FOR THE YEAR 1914.

GENTLEMEN,

Having retired from the office of Medical Officer of Health for the Epping Rural District on the 29th of September last, a position which I had the privilege of holding since its creation in the year 1876: You are aware that the duty devolves upon me to prepare a Report for the period of the year during which I continued in office.

It scarcely seems necessary that I should on this occasion repeat the description of the District given in so many previous Annual Reports, and which applies in all material respects to the present time; I may however remind you that the total area of the District is 36,705 acres, and the population for the 1911 census was 13,959, which to the middle of the year 1914 is estimated to have increased to 14,475. The District for administrative purposes is sub-divided into those of Epping Rural, Chigwell, and Harlow.

Water Supply.—For Epping and Harlow sub-districts this is provided by the Herts and Essex Water Works Company, while Chigwell is supplied by the Metropolitan Water Board. Arrangements for the extension of the Herts and Essex Company's mains to Netteswell Cross and Burnt Mill were completed early in the year, and these were being proceeded with in the autumn.

Reports upon the need of a good water supply for Epping Green and Matching were made, but to the end of September these had not received the attention called for. Possibly the outbreak of war has hindered these necessary improvements.

Sewerage and Drainage.—The new scheme for Netteswell and Burnt Mill was proceeded with, and should by the present time have been completed. After this, the connecting of the houses will no doubt be taken in hand with as little delay as possible. This work, together with the new water supply should effect a great sanitary improvement in this part of the District.

Scavenging.—Much of this work is carried out by contract, and is satisfactory. No steps, however, were taken to arrange for dust collection at Theydon Bois, which already on several occasions has been advised.

Bye-laws, Adoptive Acts and Regulations in force in the District remain as stated in my Report for 1913, and are:

- (1) Building Bye-laws for entire District.
- (2) Slaughter-house Bye-laws for entire District.
- (3) Public Health Amendment Act, 1890 (Part 3 only).
- (4) Infectious Diseases (Notification) Act, 1890.
- (5) Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milk Shops Regulations.

Schools.—The important duty of supervising Elementary Schools is now undertaken by the County Education Authority, and has been carried out for some time past by Dr. Sinclair, as County School Medical Officer, with a staff of Assistants. Their work is so ably carried out, and so fully reported upon from year to year, that any detailed statement from the District Medical Officer of Health would appear to be superfluous.

Foods: Milk Supply.—All dairies and cowsheds have been inspected during the year. One very insanitary cowshed at Chigwell has been closed. Others throughout the District shewed a poorness of construction, and much room for improvement in regard to cleanliness. Upon the other hand, however, there are to be found in this District many dairy-farms provided with buildings of the best modern construction, well-cared for, well-managed, and which are in all respects a credit to their owners.

Bake-houses and Slaughter-houses.—These were all inspected from time to time, and were as a rule found to be satisfactory. Six seizures of unsound meat were made.

Housing and Town Planning Act. - Early in the year, under instructions issued by the Local Government Board, I was called upon in conjunction with Mr. Beard, Sanitary Inspector, to prepare a Special Report upon Housing conditions in the District. The terms of these instructions rendered it necessary that a houseto-house inspection of the particular class of houses to be dealt with should be made throughout the District, and as we were limited to a period of six weeks to accomplish this, it was found entirely impossible to get through the work entailed in so short a time. Numbers of similar inspections had been made and recorded during the previous two or three years, but reference to these did not supply anything like the whole of the new details asked for, and consequently they were to a great extent useless for the purposes of this special report. In the month of May, however, we were able to present a very full, and I hope, a complete report upon the subject. Our report showed a very serious want of houses in many parishes in the District, and should prove of great value, not only at the present time, but also for the purpose of future reference.

General character of defects found to exist.—Defective roofs and gutters, damp walls and floors.

One house for which a closing order was made in 1913 was made habitable, and the order was rescinded.

Measles and Chicken Pox were not notifiable, but Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis and Poliomyelitis were added to the Schedule.

Scarlet Fever.—As for so many years past, this was the prevailing disease, and was chiefly epidemic in the Harlow Subdistrict, due apparently to the continued spread of an outbreak which occurred in the autumn of the previous year, and which had been traced to infection imported by certain holiday children from London. This epidemic resulted in circulars being sent to various Agencies in London, asking that the children should be medically examined before being sent into the District and that care should be taken in the selection of suitable houses, and especially that overcrowding should be avoided.

Factory and Workshops Act.—There are but few Factories, and no underground Bakehouses in the District. The former, and all Workshops and Workplaces, including Bakehouses and Slaughterhouses, have been duly inspected, and particulars respecting them were as stated in the special table at the end of this Report.

Sanitary Inspector's Report.—Owing to the outbreak of War, Mr. Beard was deprived of the services of Mr. Ellis as Assistant Inspector, during the later months of the year, and for the time being the whole of the work has devolved upon him. This has necessarily caused some curtailment of the less pressing duties, but his Statement which I have the pleasure of adding to this Report shows I think no falling off in his accustomed activity.

Vital Statistics.—It has been my custom in previous Annual Reports to give a summary of the Vital Statistics, but as this Report deals only with a part of the year I am not in a position to do so on the present occasion. I have, however, forwarded to Dr. Erskine (my successor in office) the usual "tables" completed to the end of September last.
