LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

The Annual Report for 1942 is mainly statistical, and has been prepared in accordance with Ministry of Health Circular No. 2773.

The birth rate is 17.0 per 1,000 of the population and is the highest figure recorded since 1925. The death rate is 11.1, which is a decrease on the figure for the previous year, whilst the infantile mortality rate of 40.1 per 1,000 live births is the lowest figure ever recorded in the Riding. The previous lowest figure (41.8) was recorded in 1938.

The estimated population of the County is 194,680.

There has been a slight decrease in the notifications of infectious disease throughout the County generally. Cases of cerebro-spinal fever numbered 28, compared with 50 in the previous year, which was the highest figure recorded in the County.

I wish to thank the members of the Committee for their continued support, and my sincere thanks are due to my staff for their ever constant and loyal help during my term of office, this being my last Report.

The birth rate for the whole of England and Wales was 15.8, compared with 14.2 in the previous year.

There were 3310 live births and 95 stillbirths registered in the County during the year, making a total of 3405. Of this number, 597 occurred in the Boroughs of Beverley and Bridlington, leaving a total of 2808 in the area administered by the County Council.

The number of births notified to my Office by practitioners, midwives, etc. was 2686, whilst the Registrars in the County sent particulars of 114 births which had been registered but not notified.

There were 2,169 deaths registered in the County in 1942, a decrease of 153 on the figure for the previous year.

The death rate for the whole of England and Wales was 11.6 compared with 12.9 in 1941.

The principal causes of death in the County were once again heart disease (535), cancer (329) and intra-cranial vascular lesions (254), which accounted for over 50% of the total deaths.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

NURSING IN THE HOMES.

The East Riding Nursing Association, which supplied resident nurses to the subscribing members, ceased to function at the end of June, 1942, mainly for reasons of finance, but also because the nurses held no professional qualifications. Consequently home nursing is now only available in those districts, 13 in number, in which local Voluntary Nursing Associations have been established. It is therefore highly desirable that, helped by grants from the County Council, other Associations should be formed as soon as hostilities cease.

CHILD LIFE PROTECTION.

The five Child Protection Visitors paid a total of 302 visits to foster mothers and children during the year compared with 314 in 1941 and 412 in the previous year.

MIDWIVES.

One hundred and four midwives notified their intention to practise in the East Riding during the year 1942. At the end of the year, there were only 94 midwives in practice, 36 of whom were in private practice, 12 were employed by Voluntary Nursing Associations, 15 were Domiciliary County Midwives, 20 were employed in Institutions, whilst the remaining nine were midwives employed by the Hull Corporation at a small Emergency Maternity Home which they have established in the East Riding.

One thousand, nine hundred and sixty-two births were attended by midwives with no doctor in attendance, or 55.5% of the total births registered, which is a slight increase on the figure for the previous year.

The number of medical help forms received from midwives was equivalent to 22% of the cases which they attended as midwives, compared with 26% in the previous year.

Fees amounting to £700. 8s. 3d. were paid to practitioners under Section 14 of the Midwives Act, 1918, and £250. 10s. 5d. was recovered from the patients concerned. In the previous year, the figures were £720. 13s. 0d. and £153. 7s. 6d. respectively.

LABORATORY FACILITIES.

There has been no change in the facilities provided for the bacteriological and pathological examination of material from patients living in the County, except that the Emergency Public Health Laboratory at Pocklington was transferred to Northallerton in the North Riding.

The number of specimens submitted to the six laboratories to which material may be sent was 4,638 and the cost £1,282. 7s. 2½d. In 1941, the figures were 4,592 and £980. 19s. 2d. respectively.

The examination of milk and other foods is carried out by an analyst in Hull.

Details of the work carried out during 1942 under this heading will be found in Tables I and II.

HOSPITALS.

There has been no change during the year in the number or administration of the Hospitals in the County.

Admissions to the Westow Croft Emergency Maternity Home numbered 134 during the year, whilst 80 mothers, and 33 children under the age of five years, were admitted to the Mothers' Hostel at Newstead House, Norton. The admission of children under five years of age with their mothers to this Hostel was discontinued in July, 1942, on the instructions of the Ministry of Health.

INFANT WELFARE CENTRES.

