To the Chairmen and Members of the District Councils of Epping Urban, Epping Rural and Ongar Rural Districts.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

Dr. Lucey left to take up a post at the Miristry of Health in February and in him the area has lost a remarkably able and enthusiastic Medical Officer of Health. In this report it is not possible to do more than comment briefly on some of the health statistics of the three districts for 1954.

Vital Statistics.

There was no striking change in the Birth Rates and Death Rates in the three districts compared with 1953, except for a perceptable rise in the Birth Rate and fall in the Death Rate in the Epping Rural District which, as Dr. Lucey remarked last year, probably reflects the number of young married couples in the Harlow New Town.

The figures in all three areas compare very favourably with those for the country as a whole.

Infectious and Notifiable Diseases.

There were no epidemics of infectious disease of note during the year except for a small outbreak of Infective Hepatitis, or Catarrhal Jaundice as it was formerly called, in the New Town. The disease which is infectious and has a long incubation period affected mainly children. These were excluded from school for three weeks and steps taken to impress upon members of households where cases had occurred the importance of personal hygiene.

Tuberculosis.

There were four deaths only from this disease (three in 1953), but it is encouraging that the number of new cases notified during the year fell to 23 (31 in 1953).

The control and final defeat of the disease now depends largely on the detection of the reservoir, or pool, of unknown

infectious cases, which is mainly responsible for the spread of the disease. To this end Mass Radiography and the X-Raying of contacts are of immense importance. The results of the visit of the Mass Radiography Unit to Epping in September last are given below:

The vaccination of contacts and nurses with B.C.G. Vaccine and the skin testing of children in the infants schools to detect those who have become infected, were carried on at the Chest Clinic and Schools.

The number of deaths from Cancer showed a slight fall, 93 compared with 98 in 1953, but it is noteworthy that Cancer of the lung alones continues to kill more than three times as many people as Tuberculosis in all its forms.

Poliomyelitis.

Two cases only were notified during the year; one paralytic and one non-paralytic, compared with ten cases during 1953. In the whole country also the total number of notified cases fell from 5,251 in 1953 to 2,388 in 1954.

Food Poisoning.

There was a fall in the number of cases notified in the three districts from 9 in 1953 to 4, but it is well to remember that the number of incidents of food poisoning in the whole country was higher by 50% in 1953 than in 1952.

In conclusion, Dr. Lucey would, I feel sure, wish me to express his thanks to the Chairmen and members of the Public Health Committees for their help and support during the year.

4. Vaccinations, Diphtheria and Whooping Cough Immunisations.

Immunisation against these diseases can be obtained free of charge for the children either at County Welfare Clinics or by the general practitioner, according to the preference or to suit the convenience of the parents.

5. Home and Domestic Help Service.

Applications for this service should be addressed to the Home Help Organiser at 93, High Road, Woodford, E.18 (Tel: Buckhurst 6626). A charge for this service is made according to the scales laid down by the Welfare Committee of the County Council. These scales are adjusted according to the means of the person needing help.

6. Home Nursing, Midwifery and Health Visiting.

A number of District Nurses and Midwives, employed by the Essex County Council, serve the area.

Home Visiting is carried out by the County Council's Health Visitors in the area, There are nine health visitors working in the Combined Districts.

7. Mental Health Service.

Arrangements for mental treatment on the recommendation of a general practitioner are made by one of the Duly Authorised Officers for the area (Tel: Chelmsford 2573).

8. School Health Service.

The Education Authority is the Essex County Council. School Nurses inspect the children regularly and there is a medical inspection at each school at least once a year.

9. Tuberculosis.

A Chest Clinic is held at St. Margaret's Hospital, Epping, every TUESDAY from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., every WEDNESDAY and THURSDAY afternoon from 2 to 4 p.m., and on TUESDAY afternoons from 2 to 4 p.m. contacts only are seen. On FRIDAYS from 10 to 12 a.m. patients with doctor's letters are seen by appointment. All cases are now only seen by appointment.

Forest Area Tuberculosis Care Association.

The Association assists tuberculous patients and their families in various ways, by the provision of additional milk, beds and bedding in necessitous cases - arranging convalescent holidays

for patients and children - paying the fares for relatives to visit patients in the more distant sanatoria.

It also assists patients in obtaining materials for occupational therapy and, where possible, suitable employment for those fit for work.

The Association is supported by voluntary contributions and a grant from the County Council.

