MR. CHAIRMAN, MADAM AND GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in presenting my 22nd Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1962.

The general health of the district continues to be good. There have been no epidemics during the year. The number of new cases of Tuberculosis notified was 12 compared with 14, 17, 22, 18, and 18 respectively in the years 1961 to 1957 inclusive. These figures do not include cases reported from Shenley Hospital.

The Council's Smoke Control programme made further progress during the year with the confirmation of the second Smoke Control Order. It is pleasing to note the support which is being given to this work by all sections of the community.

The setting up of the panel of speakers on Home Safety is also worthy of mention and it is hoped that their efforts, together with the display of posters in the district will help to reduce the number of home accidents.

Once again, I am very pleased to record my thanks to the Council for their support, to my fellow officers for their co-operation, and to the staff of the Health Department for their work during the year.

## Section B

### GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

#### 1. PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICERS

One part-time Medical Officer of Health  
One Chief and two District Public Health Inspectors  
(All whole-time, qualified Public Health Inspectors  
and Meat and Food Inspectors).

The General Purposes Committee deals with all matters relating to Public Health. They meet on the second Monday in each month and receive the reports of the Medical Officer of Health and the Chief Public Health Inspector.

#### 2. (a) LABORATORY FACILITIES

Samples of water, milk and ice-cream are examined at the Public Health Laboratory, Peace Memorial Hospital, Watford.

#### (b) AMBULANCE FACILITIES

Cases of infectious disease are conveyed to the Coppetts Wood Isolation Hospital, Muswell Hill and the West Hendon Hospital. The ambulance for non-infectious cases, provided by the Herts County Council, is stationed at the Fire Station, Elstree Way and is manned by the Herts Ambulance Brigade staff. If this service is not available, ambulances are on call from a pool controlled by the West Herts Divisional Control, St. Albans.

#### (c) NURSING IN THE HOME

The area has six whole-time Health Visitors, three District Nurses employed on general nursing, three midwives and one nurse employed part-time on general nursing.

## Section C

### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

#### WATER SUPPLY

The Rural District has 3 parishes, Elstree, Shenley and Ridge.

The parish of Ridge and a small part of Elstree parish is supplied with water by the Lee Valley Water Company.

The parish of Shenley and the rest of Elstree parish is supplied with water by the Colne Valley Water Company.

I am indebted to the above-mentioned companies for the following information regarding the water supplied to the district.

1. The water supply has been satisfactory in quality and quantity.

2. 733 samples of raw water were submitted to bacteriological examination. The results were variable.

2831 samples of supply water were submitted to bacteriological examination. The results were very satisfactory.

386 samples of raw water were examined chemically. the results were variable.

651 samples of supply water were examined chemically. The results were very satisfactory.

3. Before distribution the supply water is chlorinated and partially dechlorinated. Part of the supply water is also filtered and most of it is submitted to softening.

4. The water is not likely to be plumbo-solvent.

5. All houses in the district are supplied from public water mains direct to the houses with the exception of one isolated house in the parish of Ridge which has a water supply from a private well.

## SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The main centres of population in the district are served by drains connected to the trunk sewer of the South-west Herts Main Drainage Authority, the sewage being treated at Rickmansworth. There are small treatment works within the district at Catherine Bourne and Bell Lane, Shenley and at Watford Road, Elstree.

About 60 private septic tank disposal units are used for sewage treatment at farms and isolated dwellings. In the past, owners have had to make their own arrangements for the periodical removal of sludge from the tanks, but the Council have now been able to arrange for a service to be provided for the regular emptying of the tanks. This will begin early in 1963 and will be carried out by arrangement with the St. Albans Rural District Council.

There are now only 12 houses in the district without water-closets. Each is unable to be connected to main drainage, but efforts are being made to persuade the owners to replace the existing pail closets by waterborne sanitation to septic tanks.

## PUBLIC CLEANSING

House refuse is collected weekly from the whole of the district by the Council's own staff (under the control of the Engineer and Surveyor), and disposed of by controlled tipping on the site of the disused sewage works at Medburn Farm, Elstree and at Moor Mills, Park Street, Nr. St. Albans.

The use of paper sacks instead of dustbins is now the policy of the Council and steady progress is being made in the extension of this improved hygienic method to the whole of the district.



## SHOPS AND OFFICES

Routine inspections were carried out at these premises during the year. No statutory action was necessary.

## SWIMMING POOLS

There are no public swimming pools in the Elstree Rural District, but the Council have plans for the provision of an indoor pool at Borehamwood.

## CLEAN AIR

In July, approval was received to the Council's proposal to establish the second Smoke Control Area. The Order will become operative on the 1st July 1963 by which time the area between the Barnet By Pass and Furzehill Road, from Shenley Road and Elstree Way southwards to the district boundary will be under Smoke Control.

It is proposed to extend the area under Smoke Control by stages, the whole of Borehamwood being included by 1965.

