to create two main Sub-Committees for (a) Policy and (b) Visiting. The Policy Committee, under the Chairmanship of Mr. D. Sizer, undertook to survey the work being done in the town to ascertain whether or not all the needs of elderly citizens are being met, and, if or where gaps in the services are found, to extend the work to cover these needs. Fund raising activities are also included in the work of the Committee and it was decided to fulfil the urgent need for a Day Centre and Club as soon as sufficient funds are available.

The Visiting Committee, under the able Chairmanship of Councillor Miss J. Leslie, called a meeting of officers and members of Statutory and Voluntary Bodies who decided to set up as soon as possible, a central register of elderly citizens giving details of individual needs. The work of this Committee will cover such needs as gardening, shopping, decorating, outings for the housebound, etc.

A Chiropody Service is provided and during the year, 204 were referred for treatment. Transport is arranged where necessary through the members of the Co-Ordinating Committee and the Citizens' Advice Bureau.

During the year, 30 elderly people were taken to Eastbourne for the day and through the efforts of the East Grinstead Round Table who organised a fund raising Donkey Derby, 15 elderly persons were sent to the seaside for a holiday.

The Women's Royal Voluntary Service has rendered valuable assistance in many directions. The "Meals-on-Wheels" and Luncheon Club served 4,891 lunches and a special Christmas Dinner was provided, without charge, for 38. The meals are cooked by members of the Service in a kitchen attached to St. Leonard's House. All such meals are subsidised by the Council. The Luncheon Club serves two purposes (a) it provides a good meal at a low price and (b) it encourages elderly people to come out from their homes so that they not only have exercise and fresh air but are enabled to meet and talk to other people.

The W.R.V.S. is responsible for issuing Welfare Foods for infants, i.e. dried milk, orange juice and Cod Liver Oil at the local Food Service Centre, 18 Station Road, East Grinstead.

Furniture has been supplied to 31 families who were in need and 104 families have been assisted with clothing. 36 cushions were made for use by the elderly in Halsford Park House and shawls for all the elderly patients in Ward 1 of Queen Victoria Hospital and in Oakleigh, the annexe to the Hospital. Cot covers were made for children resident in the Yarburgh Home.

CITIZENS' ADVICE BUREAU

The following information is given by the Secretary of the Citizens' Advice Bureau:

"The work of the Citizens' Advice Bureau has increased greatly during 1967, the number of enquiries totalling 3,610. Included in this number were many enquiries appertaining to family and personal problems.

"In the course of the year, 550 elderly persons sought help and advice on such matters as supplementary benefits, rate rebates, health and medical, and accommodation.

The Chiropody Scheme is working well and the Bureau issued cards to 204 persons of pensionable age enabling them to obtain chiropody at a reduced fee.

The Bureau is open on five days of the week and is independent and non-political. Any person may come for information and advice. Personal problems are dealt with in the strictest confidence."

SOCIAL WELFARE LUNCH TIME SESSIONS

With the object of fostering friendly acquaintance and the interchange of information among those engaged in Social Welfare work, the East Grinstead Urban District Council sponsors a regular monthly meeting at East Court.

Invitations are sent to professional and voluntary workers, Doctors, Nurses, Clergymen and Head Teachers, who responded well.

The meetings have been held regularly on the first Friday of the month, and have been well attended. Each organisation represented has produced an excellent display of its activities, and these have been of great value to everyone present, promoting a better understanding of the services available.

VACCINATION OF PERSONS UNDER 16 YEARS OF AGE

DIPHTHERIA

In the East Grinstead area, 317 had completed a full course of Primary Immunisation, and 739 had received a Secondary (reinforcing) injection by the end of the year.

WHOOPING COUGH

The number of children who had completed a Primary Course (normally three injections) of pertussis vaccine (singly or in combination) in the East Grinstead area was 317 and 335 received a reinforcing dose.

TETANUS

The number of children who had completed a Primary Course (normally three injections) of vaccine (singly or in combination) in the East Grinstead area was 332 and 740 received a reinforcing dose.

POLIOMYELITIS

In East Sussex 5,936 children under 16 years received primary courses of Poliomyelitis vaccine (three doses) and 5,625 had reinforcing fourth doses.

WATER SUPPLY

Water for the greater part of East Grinstead is supplied by the Mid-Sussex Water Company. A few houses on the Northern boundary at Felbridge are supplied by the East Surrey Water Company.

The Mid-Sussex Water Company have deep wells at Hackenden and Forest Row, and an additional supply is obtained from the reservoir of the Weir Wood Water Board. Placelands deep bore-hole is also available as an additional booster for Summer Supplies.

The raw water is aerated, subjected to sedimentation, mechanical filtration, automatic superchlorination, and finally before going into supply, to dechlorination to give a free residual of 0.1 p.p.m. of chlorine. A consistently safe and palatable water supply is thus assured.