The Honorary Secretary is Mr. A.J. Edwards of 37, Woodland Road, Loughton, Essex, assisted by Mr. D.H. Godwin, Chief Clerk to the Area Medical Officer, Municipal Offices, High Road, Woodford, E.18.

10. General Practitioner Medical Services.

There are approximately 25 doctors in general practice who reside in the Combined Districts. In addition there are 19 practitioners residing in adjoining districts carrying out general medical practice in this area.

REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR -EPPING URBAN DISTRICT.

1. WATER:

The general position with regard to the supply of water remains unchanged. The Herts & Essex Water Company still draw from wells at Sawbridgeworth and Roydon and Analysts Reports show that the water continues to be wholesome and satisfactory for domestic purposes. Further consideration has been given to the question of softening the supply, but no real progress has been made.

As the summer of 1954 was very far from dry there were no supply difficulties.

2. DRAINAGE & SEWERAGE:

- (a) Northern Outfall: The general condition of these works remains satisfactory. The second Screening Chamber has proved beneficial in reducing the quantity of grit and other solid matter reaching the pumping machinery. No progress has been made with regard to the disposal of dried sludge, but the bulk of this material has been reduced by burning on the site.
- (b) Southern Outfall: These works continue to function satisfactorily and good results have been obtained from samples taken by the Essex River Board.
- (c) Southern Sewerage System: Obstruction in the sewer in Stewards Green Road was found to be due to an obsolete flushing system at The Merry Fiddlers Corner. This fitting was dismantled and a large quantity of silt removed from the manhole at this point. Undoubtedly this work had a beneficial effect upon the sewer in Stewards Green Road, the flow of which had for some time been obstructed.
- (d) An extension of the sewer was laid in Centre Drive to provide drainage facilities to the new industrial site as well as to residential development in this area.

3. SCHOOLS:

Further consideration was given to finding a suitable site for a Primary School in the Ivy Chimneys Area. Objection having been received from the owner of the site originally proposed, the Urban Council was eventually able to assist by offering to the County Council a portion of their Ivy Chimneys Recreation Ground.

4. PUBLIC CLEANSING:

Despite the continual growth of the District, except for Public Holidays, regular weekly collections are maintained. Waste Paper is still collected, baled and disposed of to the Mills. Although the demand from the Mills has remained constant the response from the Public is somewhat variable, and again propaganda was necessary to stimulate interest.

Notification was received from the Epping Rural Council that facilities for tipping at Great Parndon would not be available after April 1955. Arrangements were, however, made with this Authority for the use of another Tip at Sawbridgeworth.

5. CLOSET ACCOMMODATION:

No change.

6. PUBLIC CONVENIENCES:

There was a slight decrease in the wilful damage caused to these buildings during the year. The question of the supply of paper still remains a problem and new pilfer-proof holders were installed.

7. SWIMMING BATH:

No change.

8. ERADICATION OF VERMIN:

A part-time Rodent Operative continues to deal with complaints from both private and business premises. The position in the centre of the Town remains satisfactory, but there are occasional complaints from other quarters usually found to be associated with chickens or rabbits.

9. HOUSING:

(a) <u>Urban Council Housing</u>: Steady progress has been made with the development of the Beaconfield Estate. The brick supply position eased considerably during the year and the Council was able to assist builders by ordering direct from the manufacturers.

Work was commenced on the Coronation Hill Estate and the Roads and Sewers were laid during the year.

A reduction in the annual housing allocation rendered it imprecticable to continue to use local builders with Negotiated

S.

Contracts. This Scheme which had been operating since 1946, had in the past, given satisfactory results. The release of these builders was in line with the policy to increase private enterprise housing.

All new houses were let in accordance with the Points Scheme which although now giving greater assistance to those who have for long periods lived under sub-standard conditions, still gives some preference to those who are newly married and who share inadequate accommodation. Further revisions may be made to give additional weight to "Length of Application".

(b) Chingford Development: Actual house building was commenced and by the end of the year 20 houses were completed and occupied on the Tower Estate. Work has progressed very steadily and this Estate should be completed by the end of 1955.

Although no works were started on the Beaconfield Estate, it is understood that the scheme has reached a stage where roads and sewer works will be commenced in 1955.

Difficulty is still being experienced in securing attention to repairs. The Housing Act, Repairs and Rents 1954 with its Improvement Grant and Increase in Rent provisions came into force during the year. Three Improvement Schemes by owner-occupiers were received and approved. Although a number of enquiries have been received in connection with the Increase in Rent provisions the Council was not called upon to take any action.