The County Council's Infant Welfare Centre at Filey which was closed early in 1941 owing to the small number of attendances was re-opened during the year.

In October, 1942, a Mobile Infant Welfare Unit provided and maintained by Lord Trent was sent from Hampshire into the East Riding. It was stationed in the Northern part of the County for the first few weeks, and later visited Norton, Hummanby and Flamborough, with good results.

ORTHOPAEDIC TREATMENT.

There has been no change during the year in the arrangements for the out-patient treatment of persons crippled by tuberculosis or other causes. So far as in-patient treatment is concerned, patients can now be admitted to the new City General Hospital which has been established by the York Corporation.

Twelve children were sent for treatment to the Adela Shaw Orthopaedic Hospital, Kirbymoorside, five being admitted under the Maternity and Child Welfare Scheme, and seven through the Tuberculosis Scheme.

The Visiting Orthopaedic Surgeon examined 56 East Riding patients at the Clinics at Driffield, Malton, Scarborough and York. These patients, of whom 31 attended for the first time, paid 133 visits to the Clinics.

Ten adult patients were sent to out-County Institutions for the treatment of tuberculosis.

HEALTH VISITORS.

There has been no change in the arrangements for the health visiting of children up to the age of five years.

TREATMENT OF MINOR AILMENTS.

Eight children under school age were dealt with under this head during the year. Six children were sent to an ophthalmic surgeon on account of squint, and two were admitted to Hospital for removal of tonsils and adenoids.

REGISTRATION OF NURSING HOMES.

No change.

Five hundred and thirty-one patients were admitted to the Homes during the year, 335 of whom were maternity cases, whilst 26 were medical, 156 surgical, and 14 convalescent and chronic.

Exemption from registration has again been granted to three local Voluntary Hospitals and one Nursing Home which are not carried on for gain.

MATERNAL MORTALITY.

There were 7 maternal deaths in the County during the year, two being ascribed to puerperal sepsis, and five to other puerperal causes. The maternal mortality rate was 2.11 per 1,000 live births, whilst that for England and Wales was 2.01. There was one death of a mother for every 473 births, compared with 253 in 1941.

Facilities for the ante-natal care of patients continue unchanged. Two hundred and seventy-seven uninsured patients were examined by general practitioners under the Ante-natal Scheme during the year, compared with 285 in the previous year. The number of post-natal examinations was 67, compared with 79 in 1941.

A consultant was called in on six occasions and two expectant mothers were X-rayed on account of suspected abnormality.

Confidential reports were sent to the Ministry of Health on four maternal deaths which came to my notice during the year. Reports were also sent on two deaths which were associated with pregnancy.

INSTITUTIONAL PROVISION FOR THE CARE OF MENTAL DEFECTIVES.

There has been no great change in the provision of accommodation for mental defectives during the year. When the Air Ministry occupied the Brandesburton Institution in 1941, the patients were transferred to seven institutions in various parts of the country. Since then three more institutions have accepted patients from the East Riding, and there are now 170 mental defectives in outside institutions.

In addition to the beforementioned figure there are 14 patients in the Driffield Public Assistance Institution, which is certified to receive mental defectives under Section 37 of the Mental Deficiency Act, 1913.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

No change has occurred during the year in the number of ambulances (other than A.R.P. Ambulances) provided in the County.

The County Council ambulance made 242 journeys involving a mileage of 9,600. The sum of £373. 12s. 6d. was received in fees for the use of the ambulance compared with £154. 9s. 9d. in the previous year when the number of journeys made was 228 and the mileage 11,258.

PUBLIC HEALTH (VENEREAL DISEASES) REGULATIONS, 1916.

The arrangements for in-patient and out-patient treatment of persons suffering from venereal disease remain unchanged.

Twenty patients who paid 213 attendances were assisted with their travelling expenses during the year to enable them to attend the clinics for treatment at a total cost of £28. 9s. 1d.

The total amount paid to other authorities in respect of the treatment of venereal disease was £753. 16s. 11d.

The contribution of 3/- per 1,000 of the population which the County Council paid for propaganda work to the British Social Hygiene Council was increased to 5/- per 1,000 of the population during the year.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLIES.

