

Diphtheria Immunisation.

The National Campaign was supported by all the districts as follows:-

The Hoddesdon Journal, by Hoddesdon Urban District Council.

Publicity Material.

Posters issued by the Ministry of Information for the Ministry of Health and the Central Council for Health Education, were displayed in the Council Offices, Welfare Centres and Offices of the Ministry of Food as well as on Public Notice Boards.

Cinema Slides giving information of the times when Immunisation was carried out at the County Council Welfare Centres, were shown at the Hertford, Bishop's Stortford and Ware Cinemas.

Leaflets.

The Minister of Health's letter to Parents was distributed by the Health Visitors and School Nurses.

Contamination of Food.

A Circular Letter drawing attention to the Necessity for a High Standard of Personal Cleanliness on the part of all Food Handlers was sent out to all Premises where Food intended for Human Consumption was Manufactured and Retailed.

A copy of the Lavatory Display card "Now wash your hands please," issued by the Central Council for Health Education, was also included.

Borough of Hertford.

WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply over the whole area of the Borough has been satisfactory both in quality and quantity.

All the water is chlorinated before going into supply.

It is examined chemically twice a year and bacteriologically examined once a month; the results have been consistently good.

With the exception of 18 houses (of which 15 are in the village of Hertingfordbury), there is a piped supply throughout the Borough.

The following houses have been connected to the main water supply:

Station House Hertingfordbury.

Numbers 229, 231, 233, 235, 237, 239 and 241 Hertingfordbury, (two stand pipes outside the houses).

DRAINAGE and SEWERAGE.

The method of disposal of the sewerage of the town is by the presedimented activated sludge process, and the resulting effluent is ultimately discharged into the River Lee.

REFUSE DISPOSAL.

There is a weekly collection, in covered freighters, of refuse which is disposed of by controlled tipping on Hartham.

Food Samples.

In June, samples of various reserve American canned Foodstuffs were submitted for bacteriological examination, the samples included de-hydrated Pea Soup, Tomato Soup, Black Bean Soup, Banana Flakes, Apple Flakes, Powdered Milk, Concentrated Orange Juice, and Grape Fruit Juice.

- Case I. A child of 4 years of whom there was no record of immunisation. Treated at the Isolation Hospital and recovered.
- Case II. A soldier of 26 years on release leave, arrived ill from Germany and died in the Isolation Hospital. No information as to previous immunisation could be obtained.

Hoddesdon Urban District.

WATER.

Except for slightly less than 25% of the whole, the district has a constant supply from public mains, which in nearly all cases is laid on direct to each house (only a few houses relying on standpipes). There are approximately sixty houses in the district without main supply and these are principally in the remote and undeveloped parts of the district. In addition there are sixteen houses which derive their water from a private supply.

The Northern end of the district is served by the Metropolitan Water Board. The extension in the area of supply transferred to the Board has now taken place. The Council's own water undertaking covers the remainder of the district, all the water being chlorinated. The supply was satisfactory in quantity.

It was not found possible to sample the raw water, but six bacteriological examinations were made of the treated water and were reported as being satisfactory.

Sixteen houses in Nursery Road derive their water supply from a deep bore hole in an adjoining nursery. Analysis proved the supply to be fit for domestic purposes.

During the year one sample of water was taken from a factory with its own supply and passed the required tests.

Woollensbrook.

A further three samples of water were taken from a shallow well serving three cottages in Woollensbrook. Two samples were submitted for bacteriological examination and one for chemical analysis. In all cases the water was reported to be unsatisfactory.

Negotiations were continued with the Metropolitan Water Board to extend their main, in order to provide a water supply to properties in the Woollensbrook Area.

In October the Council made a formal requisition under Section 138 of the Public Health Act, 1936, as amended, and Section 36 of the Water Act, 1945, undertaking to pay any deficit between the annual income and one-seventh of the cost of the extension. Two owners have agreed to make a yearly contribution and one owner a lump sum, towards the cost.

One house in Broxbourne, formerly relying on a pump on the premises, was linked up with the Council's Mains during the year. A standpipe supply from the same source was provided at two other properties, formerly dependant upon a spring.

DRAINAGE and SEWERAGE.

Most of the district (except for houses in undeveloped and lowlying parts of the area) is sewered. Sewage disposal works consisting of detritus, settling tanks, contact beds, and percolating filters serve the old urban area. Sewage from Broxbourne and Wormley is disposed of by broad irrigation at the Sewage Farm.

A new sewer was laid to deal with prefabricated bungalows erected at Wormley, and was utilized to take the drainage of fourteen houses, which formerly discharged into a cesspool.

REFUSE COLLECTION and DISPOSAL.

Household refuse is disposed of by means of controlled tipping in a disused Gravel Pit in Ogard Road.

Disinfections.

Disinfections were carried out in consequence of infectious diseases (including Tuberculosis) in fifteen dwelling houses.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

During the year eight houses were treated for bug infestation. One was a Council house and one a requisitioned property. The same method of disinfestation was followed as in previous years.

Public Health Act, 1936.