## RODENT CONTROL

One Rodent Operative is employed part-time on this work under the supervision of the Chief Public Health Inspector.

Mr. J. Bond, who has for many years given excellent service to the district, retired during the year having reached the age of 70 years. His duties as Rodent Operative are now carried out by Mr. P. Keogh.

During the year, investigation was carried out at 212 properties for the purpose of rodent control. Of these, 126 were found to be infested with rats and 36 infested with mice. These were subsequently treated by the local authority.

A survey and test baiting of sewers for rats was carried out during the year. Baits were laid in 67 manholes throughout the district. No bait was taken.

## HOUSING IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

During the year 11 Standard Grants and one Discretionary Grant were approved. The total amount of grants payable was £1478.

In accordance with the wishes of the Minister of Housing and Local Government, a survey was made of the houses in three streets known to be of the type which lack modern amenities but which would, if improved, provide adequate housing accommodation for many years.

Letters and booklets explaining the help available to carry out improvements with the aid of grants were sent to the owners of all the houses in which such work was required. As a result, only one application was received. This was in respect of an owner-occupied house.

### RENT ACT 1957 CERTIFICATES OF DISREPAIR

No applications for Certificates of Disrepair were received during 1962.

### HOME SAFETY ACT 1961

This Act enables local authorities to promote safety in the home, and after consideration, the Council agreed to set up a "Home Safety Panel" under the Chairmanship of County Councillor A. Farr. The panel is comprised of a Health Visitor, representatives of the Gas and Electricity Services, Station Officer of the Fire and Ambulance Service, and the Chief Public Health Inspector.

The panel visits meetings of Women's Organisations, Old Folks' Clubs and schools. Each member of the panel speaks for five minutes on Safety in the Home and then answers questions put by members of the audience.

The Council has become a subscriber to the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents. Posters and leaflets have been circulated, dealing, among other subjects, with fireguards, the correct use of oil heaters and the danger of accidents caused by falls in the home.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC  
HEALTH INSPECTOR

MR. CHAIRMAN, MADAM AND GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for the year 1962.

The year has shown a continued decline in the number of complaints received regarding housing defects. This is probably due to a variety of reasons, but it is pleasing to record that in all but one instance, repairs which were required were carried out without the necessity for formal action. In the case which necessitated the serving of a Statutory Notice, the work was carried out within the time allowed.

Routine inspections of various premises have been carried out during the year and a considerable amount of time has been taken up with inspections in connection with the Smoke Control Order No. 2, but this is well worthwhile and will prove of permanent benefit to all who live or work in the area.

Work was in progress at the end of the year on the construction of the Municipal Caravan Site at Allum Lane. When this is in use the district will no longer have caravans on roadsides or other unlicensed sites.

It is a pleasure to record my sincere thanks to the Council for their support and to the staff of the Health Department for their hard work and willing co-operation during the year.

## INSPECTIONS DURING THE YEAR

A total of 3,427 visits and inspections was made during the year to all types of premises. 303 inspections of food-preparing establishments were carried out.

85 Informal Notices were served during the year requiring the repair or remedy of defects.

One Statutory Notice was served under the provisions of Section 93, Public Health Act, 1936 requiring the remedying of defects at a dwelling house. The work was carried out satisfactorily.

There are no registered common lodging houses in the area.

ICE CREAM (HEAT TREATMENT)  
REGULATIONS 1959

Under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act 1955, there are only two registrations in the district of premises used for the manufacture and sale of ice-cream, and 46 premises registered for the sale of ice-cream.

16 samples were taken during the year of which 8 were from vendors trading ice-cream manufactured outside the district. The results of the bacteriological examinations are as follows:

Provisional Grades 1 and 2 are regarded as satisfactory, Grades 3 and 4 are unsatisfactory.

It will be seen that 72.7 per cent of samples were Grade 1, 22.7 were Grade 3 and 4.5 Grade 4. The unsatisfactory samples of Ice-cream were taken from Soft Ice-cream machines on mobile vehicles.



## FOOD PREMISES

There are 174 premises in the district where food is prepared for sale, or sold, or offered or exposed for sale to the public.

The Hertfordshire County Council are responsible for sampling food and drugs in this District and I am indebted to Mr.E.H.Griffiths, Divisional Inspector, Weights & Measures Department for the following information regarding samples taken in the Elstree Rural District during 1961:-

I would again mention that by the sampling of products in other County Districts - products which may well be found also in Elstree Rural District - the County Council gives a wider protection to Districts than might be imagined from the sampling figures for any one District. As an example, in that part of the London County Council Estate, Borehamwood which lies outside the area of the Elstree District Council, two unsatisfactory products were found in 1962, which could also have been bought inside the Elstree District. Legal proceedings leading to convictions and fines were the result of these samples. They concerned a "10% Butter Genoa Cake" which contained only 1% butter, and a canned "Orange Juice with added sugar" which contained only 30% Orange Juice and 62% of added water.
