Section B

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

1. PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICERS

One part-time Medical Officer of Health
One Chief and two District Public Health Inspectors
(All whole-time, qualified Public Health Inspectors
and Meat and Food Inspectors).

The General Purposes Committee deals with all matters relating to Public Health. They meet at six-weekly intervals and receive the reports of the Medical Officer of Health and the Chief Public Health Inspector.

2. (a) LABORATORY FACILITIES

Samples of water, milk and ice-cream are examined at the Public Health Laboratory, Peace Memorial Hospital, Watford.

(b) AMBULANCE FACILITIES

Cases of infectious disease are conveyed to the Coppetts Wood Isolation Hospital, Muswell Hill and the West Hendon Hospital. The ambulance for non-infectious cases, provided by the Herts County Council, is stationed at the Fire Station, Elstree Way and is manned by the Herts Ambulance Brigade staff. If this service is not available, ambulances are on call from a pool controlled by the West Herts Divisional Control, St. Albans.

(c) NURSING IN THE HOME

The area has six whole-time Health Visitors, three District Nurses employed on general nursing, three midwives and one nurse employed part-time on general nursing.

Section C

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER SUPPLY

The Rural District has 3 parishes, Elstree, Shenley and Ridge.

The parish of Ridge and a small part of Elstree parish is supplied with water by the Lee Valley Water Company.

The parish of Shenley and the rest of Elstree parish is supplied with water by the Colne Valley Water Company.

I am indebted to the above-mentioned companies for the following information regarding the water supplied to the district.

1. The water supply has been satisfactory in quality and quantity.
2. 938 samples of raw water were submitted to bacteriological examination. The results were variable.
2,946 samples of supply water were submitted to bacteriological examination. The results were very satisfactory.
475 samples of raw water were examined chemically. The results were variable.
592 samples of supply water were examined chemically. The results were very satisfactory.
3. Before distribution the supply water is chlorinated and partially dechlorinated. Part of the supply water is also filtered and most of it is submitted to softening.
4. The water is not likely to be plumbo-solvent.
5. All the houses in the district are supplied from public water mains direct to the houses with the exception of one isolated house in the parish of Ridge which has a water supply from a private well. The water from the well was submitted to bacteriological examination. The result was satisfactory.
6. The fluoride content of the water supply is less than 0.1 part per million. The Council has asked the Minister of Health to require the addition of fluoride to drinking water throughout the country where the naturally occurring amount is insufficient.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The main centres of population in the district are served by drains connected to the trunk sewer of the South-west Herts Main Drainage Authority, the sewage being treated at Rickmansworth. There are small treatment works within the district at Catherine Bourne and Bell Lane, Shenley and at Watford Road, Elstree.

75 private septic tank disposal units at farms and isolated dwellings were desludged twice during the year. The work is carried out by arrangement with the St. Albans Rural District Council.

The number of houses in the district without waterclosets has now been reduced to 9. Some of these dwellings are unfit but efforts are continuing to persuade the owners of the other properties to provide improved sanitary facilities.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

House refuse is collected weekly from the whole of the District by the Council's own staff (under the control of the Engineer and Surveyor), and disposed of by controlled tipping on the site of the disused sewage works at Medburn Farm, Elstree and at Moor Mills, Park Street, Nr. St. Albans.

The use of paper sacks instead of dustbins is now the policy of the Council and steady progress is being made in the extension of this improved hygienic method to the whole of the district.

SHOPS AND OFFICES

Routine inspections were carried out at these premises during the year. No statutory action was necessary.

SWIMMING POOLS

There are no public swimming pools in the Elstree Rural District, but the Council have plans for the provision of an indoor pool at Borehamwood.

CLEAN AIR

On the 1st July 1963, the Council's second Smoke Control Order became operative. The area between the Barnet By-Pass and Furzehill Road, from Shenley Road and Elstree Way southwards to the district boundary is now subject to Smoke Control.

Unfortunately this work must temporarily be slowed down because of the uncertainty of smokeless solid fuel supplies to domestic users.

RODENT CONTROL

During the year investigation and treatment for rats and mice was carried out at 378 premises. 97 buildings were treated for various insect infestations.

HOUSING IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

During the year, 4 applications were received for Discretionary Improvement Grants. 2 applications were granted and the works completed during the year.

7 applications for Standard Grants were received and approved during the year.

It is disappointing that owners are not taking advantage of the financial help available for the improvement of structurally sound houses. The applications for grants are mainly from owner/occupiers or the purchasers of houses which have previously been rented but have become vacant and been sold to persons who intend to occupy the premises themselves.

RENT ACT 1957 - CERTIFICATES OF DISREPAIR

No applications for Certificates of Disrepair were received during 1963.

HOME SAFETY ACT, 1961

The "Home Safety Panel" under the Chairmanship of County Councillor A. Farr, visited 9 organisations during the year and addressed a total of 450 persons on accidents in the home and how the accidents may be avoided.

The panel comprises a Health Visitor, representatives of the Gas and Electricity Services, the Station Officer of the Fire and Ambulance Service, and the Chief Public Health Inspector.

The audiences varied from schoolchildren to Women's Organisations and Old Folk's Clubs.

INSPECTIONS DURING THE YEAR

A total of 2,684 visits and inspections to all types of premises was made during the year. 405 inspections of food handling premises were carried out.

78 Informal Notices requiring the remedy of defects in dwelling houses were served during the year. In only one instance was it necessary to obtain authority for the service of an Abatement Notice under the Public Health Act, and in this instance the work was carried out before the serving of the notice.

REGISTERED COMMON LODGING HOUSES

There are no registered common lodging houses in the area.

AGRICULTURE (SAFETY, HEALTH & WELFARE PROVISIONS) ACT, 1956

23 visits were made to agricultural holdings during the year for the purposes of the Act. No statutory action was required.

NOISE

Several complaints of noise were received during the year mainly regarding noise from industrial undertakings and in one instance a considerable amount of time was spent in visiting the premises concerned and the houses in the vicinity of the factory at various times of the day and night. Improvement has been achieved with the co-operation of those concerned.

MUNICIPAL CARAVAN SITE

A site for ten caravans at Radnor Hall, Allum Lane, was completed and occupied during the year. Families who had previously been living on roadside verges or other unlicensed sites in the district have now been moved onto the Municipal Site and one has only to visit this site and see the clean and tidy state in which it is kept, to realise the benefit of its provision.

Each caravan has its own garden, store shed and supply of electricity. There is a communal building in which there are water closets, washbasins, bathrooms and a laundry room. Constant hot water is available.

FOOD PREMISES

There are 172 premises in the district where food is prepared for sale, or sold, or offered or exposed for sale to the public.

Under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act 1955, there are five registrations in the district of premises used for the manufacture and sale of ice-cream, and 51 premises registered for the sale of ice cream.

51 samples were taken during the year. The results of the bacteriological examinations are as follows:-

Provisional Grades 1 and 2 are regarded as satisfactory. Grades 3 and 4 are unsatisfactory.

The high proportion of unsatisfactory samples was due to the use of Soft Ice Cream machines which require daily cleansing and sterilization. As a result of several visits and instruction in the care and operation of these machines, improved results were obtained.