Fourteen Statutory Notices were served under Section 93 of the above Act, for the abatement of nuisances, mainly items of disrepair and sanitary defects in dwelling houses, all of which were remedied. It was necessary to make arrangements with the owner of two properties, for the Council to undertake the execution of the works and recover the cost by the collection of rent from the tenants.

Fifty-one Statutory Notices were served under Section 75 of the above Act, for the provision of dustbins at various addresses in the district.

Inspection of Factories-Factories Act, 1937.

Sixty-one visits and inspections were made during the year. Sanitary accommodation was provided to one factory.

HOUSING.

Overcrowding.

During the year it was possible to abate the overcrowding in three Council houses and nine privately owned houses, through the allocation of prefabricated bungalows and new permanent houses.

In addition, overcrowding in two Council houses and one other house has been partially relieved.

Thirty-one cases of overcrowding came to notice during the year, which included fourteen cases in Council houses.

HOUSING.

TOTALS

The continued necessary concentration of the building industry upon the provision of new houses again prevented any attempt to secure the reconditioning required to much of the smaller house property of the district and it is therefore desirable to again emphasize that a large proportion of this property is still further falling into a state of very bad disrepair. It was only possible, after repeated requests to builders and owners in many instances to obtain the remedying of the more serious defective conditions reported to the office by complaint.

A Survey, having as its object the supply of complete detailed information of the structural and other conditions existing at all house property of less than Twenty Pounds Rateable Value, was commenced in September.

In August and September a survey of the conditions existing on the Council's Housing Estates was made and it was shown that there were 20 families living in statutorily overcrowded conditions and another 20 families living in difficult circumstances. The erection of the new houses in 1947 on the Havers Lane Site would improve the unsatisfactory conditions.

During 1946 private enterprise built 18 new houses and made available by conversion and adaptation 7 other premises for housing purposes. At the end of the year 23 families were being accommodated in requisitioned properties and another 2 families in emergency housing accommodation. By the end of the year the Council had erected 33 temporary prefabricated bungalows (Uniseco Mark III type) in Dimsdale Crescent.

Factories.

For the purpose of administration by the Factory Department of the Ministry of Labour and National Service the Urban District was transferred during the year from the London to the Cambridge area. H. M. Inspectors of Factories referred 7 complaints to the Urban District Council during the year and informal action was taken in all cases to secure the remedying of any defects or the execution of any necessary works.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk Supplies.

The cowsheds, dairies and milk vehicles in use within the district were inspected at frequent and irregular intervals throughout the year and were on all occasions found to be maintained in a reasonably satisfactory condition. It will, however, be noticed that a gradual reduction is taking place in the number of producers and retailers of milk operating in the district and at the end of the year there were only two producers of any consequence and five retailers remaining on the Register. Of the latter the major undertaking is that of the Bishop's Stortford Dairy Farmers Limited who now retail milk in many of the adjoining areas as well as covering a large part of the Urban District itself.

WATER SUPPLY.

The new Pumps installed at the Lower Waterworks Pumping Station consist of electrically operated vertical spindle bore-hole pumps in duplicate, each capable of delivering 27,000 gallons per hour, with automatic control. A comprehensive Metering and Recording Panel was also fitted.

Bacteriological Examination of the Water Supply was satisfactory. Seventeen samples were taken. Three chemical analyses were made and proved satisfactory. No bacteriological examinations were made of the raw water.

The water from both wells is Chlorinated. It is estimated that only 0.6% of the properties in the district are not connected to the Town Supply.

DRAINAGE and SEWERAGE.

Practically the whole District is sewered.

The Sewage disposal Farm is situated at Rye House, about 3½ miles S.S E. of Ware, and practically adjoining the Hoddesdon Urban District Boundary, and is within the Ware Rural District.

Distribution of sewage is carried out by means of overhead concrete troughs, from which the sewage flow can be discharged at various points as desired.

The drainage from the boundary ditches passes under the River Stort and enters the River Lee.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Refuse and salvage collections are made separately at weekly intervals and disposed of by controlled tipping at Amwell End.

The H.T.S.T. plant at Messrs. Allen and Hanbury's continues to give excellent results, and no faulty samples have been recorded since its installation in 1942.

Attention is again directed to the unsatisfactory samples obtained of T.T. milk coming into the district. Eight samples taken ex-churns as received at the creamery from one producer were unsatisfactory and did not satisfy the prescribed tests. The milk from this producer no longer comes into the district, but the attention of the proper authorities was drawn to this producer's record, which was first adversely commented upon by the creamery's bacteriologist.

Another unsatisfactory producer, whose record was rather bad, (official and creamery samplings being unsatisfactory), was stated to be without a churn steaming stool for re-sterilising churns, and this was thought to be the chief cause of the failures.

Two complaints from other districts as to Tuberculin Tested milk bottled at the creamery were traced to the latter producer. One complaint from a third district relating to T.T. Pasteurised milk was most probably due to a bottling fault when a new bottle washer was installed, but a later investigation proved this to be a transitory fault.

