# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL MEDICAL OFFICER FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1919.

# TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE EAST SUSSEX EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit with this my Annual Report on the work done in connection with the medical inspection of school children during the twelve months ended the 31st December, 1919.

The routine inspection of the Code Groups of children, which had been in abeyance during the period of the war, was resumed on the 1st August, 1919. Altogether 2,633 children of the Code Groups for the year—''Entrants,'' and ''Leavers''—were examined, for which purpose 81 schools were visited. At the time of writing, this part of the work is well up-to-date.

The organisation of arrangements for the systematic treatment of illness and defects occurring amongst the school children received the attention of your Medical Inspection Sub-Committee during the latter part of the year; and since then certain agreements have been entered into, with the sanction of the Board of Education, for the establishment of School Clinics, or Treatment Centres, for carrying that purpose into effect.

Arrangements have now been completed for the establishment of Treatment Centres in Hastings, Brighton, Haywards Heath, and Bexhill. The Medical Inspection Sub-Committee are, at the time of writing, also in conference with the Lewes Education Committee, with a view of co-operation in the establishment of a joint Treatment Centre at Lewes in connection with the School Clinic, which the Borough Education Committee have conducted successfully for some years past under the management of Dr. Stenhouse, the Medical Officer of Health and School Medical Officer for Lewes.

These arrangements having been made for the treatment of eye cases, cases of enlarged tonsils and adenoids, and other ailments, separate arrangements have been made for securing adequate dental treatment. Mr. Arnold Court, L.D.S., R.C.S. (Eng.), formerly Dental Officer to the Redditch Education Authority, has been appointed as a whole-time Dental Officer by your Committee.

Mr. Court's duties will be chiefly in dealing with the dental treatment of children attending schools in the rural districts, whilst arrangements are being made for the establishment of Dental Clinics for certain Urban Districts, at Portslade, Lewes, Haywards Heath and Newhaven.

During the current year (1920) additional medical responsibilities, in connection more especially with the inspection of scholars attending Secondary Schools, will devolve upon your Committee. All scholars attending the Secondary School at Lewes have already been examined, and those attending the Secondary Schools at Rye, Haywards Heath, and Uckfield will be examined during the coming autumn.

#### THE EAST SUSSEX EDUCATION AREA.

The area of the East Sussex Local Education Authority comprises the Administrative County of East Sussex with the exception of the Boroughs of Hove, Lewes and Bexhill, in which towns the Town Council is the Local Education Authority.

The total population of the Administrative County at the census of 1911 (excluding the Boroughs) was 173,671; the number of children between the ages of 5 and 16 in the same area was 37.833. The number of children on the registers on March 31st, 1919 was 23,505.

#### MEDICAL INSPECTION OF CHILDREN.

There are 177 Public Elementary Schools under the East Sussex Local Education Authority, and these Schools were visited during the year for the purpose of the Medical Inspection of the children as under:—

(a) Visits for examination of special cases and re-examinations ... 103
(b) Visits for routine inspection (including special cases) ... 81

Seventy-two Schools were visited once, and fifty-six were visited twice for the purpose of medical inspection.

#### FOLLOWING UP CASES OF DEFECT.

The arrangements in respect of assistance of nurses at the routine inspections, and in connection with "following up" are as follows:—

At 17 schools, the Sussex County Nursing Federation's School Nurse attends at the routine inspections, and "follows up."

At 134 schools the like services are provided by district nursing associations which are affiliated to the Sussex County Nursing Federation and whose nurses work under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Nursing Federation.

At 26 schools the nurses are provided by district nursing associations not affiliated to the Sussex County Nursing Federation.

The actual work carried out during the period by the school nurses in following up cases of defect found in the course of medical inspection is indicated in the next Table—

There are no agencies other than the school nurses engaged in the "following up," nor are there any inspection clinics.

#### MEDICAL TREATMENT.

There were no special arrangements for medical treatment made by the Local Education Authority during the year, but a scheme has now been approved for the treatment of school children at certain Hospitals and a whole-time Dental Surgeon has been appointed, whilst arrangements for obtaining additional assistance for one or more part-time Dentists are contemplated.

The facilities for obtaining treatment during 1919 consisted of local dispensaries and hospitals and the County Council's Tuberculosis Dispensaries.

#### OTHER ACTIVITIES.

## (a) Mentally Defective, Epileptic, and Physically Defective Children.

Mentally defective, epileptic and physically defective children were dealt with by the Local Education Authority in accordance with the provisions of the Elementary Education (Defective and Epileptic Children) Acts, 1899 and 1914.

During the year five feeble-minded children (three boys and two girls) were sent to special schools approved by the Board of Education and nine other mentally defective children (four boys

and five girls) were notified, under Section 2 (2) of the Mental Deficiency Act, 1913, to the East Sussex Committee for the Care of the Mentally Defective—

Considerable difficulty exists in connection with dealing with feeble-minded children suitable for maintenance in special schools approved by the Board of Education, by reason of the accommodation at such schools being insufficient to provide for the numbers of such children for whom special provision is required. At the end of the year 14 feeble-minded children (6 boys and 8 girls) were being maintained in special schools, and there was a list of 14 children (11 boys and 3 girls), whose parents had consented to the removal of the children to special schools, awaiting the occurrence of vacancies.

#### (b) Blind, and Deaf and Dumb Children.

Blind, and deaf and dumb children were dealt with by the Local Education Authority in accordance with the provisions of the Elementary Education (Blind and Deaf Children) Act, 1893.

At the end of the year 3 blind children (boys) and 12 deaf and dumb children (7 boys and and 5 girls) were being maintained in special schools.

### (c) Control of Infectious Diseases.

The following is a summary of the notifications, received from Head Teachers during the year, of cases of infectious and contagious disesases:—

### (e) Medical Examination of Pupil Teachers, etc.

During the year the School Medical Officer examined 47 female and 4 male pupil teachers, etc.

All applicants for Sick Nursing and Midwifery County Scholarships have been examined by the School Medical Officer.

## (f) Arrangements for 1920.

The work of medical inspection for the year 1920 will include the examination of "Code Groups" (Entrants, Intermediate Group and Leavers) and special cases; also re-examinations.

Each school will be visited during the year for these purposes. The following up will be carefully supervised and, where necessary, special enquiries will be made.
