Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1943.

To the Chairman and Members of the Eton Urban District Council Ladies and Gentlemen,

SECTION B.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

Water supply. The Windsor Corporation provide a constant supply throughout the district, which has been satisfactory both in quality and quantity. With six exceptions, all premises are on the main supply.

Drainage and Sewerage. The new sewerage scheme for the West Ward came into operation in April 1943 and 126 properties on cesspol drainage have been connected to the sewers. In addition, 6 conversions from pail closet to main drainage have been effected. There remain 138 cesspools and 18 pail closets.

Salvage. The Council has been actively engaged on salvage collection during the year. The following list shows the result of the year's efforts:-

Housing. Overcrowding has been engaging the attention of the Council during the year, but little progress has been made owing to the absence of available accommodation to rehouse the overcrowded families.

Milk Supply. There are 5 Supplementary Milk Licences in force, issued under the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936.

The milk produced at the Council's farm continues to be of good quality as shown by analysis taken by the County Council.

The Cowsheds have been regularly inspected and were found to be generally satisfactory.

Meat and Other Foods. 102 lbs. of tinned meats, vegetables, jam and fruit were found unfit for human consumption and were returned to the manufacturers or destroyed. 6 stones of fresh fish were also found to be unfit.

Ice Cream and Preserved Foods. 21 shops have registered for the sale or manufacture of ice cream and preserved foods under the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

5 cases of Scarlet Fever were notified, one case occurring during each of the following months:February, March, August, October and December. Their ages were 35, 17, 7, 4 and 18 months. One was a boy from the College and 2 were from Eton Wick. All were admitted to the Isolation Hospital.

No cases of <u>Diphtheria</u> occurred during the year. 88% of the school children have now been protected against Diphtheria by immunisation, and, excluding those under one year of age, 32% of children under 5. Two Immunisation Clinics are held weekly at the Health Centre, Burlington Road, Slough at which children from the Urban District may attend - these are held on Thursday mornings from 9.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. and Friday afternoons at 2.15 p.m. Children under 5 may also be immunised at the Infant Welfare Centre which is held at the College Arms, High Street, Eton, on the third Tuesday in each month at 2.30 p.m.

Tuberculosis. During the year one case of non-pulmonary Tuberculosis - cervical glands - was notified, a boy aged 10. One death was recorded from Tuberculous Meningitis in a youth aged 17. Evacuation. The number of Official evacuees in the district at the end of the year was 86, as follows:-Unaccompanied children 58, Mothers and Children 12, Adults 13, Teachers 3.
