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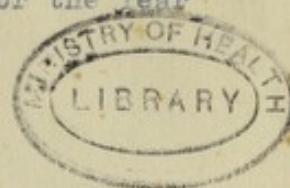

To the Chairman & Members of the Eton Urban District Council,
Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to place before you my annual report for the Year 1925. This report will be almost entirely a Statistical and Survey report, the details of conditions which do not vary from year to year, being omitted.

General Health conditions of the Urban District remains good .

Housing . There is a need of houses to replace those which are extremely old and almost beyond repair .

Inspection and Supervision of Food .

Inspection is made occasionally, there has not been any complaint to report during the year .

Meat .

There are no slaughter houses within the Urban District, but the administration of the Public Health (meat) regulations 1924, as regards the two shops, and the delivery vehicles, is being maintained .

Other Foods .

The sanitary conditions, and cleansing of bakehouses, are in order .

Hospital .

(a) Tuberculosis .

The County Council Clinic is held at Slough, which receives cases from this district, sent there by the local Medical Practitioners .

No Notification of any new case of Tuberculosis has been received during the year .

(b) Fever .

This Council is under contract with the Eton Rural District Council for the reception of fever and diphtheria cases into the Cippenham Isolation Hospital .

(c) Small Pox .

The Council's Hospital at Bell Farm, Eton Wick, which has accommodation for eight beds, is exclusively reserved for small pox .

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(d) General .

All other cases are sent to King Edward VII Hospital, Windsor, to which the Eton Urban District Council make an annual contribution .

Ambulance Facilities .

The Eton Rural District Council supplies an ambulance for the removal of fever cases, for other cases an ambulance is requisitioned from the Slough Police .

Maternity Child Welfare .

There is a centre for child welfare in this district, which is exceedingly well attended, and doing excellent work .

Laboratory Work .

The Council is under contract with the Clinical Research Association for all research work with the exception of the water supply, which I do myself .

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

Water Supply. The water supply is obtained from the Waterworks under the control of the Windsor Corporation and is a constant supply.

Rivers. No report of any pollution of the river within the Urban Area has been received during the year.

Drainage and Sewerage. All sewers gravitate to a point and the sewerage is pumped $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles outside the Urban District to the disposal farm. The disposal is on the broad irrigation system. The farm is about 45 acres in extent and the subsoil is gravel.
