To the Rural District Council of East Retford.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my fourteenth Annual Report as your Medical Officer.

The population of the district is estimated by the Registrar General to be 12930, that is 306 less than last year, but for estimating the birth-rate he allows 14488.

Births. There were 215 births, 112 males and 103 females, giving a birth-rate of 14.8 per thousand of population, one of the lowest figures on record.

Deaths. The total deaths numbered 220 being thus five more than the births. There were 113 males, and 107 females. The death-rate was therefore 17·1 per thousand. This is slightly less than the rate for the country as a whole.

The deaths of Infants under one year were 18, giving a death-rate of 86.6 per thousand births.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

During the year the district has been extraordinarily free from the usual infectious diseases with exception of Measles and Influenza.

Measles occurred in epidemic form in the first half of the year necessitating the closure of Rampton, North Leverton, Scrooby, and Clarborough Schools. Altogether there were 124 cases notified, none of which were fatal. February had the largest incidence with 39 cases. 38.6 per cent of the cases were notified by the parents.

Scarlet Fever occurred in only six cases. Two of these were removed to the East Retford Borough Isolation Hospital.

Diphtheria, one fatal case.

Erysipelas occurred only in three cases, all in the practice of one practitioner.

There was one death from Enteric Fever, but the district was free from this disease. The case occurred in an Institution outside the district where the patient was residing.

Influenza visited the District in the early summer and again in the autumn. In the latter epidemic the cases were severe and many were fatal, and it is to this cause that the death-rate is so heavy. There were 52 deaths giving a rate of 3.95 per thousand of the population.

Bronchitis and Pneumonia caused 12 and 10 respectively, the total deaths from these three causes numbered 74 giving a death-rate of 5.58 per thousand and 33.6 per cent. of the deaths from all causes.

Pulmonary Tuberculosis caused 19 deaths, showing a rate of 1.46 per thousand or 8.65 per cent. of deaths from all causes.

A small epidenic of Chicken Pox occurred at Mattersey.

Mumps occurred at Ranby, East Drayton and Laneham.

Whooping Cough was reported from Elkesley and Headon-cum-Upton.

The Slaughter Houses are fairly well kept.

Cowsheds are by no means what they should be. The complaint has been general that there is great difficulty in obtaining labour to keep them well and in good condition and of course this is a matter of general knowledge. It is hopeless to expect them to be put into really good order at present as it would necessitate an impossible outlay.

Housing. Many new houses are required throughout the district both for the present inhabitants and for those who will undoubtedly come in very shortly. Besides these, there are houses required to replace old houses which should be demolished. Owing to war conditions, it has been impossible to give the attention to this subject that it needs.

Since the termination of the year to which this report relates, a building scheme for the building of certain houses under the new Housing Scheme has been determined on. I shall have to refer to this at a future date.

The Aerodrome at Babworth to which I adverted in my last report was nearly finished at the date of the Armistice, and the water supply and drainage improved.

I append a short summary of the work done by the Surveyor and Inspector of Nuisances as regards sanitation, and two tables.
