SUMMARY OF NURSING ARRANGEMENTS, HOSPITALS, ETC., AVAILABLE FOR THE DISTRICT.

Professional Home Nursing is not provided by the Council.

There are Ten Certified Midwives practising in the District.

CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES.

All the obligations under these services have been transferred to the Essex County Council by arrangement.

There is a Child-Welfare Centre at Theydon Bois. The work is carried out by a staff of voluntary helpers organized by the local branch of the British Red Cross Society and the District Nurse.

HOSPITALS.

An Isolation Hospital is provided for the treatment of certain infectious complaints.

Arrangements have been made with the West Ham Corporation for the admission and treatment of cases of Small-Pox in the West Ham Small-Pox Hospital. A Special Ambulance can be obtained for the removal.

AMBULANCE.

A Motor Ambulance, stationed at Epping, available for non-infectious cases, is provided by the British Red Cross Society. A Horse Ambulance for certain infectious cases is maintained by the Council.

LABORATORY WORK.

Bacteriological Examinations are made free of cost to the patient by the Counties Public Health Laboratories, 91, Queen Victoria Street, E.C. 4. Doctors practising in the District extensively make use of this arrangement, especially with regard to Diphtheria and Pulmonary Tuberculosis. Anti-diphtheria Serum can be obtained from the Medical Officer of Health.

Samples of water from wells in the District are frequently examined by the Medical Officer of Health.

- (6.) Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1885, Tents, Vans and Sheds.