In the Beverley Rural District, the village of Bishop Burton was connected to the water mains of the Borough of Beverley which supplies as much water as can be spared. Apart from this, the only pipe laying has been to various aerodromes and camps from the nearest Regional supply.

HOUSING.

Since the last Annual Report there has been practically nothing to report in the way of housing activities.

The Ministry of Health have adopted proposals for the provision of 3,000 houses for agricultural workers and 66 of these are to be erected by Local Authorities in the East Riding.

No applications were dealt with during the year under the Housing (Rural Workers) Acts, 1926 - 1942.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATIONS) ORDERS, 1936 AND 1938.

Two licences, (one for "Accredited" and the other for "Tuberculin Tested" milk) were granted during the year. Two producers of "Accredited" milk, and one of "Tuberculin Tested" milk did not renew their licences at the beginning of 1942, and two "Accredited" and two "Tuberculin Tested" milk producers surrendered their licences during the year. One "Accredited" licence was revoked during the year as samples of milk from the herd concerned consistently failed to pass the prescribed tests. At the end of the year there were 44 "Accredited" and 6 "Tuberculin Tested" licences in force in the County. Four of the "Tuberculin Tested" herds are "Attested" herds.

During the year 258 samples of designated milk produced in the County were submitted to the tests prescribed by the above Orders with the following results:-

One hundred and fifty-seven bulk samples of "Accredited" milk were submitted to the biological test for tubercle bacilli during the year, two of which were returned positive. No diseased beast could be detected following both clinical and biological examination of group samples of milk from the cows in one of the herds involved, whilst in the remaining herd one beast was found to be suffering from advanced tuberculosis, and was therefore slaughtered.

MILK AND DAIRIES (CONSOLIDATION) ACT, 1915, and MILK AND DAIRIES ORDERS, 1926 AND 1938.

There has been no change in the arrangements for the routine clinical examination of dairy cattle by Officers of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

Two hundred and sixty-eight bulk samples of milk (inclusive of the 157 referred to under the heading "Milk (Special Designations) Orders, 1936 and 1938") were taken by the Council's Sampling Officers for biological examination, 4 (or 1.5%) of which were reported to contain tubercle bacilli. In the previous year, the figures were 357 and 6 (1.7%) respectively.

A diseased beast could only be detected in one of the herds concerned, and this animal was therefore slaughtered.

Three positive samples produced in the County were also reported during the year, one by the Medical Officer of Health for Hull, and two by the Medical

Officer for York. In two of these herds no diseased beast could be detected, but in the remaining herd one animal was found to be suffering from tuberculosis, and consequently slaughtered.

PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

DEATHS FROM PRINCIPAL EPIDEMIC DISEASES.

The number of deaths due to the seven principal epidemic diseases, viz:- smallpox, measles, scarlet fever, diphtheria, whooping cough, fever (typhus, typhoid and simple continued) and diarrhoea (under the age of two years) was 29, giving a death rate of .2 per 1,000 of the population, the same rate as in the previous year.

SMALLPOX.

As in the previous year, no cases of this disease were reported.

MEASLES.

The number of notifications received during the year was 702, and there were 2 deaths from the disease.

ENTERIC FEVER.

Only 7 cases of enteric fever were reported in 1942, none of which proved fatal. In the previous year, thirty cases were notified.

SCARLET FEVER.

Two hundred and sixty-six cases of this disease were notified during the past year, compared with 347 in the previous year. There was one death. The District with the highest number of notifications was the Haltemprice Urban District (42).

DIPHTHERIA.

There were 102 notifications of this disease during the year 1942. Twenty-three of the cases occurred in the Howdon Rural District. There were nine deaths.

Further progress in diphtheria immunisation has been made during the year. The percentage of school children immunised is fairly satisfactory, although the percentage in the various Sanitary Districts shows considerable variation.

The immunisation of children under the age of five years, is, except in the Boroughs of Beverley and Bridlington, the responsibility of the County Council. The work is carried out at the various Infant Welfare Centres in the Riding, but in addition, there is a General Practitioner Scheme in operation through which practitioners are paid a fee of 5/- in respect of every pre-school child whom they immunise, and the results up to the present have been very satisfactory. The necessary material which is required for this work is provided free of charge.

ISOLATION HOSPITALS.

No change has occurred in the facilities provided for the hospital treatment of cases of infectious disease.