Samples of water from each supply are regularly submitted to the Analytical Laboratory, Lewes, by the Mid-Sussex Water Company for chemical and bacteriological examination. The quality of the water supply has been of a high standard.

It was not necessary to restrict the supply at any time throughout the year.

Approximately 5,568 dwelling-houses have a piped water supply.

It is not practical with present legislation to ensure 100% inspection in the widely separated poultry processing establishments in this area, but agreement has been reached with the owners to notify this Department should any reasonable doubt arise as to the fitness for human consumption of the poultry being processed.

The Council employ one full-time Rodent Officer on Pest Destruction.

During the year ended 31st December 1967, 1800 visits were made under the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949, and of these 588 were systematic surveys.

The Rodent Officer also dealt with 26 complaints of other pests, including wasps nests, cockroaches, ants, moles, flies, fleas, bed bugs, spider beetles and moths.

Regular inspections have been made at Eden Vale and Ashurst Wood Sewage Disposal Works, the refuse tips, housing estates and other Council properties. A 10% test of sewers was completed in the Spring in accordance with the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries instructions. Once again the test revealed a very low level of infestation.

A nominal charge for rodent and pest destruction is made to householders. Business premises are charged with the actual cost of materials and labour. No charge is made for subsequent inspection to ensure that the premises remain free from rats and mice.

The Council is prepared to enter into an annual contract to maintain business premises free from vermin.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

This work is carried out by the Engineer and Surveyor's Department.

House refuse is collected weekly. Single large items are also collected on the last Friday of each month and a written request should be made to the Surveyor's Department. There is no charge made for this service.

Trade Refuse is collected at the request of the trader concerned, and a charge of 1/3d per bin on all bins in excess of one per week is made. A collection is also made of trade waste paper, cardboard etc., again by request. Sacks are supplied by the Council to the trader and are emptied at a charge of 1/3d each, including the first sack.

Refuse is disposed of by tipping in a disused Railway cutting at High Grove. Before being covered, newly-tipped refuse is treated with Malathion insecticide to prevent breeding of flies.

Frequent inspections of the tip are made to ascertain possible nuisance by rodents and flies.

PETROLEUM (REGULATION) ACTS 1928 and 1936

58 premises were licensed to store petroleum spirit, and 117 visits were made under the Acts by the Public Health Inspectors.

LABORATORY SERVICES

The services of the Public Health Laboratory at the Royal Sussex County Hospital, Brighton (telephone 63506) are available to this department and to Medical Practitioners in the district for the investigation of infectious disease.

The laboratory is in a position to accept specimens (faeces, sputa, throat swabs etc.) both for the diagnosis of individual cases and for the investigation of outbreaks (detection of carriers, reservoirs of infection, mode of spread etc.). Specimens should reach the laboratory by 4.30 p.m. on weekdays, by 12.30 p.m. on Saturdays and by 11.30 a.m. on Sundays and Public Holidays.

Containers may be obtained from the laboratory or from this department, and specimens may be sent to the laboratory via the Southdown Motor Bus Company. Collections are made at the Brighton terminus at 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. (Mondays - Fridays) and at 12.30 p.m. on Saturdays. No collections are made on Sundays and Public Holidays.

Specimens for the Bacteriologist may be left at the Public Health Department, East Court, East Grinstead before 12.30 p.m. and will be placed on a 'bus in time to reach Brighton for the 4 p.m. collection.

The laboratory is open between the hours of 9.30 a.m. and 12 noon on every day of the year including Sundays and Public Holidays. Specimens which are so urgent that they have to be collected on those days, can be accepted at the laboratory between 10 a.m. and 11.30 a.m.

Specimens which are received at the Brighton Terminus after the last daily collection has been made, are not picked up until the following day, unless prior notification is received at the laboratory that an urgent specimen is on its way which may not, or will not arrive in Brighton in time for the normal collection. In cases of extreme urgency arising after laboratory hours, special arrangements can be made by telephoning the Director of the Public Health Laboratory (Dr. J.E. Jameson, Brighton 56960) or the Chief Technician (Mr. N.W. Emberley, Rottingdean 2070).

The following prophylactic is held at the Laboratory for issue free of charge to Medical Practitioners:

Gamma Globulin.

Supplies are restricted, and it is available only by consultation with the Laboratory.

Other types of vaccine, anti-toxins and serums are not held, but information regarding them may be obtained from the Director.

A day and night service is available for the conveyance of patients from within the County of East Sussex who are unfit to travel either by public transport or car. Calls are accepted from doctors, midwives and hospitals in the area. Cases of accident or sudden emergency are the only calls accepted from members of the public.

The ambulances are now operated by the East Sussex County Council, who took them over from the British Red Cross Society in April 1966.

Cases of infectious disease are removed to isolation hospital in the ambulances, which are then disinfected before returning to normal service.

Patients able to travel by car are conveyed on calls from doctors, midwives or hospitals, by the Hospital Car Service.