A resolution of the Council was sent to the Herts. County Council to the effect that steps should be taken to require producers of Tuberculin Tested milk to cool it efficiently before delivery to the creamery by means of refrigeration methods, as it has been found that during the summer months the retail distribution of this grade of milk would be virtually impossible without considerable souring unless heat treated.

The unsatisfactory supplies of Pasteurised bottled milk were undoubtedly due to the faults in handling by the retailers who purchased the milk in bulk from the creamery.

Particulars of the incidence of disease found in animals is given in Table A. About 18.3 tons of meat and offals (excluding tripes, intestines and trimmings) were condemned during the year. During the past seven years the Sanitary Inspector has inspected every carcase by devoting many hours of over-time to attendance at the Slaughterhouse. Owing to illness in the autumn and acting on medical advice this 100% inspection will have to be discontinued until he can be given assistance.

WATER.

The town is supplied by the Herts and Essex Waterworks Company from their deep wells in Redrick Lane. 93% of the houses have a constant supply from the waterworks. The remaining 7% in the Village of Spellbrook obtain their water from shallow wells. Spellbrook Public well continues to be chlorinated each day and no samples of water, analysed monthly, were found to be unsatisfactory.

SEWERAGE.

At the Central Disposal Works the sewage is disposed of by the sedimentation and bacteria bed process, the effluent eventually entering the River Stort.

The South Sewerage Disposal Works is a temporary plant consisting of septic tanks with land irrigation and will be converted to a more modern system when facilities are available.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Refuse is collected alternate weeks and affixed near the Central Sewerage Works.

WATER SUPPLIES.

The main water supply is obtained from two boreholes, 450 feet deep at the Pumping Station at Puckeridge. The water is pumped to a tower at Old Hall Green. The Metropolitan Water Board area of supply includes the Parishes of Great Amwell and Stanstead St. Margarets. Apart from these, mains pass through each Parish with the exception of Eastwick and Gilston, and a scheme has been prepared for the extension of mains to cover this area. The water is hard and of good bacteriological standard. The water is chlorinated. Samples have been taken from time to time from the piped supply and bacteriological examinations made have shown the water to be satisfactory. The sufficiency is not in doubt. Over three quarters of the total dwelling houses in the district have a piped supply. 210 new connections were made in 1946.

Of the private supplies throughout the district approximately twothirds are deep wells or boreholes and one-third are shallow wells.

The parishes of Gilston and Eastwick are at present supplied partly by private wells and partly by a private piped water supply.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

Standon and Puckeridge are sewered and gravitate to a pumping station in Paper Mill Lane, Standon, from which the sewage is raised to a disposal works south of the village.

High Cross and Wadesmill, Great Amwell, St. Margarets and Stanstead Abbotts are drained to pumping stations from which the sewage is raised to join the Ware Urban District sewers.

Part of the village of Hertford Heath is in the Great Amwell parish and is sewered by agreement to disposal works in the Hertford Rural District.

A scheme has been prepared and approved for the sewering of Wareside, Widford and Hunsdon and it is anticipated that works will be undertaken in the near future. The works have been designed to take the sewerage from Little Hadham and Much Hadham in the Braughing Rural District.

Six sewer connections were made during 1946.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Cesspools for private residents were emptied three times per year free of charge and on other occasions by request at a nominal charge. There are over 600 cesspools in the area. Pails are emptied once a week from cottages not connected with the sewer. House refuse is collected fortnightly in a covered conveyance and disposed of by tipping at Standon and St. Margarets.

HOUSING.

Rural Housing Survey.

WATER SUPPLIES.

The Northern part of the District is supplied from two deep bore-holes at Chipping, from which water is pumped to a water tower at Throcking and to a reservoir at Buntingford; while the southern part of the district is supplied from Much Hadham, augmented by a supply from the Ware Rural District which is pumped to a water tower at Albury to serve the parishes of Braughing, Albury and the higher parts of Little and Much Hadham. All the water is chlorinated.

The Buntingford Waterworks are available as a standby.

It is estimated that the mains now supply 75% of the District.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

No alteration took place to the Public Sewerage System.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Cesspool emptying services inaugurated at the beginning of the year.

Charge is only made if more than two emptyings are requested.

Scavenging.

A monthly collection of refuse in all parishes with the exception of Much Hadham and Buntingford where it is fortnightly.

WATER.

Piped supplies have been taken into 29 houses which formerly relied on public standpipes or wells. In one instance, the Council paid for the cost of taking the piped supply to within a reasonable distance of the house and the owner for taking the water into the house. In the case of 16 other houses, which had depended on public standpipes, the owner laid services into the yards of the houses.

Quarterly samples from the Council's two water pumping stations were again taken for bacteriological examination and reported satisfactory.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

Eight W.C.'s were substituted for pail closets; two privy pits were converted to pails, and sinks were provided in eight houses previously without them.

Disinfestation was carried out at three houses because of bugs and at two where fleas had caused trouble. An insecticide liquid containing D.D.T. proved effective,

Two lengths of sewer of insufficient diameter have been relaid at Tewin.

HOUSING.

The completion of war damage repairs and preparatory work in connection with the Council's housing schemes, combined with the licensing of building works, has prevented a serious start on the survey of rural houses.