Admissions to the County Isolation Hospital at Driffeld during 1942 numbered 191, (124 scarlet fever, 54 diphtheria, 7 cerebro-spinal fever, 1 enteric fever, 1 encephalitis lethargica, 3 measles and 1 chicken pox) compared with 318 in 1941 and 163 in 1940. In addition, 9 patients from the Hospital area suffering from infectious diseases were admitted to other Hospitals as follows:- Hull City Infectious Diseases Hospital (5), Selby Isolation Hospital (1), Scarborough Sanatorium (1), Norton Grove Infectious Diseases Hospital (1), and Bridlington Borough Sanatorium (1).

PUERPERAL PYREXIA.

Twenty women were reported during the year to be suffering from puerperal pyrexia. Three patients were admitted to Hospital for treatment, and four were treated at home by the practitioners in charge with satisfactory results. Seven of the remaining 13 cases occurred at the Hull Corporation's "Greystones" Maternity Home at Cottingham, where the necessary facilities were available for treatment. The other six cases occurred in the area of the Bridlington Welfare Council.

OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM.

Eight infants were notified as suffering from ophthalmia neonatorum during 1942. Three of the cases were treated at home by the practitioners in charge with satisfactory results, three were admitted to Hospital for treatment, whilst the remaining two cases occurred in the area of the Bridlington Welfare Council.

CEREBRO-SPINAL FEVER.

This disease has not been so prevalent during the past year, only 28 cases being notified, compared with 50 in the previous year and 41 in 1940. Twelve of the patients were admitted to Hospital, 12 were non-civilians and the remaining four patients were treated at home. There were seven deaths.

CANCER.

There has been no change in the arrangements for the diagnosis and treatment of patients suffering from cancer.

During the past year, thirteen patients from the East Riding were sent to the Leeds General Infirmary for in-patient treatment.

The County Council again made a contribution of £25 to the Yorkshire Council of the British Empire Cancer Campaign towards research and propaganda work.

VACCINATION.

The total number of primary vaccinations during the past year was 1753 and 1938 statutory declarations of objection to vaccination were received.

Under normal conditions there were a small number of cases in which a prosecution would have been advisable, but owing to the war, proceedings could not be instituted with any degree of success, on account of the many absentees from their homes.

Some difficulty is being experienced in obtaining the necessary certificate of successful vaccination from the Public Vaccinators, but in this respect the East Riding compares most favourably with some of the adjoining authorities.

Detailed returns for the year ended 31st December, 1941, which have been received from the Vaccination Officers show that 2,809 children whose births were registered during the year were dealt with as shown below. The figures for the previous year are also given for comparison.

WELFARE OF THE BLIND.

The total number of blind persons now on the East Riding Register is 118 men and 110 women as compared with 114 men and 99 women at the date of the last report.

Financial assistance is granted to 129 unemployable blind persons in necessitous circumstances. These cases are reviewed periodically and all blind persons in the County are visited by the Blind Visitor appointed by the Hull and East Riding Institute.

Employment is provided in the workshops of the Hull and East Riding Institute for the Blind for 8 men and 2 women. Six men and two women are recognised as Home Workers.

At the present time the Hull Corporation and the County Council augment the earnings of the blind workers according to different scales. An effort is being made to formulate a uniform scale of augmentation acceptable to the Corporation, the Council and the National League of the Blind. Representatives of bodies interested have held a series of conferences on the subject and it is hoped that agreement will be reached.

TUBERCULOSIS. NEW CASES AND MORTALITY.

One hundred and ninety-one (145 Pulmonary and 46 Non-pulmonary) new cases of tuberculosis were notified during the year and in addition 57 cases came to notice otherwise than by formal notification. The total number of cases notified in the County shows an increase of 37 on the figure for the previous year.

Once again, over 50% of the cases notified were between the ages of 15 and 35.

INSTITUTIONAL TREATMENT.

No change has occurred in the facilities provided for the treatment of persons suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis, but patients suffering from non-pulmonary tuberculosis are now occasionally sent to the new York City General Hospital.

DISPENSARIES.

There has been no change in the arrangements made for the dispensary supervision of patients suffering from tuberculosis.