Again, by informal arrangements with the owners, four sub-standard houses were "Closed", after the tenants had been transferred to other accommodation.

In all cases where Statutory Notices have been served the work was carried out without resorting to Court proceedings.

(d) Clearance Area Programme: In accordance with the provisions of the Housing Repairs and Rents Act of 1954, a survey was carried out to houses which it was thought were suitable for inclusion in the Clearance Area Programme. A special Sub-Committee of the Council was appointed to consider this Report and a Five Year Programme has been prepared for submission to the Ministry. It is anticipated that the First Stage of this programme will be carried out during 1955. Finance is the principal difficulty still to be solved in dealing with the rehousing of displaced tenants. For the most part those concerned are elderly families who pay extremely low rents. Many express themselves as unable and unwilling to meet the higher rents of Council accommodation. The Housing Programme for 1955 includes one and two bedroom flats which it is hoped will assist in solving this problem.

10. INSPECTION OF FOOD:

The general standard of food premises remains satisfactory and regular inspections were made. The quantity of food condemned shows a further decline.

An investigation was made into a complaint of a foreign body found in a loaf of bread. This was alleged to be rodent excreta, but a report from two analysts found it to be "charred dough".

Meat was derationed during the year and butchers were once more allowed to make their own arrangements for slaughtering. There had been no killing in this District since the early days of the War and local slaughter houses had for the most part been converted to other purposes. A meeting of the local butchers was held when it was found that none proposed to re-open slaughter houses in the Urban Area. One firm does kill its own animals but not within this District. Others obtain their supplies from wholesalers or from Central Headquarters in the case of the multiple shops.



The Engineer & Surveyor advises that the following schemes have been submitted to the Minister and await approval:-

(i) Matching Green (in conjunction with the Epping Rural District Council).

(11) Moreton.

(iii) Fyfield and Willingale.

(iv) Beauchamp Roding.

(v) Stapleford Abbotts (in conjunction with the Romford Borough Council).

The comprehensive scheme for the sewering of the Parishes of Blackmore and Doddinghurst has still to be finalised with all the interested bodies on points of detail and on this protracted main drainage proposal the subsidiary sewering of the Parishes of Kelvedon Hatch and Stondon Massey depend.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

(a) Vehicles comprise 2 x 10 cubic yard capacity side loading collectors and 1 x 7 cubic yard. Trials have been carried out with several types of collectors resulting in the placing of an order for a Standard Dennis Paxit vehicle powered by a Deisel unit. Modernisation is the answer to our expanding needs and vehicles of this class in this particular type of District will eliminate the too frequent trips to the disposal points.

Public Cleansing (contd)

- (b) Personnel. The establishment is 8 men Foreman, 3 Driver/Loaders and 4 Loaders.
- (c) Disposal. Disposal continues at the Stondon Hall site and for the needs of the Area as at present constituted will last for a considerable period with mechanical aids. Negotiations continued for other sites in the Area to ensure continuity, also bearing in mind the possible needs of an adjoining District, and the representations made by a Borough Council to participate in the facilities available.
- (d) Street Litter Receptacles. Authority has been given to place street litter receptacles in Chipping Ongar and Abridge. The Essex County Council has agreed to empty the receptacles for a nominal sum per annum, if demanded.
- (c) Salvage. Guaranteed minimum prices and current prices continually rising demonstrates the wisdom of maintaining this phase of activity. The following comparative figures relate:-

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

Fat Factory, Stapleford Abbotts.

The removal of this Factory to an industrial area upon expiration of conditional Town Planning consent was a possibility, but the conclusion has been reached that this offensive trade will have to be accepted as a permanent industrial undertaking although its existence is not in conformity with the Metropolitan Green Belt. The owner is to submit a scheme to comply with the Council's sanitary requirements and to reduce all risks of nuisance to the least possible extent.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) Slaughterhouses.

The final result arising from Circular MF/4/45 dated 2nd February, 1954, and the Slaughterhouses Act, 1954, is that

there are 6 licensed Slaughterhouses in the Area.

An appeal against the Council's refusal to licence premises at Blackmore was won by the applicant.

Three Slaughterhouses are approved as ordinary dead-weight certification centres for pigs.

Slaughtering takes place every day of the week, but 100% inspections are and will be maintained. The following table relates to the period under review.
