To the Chairman and Members of the Eton Urban District Council.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Annual Report for the year 1940, which in accordance with the instructions of the Minister of Health, has been restricted to essential matters, more particularly the compilation of figures for record purposes.

#### SECTION B.

### Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

Water. Water is supplied throughout the District by the Windsor Corporation Waterworks which give a constant supply of good and wholesome water. The Water Company subject the water to monthly analysis.

Drainage and Sewerage. There has been an extension of the sewers, 400 yards in length to a small housing estate.

Owing to the war, the sewerage scheme is not yet working in the west ward. All sewers are laid, but the machinery requires to be fixed. At present in this Ward, the majority of the buildings drain into cesspools - houses without cesspools have pail closets, the contents of which are disposed of in the gardens.

The cesspools are emptied frequently by Contract. 627 visits to 137 cesspools were made during the year - the contents are dealt with at the sewage farm.

Rivers and Streams. The water from the River Thames was not analysed during the year. The public swimming pool in the district remained closed.

<u>Closet Accommodation</u>. With the exception of the West Ward and in outlying districts of the North Ward, all houses have the water carriage system. In the West Ward there are 138 cesspools and 24 pail closets. No conversions were carried out during the year.

Public Cleansing. The method of house refuse collection is by covered horse-drawn carts, each house being visited once weekly. In a number of cases two visits a week are made. The refuse is disposed of by incineration in the destructor at the Council's Sewage Pumping Station. In accordance with the instructions of the Minister of Supply, all salvageable articles have been collected and sold. The following articles have been collected:-

Housing. During the year no houses have been built in the area. Owing to the large influx of evacuees and refugees the accommodation in the area has been considerably strained, and it is no longer possible for the overcrowding provisions of the Housing Act to be maintained.

Milk Supply. There are 6 Supplementary milk licences issued under the Milk (Special Designations) Order 1936, in force within the District.

The Accredited milk supplied from the Council's Farm continues to be of good quality as shown by bacterial analysis.

The private cowsheds in the district are kept in a fair state of efficiency.

<u>Meat and Other Foods.</u> The meat consumed in the district is obtained from outside the district. 1 fowl, 154 lbs. beef, 28 lbs. herrings and 26 lbs. bacon were found unfit for human consumption. There were no killings within the district during the year.

Ice Cream and Preserved Foods. 21 Shops have registered for the sale and/or manufacture of ice cream and preserved foods as required by the Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

Of the 3 cases of Diphtheria, one was a "Carrier". The other two were faucial types. All were admitted to Hospital. Investigation failed to reveal the source of infection or any definite relationship between the three cases. Two were of school age and one under school age.

42 cases of Scarlet Fever were notified during the year. This is a high figure for the Urban District. Of these, 40 were boys from the College between the ages of 13 and 17, one was a maid in one of the Houses and one an evacuee from Eton Wick. The monthly incidence was as follows:- February - 5, March - 25, May - 1, June - 2, July - 2, September - 1, November - 3, December - 3. 9 were admitted to the Cippenham Isolation Hospital, consisting of the evacuee and the maid and 7 boys from the College. The remaining 33 were admitted to the College Sanatorium.

189 cases of Measles were notified during the year, of which 30 occurred in May and 159 in June and July. 185 were boys from the College, one was a baby aged 16 months and one a maid - both from College houses - two were children aged 4 and 12, one of which was an evacuee. 3 were admitted to the Isolation Hospital at Burnham.

<u>Tuberculosis</u>. During the year only one notification of Tuberculosis was received - a female pulmonary aged 27. One death was also recorded - a female non-pulmonary aged 16.

Bacteriological examinations. All laboratory work is now carried out at the Town Hall, Slough. During the year 20 swabs for Diphtheria Bacilli and 14 swabs for Haemolytic Streptococci were examined from the Eton Urban District.

Evacuation. The number of Official evacuees in the district in December 1940 was 403, consisting of 205 unaccompanied children, 57 mothers with 81 children, 11 teachers, 4 helpers and 45 other adults. Two evacuees were admitted to the Isolation Hospitals - with Scarlet Fever and Measles - and 35 to Fulmer Rise, as follows:-

Scabies 15, Chorea 1, Nits 2, Enuresis 11, Septic Sores 2, Behaviour Difficulties 2, Debility 2.