Three hundred and eighty six new cases (including contacts) were seen at the five Dispensaries in the County during the year, 140 of whom were found to be suffering from tuberculosis. In the previous year, the figures were 345 and 114 respectively.

The number of contacts examined was 88. In 9 cases, a diagnosis of tuberculosis was established, whilst the remaining 79 patients were found to be free from the disease.

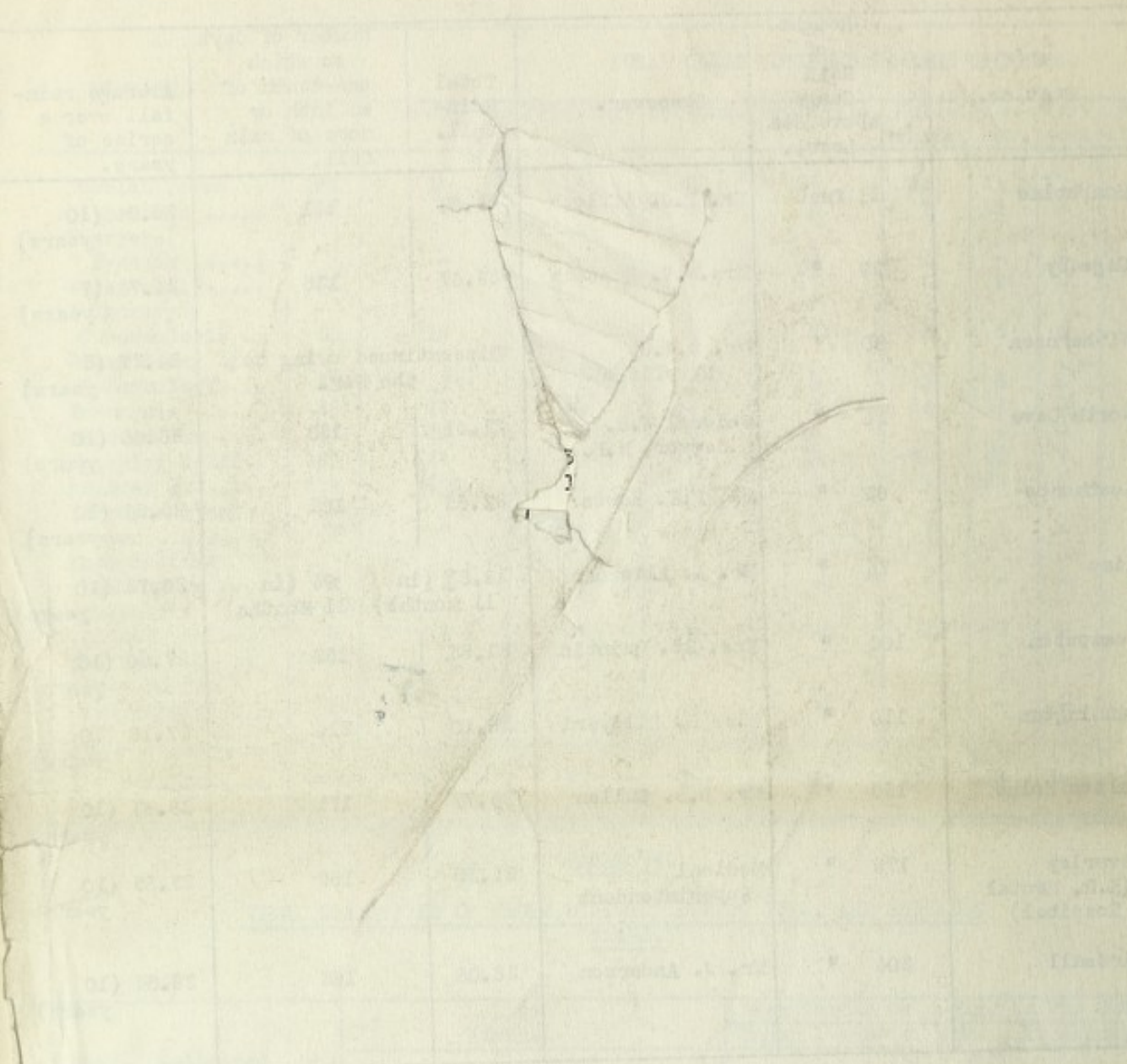
