EPPING RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Report of the Chief Sanitary Inspector relating
to the water supply in the Area.

The water undertakers for the whole of the area are the Herts & Essex Water Company, the water being derived from wells, one at Sawbridgeworth and one at Roydon, both approximately 200 ft. deep.

The quality of the water, although extremely hard, is satisfactory and chemical and bacteriological reports are appended.. Under the Herts & Essex Water Act, 1944, the Company undertake to reduce the hardness to $12\frac{1}{2}$ degrees according to Clark's scale. This work however, cannot legally be asked for until a period of two years after an Order has been made in Council declared to be the day on which the emergency that was the occasion of passing the Emergency Powers Act, 1939, came to an end.

The quantity as supplied by the Company is generally sufficient but there have been difficulties in the Barn Hill area in the Parish of Roydon and in certain parts of Nazeing, in getting an adequate supply, this being due to the insufficient size of the mains. The work to rectify this has been started at Roydon, and contracts have been placed to carry out the work at Nazeing. It is therefore hoped that this difficulty will shortly be overcome.

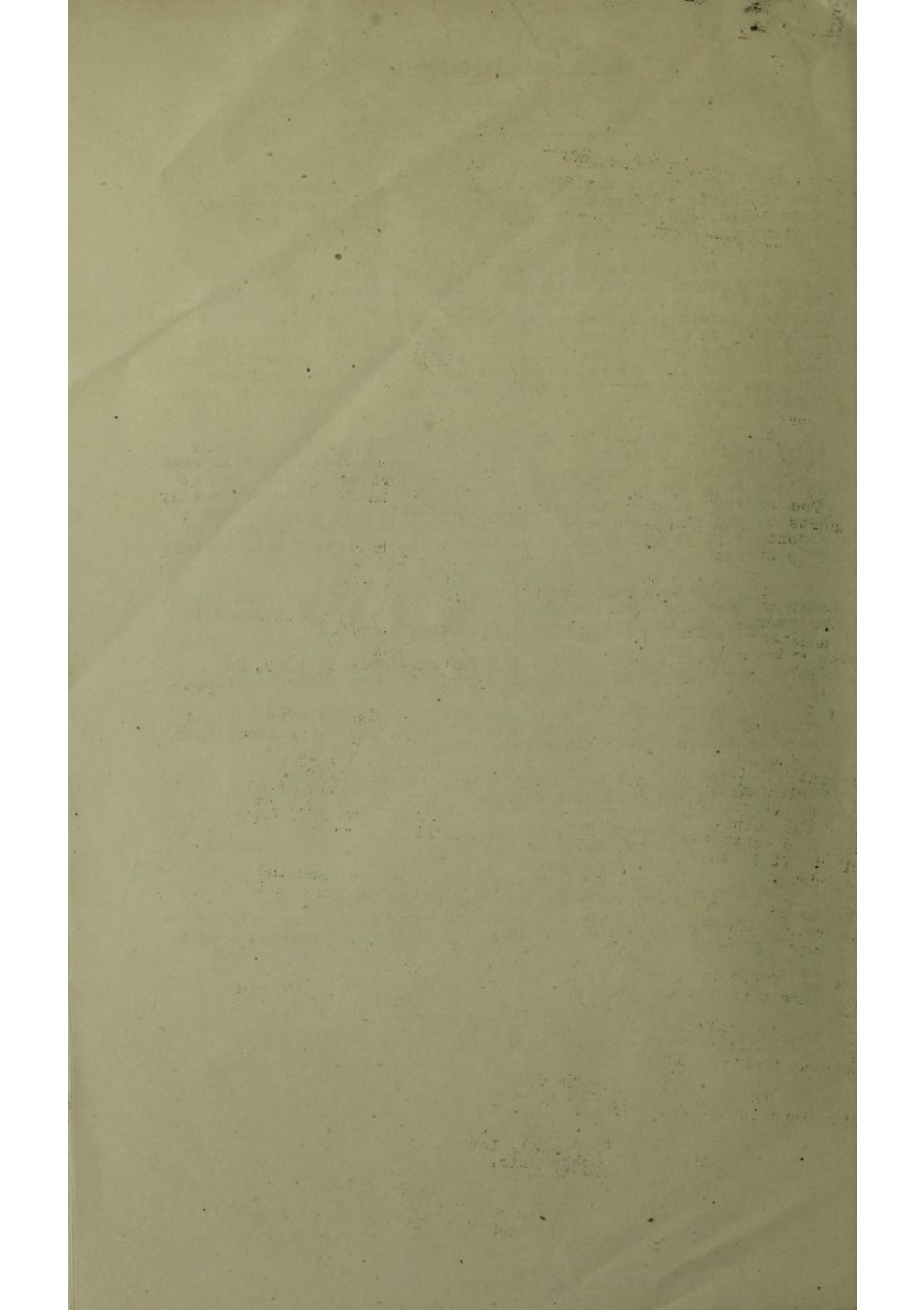
Eighteen samples of water were taken either from the main or from the aeration plant before being chlorinated and in every case the Analyst's report was satisfactory.

Water is not liable to plumbo-solvent action. No action has been taken in respect of any form of contamination.

Approximately 90% of the dwelling houses have a piped supply of water direct to the house. There are a few standpipes and some derive their supply from wells.

The Council has under consideration water main extensions in the following areas:-

Newmans End, Matching.
Church Road, Gt. Parndon.
Cottages, Letton Mill, Letton.
Avenue Road, Dobbs Weir, Roydon.
From Dobbs Weir to Carthagena Lock in the
Parishes of Roydon and Nazeing respectively,
to the Glen Faba and Riverfields Estates, Roydon.

Report: This sample has faint opalescence due to the presence of a trace of iron but it is not unduly turbid. The water is neutral in reaction, very hard in character but contains no excess of salinity or mineral constituents in solution. It is of high standard of organic and bacterial purity.

These results are consistent with a pure and wholesome water suitable for public supply purposes apart from slight objection that it is not quite clear and bright in appearance.
