Eton: This clinic which was held in the Church Hall at Eton, was closed. As most mothers and babies attending the Eton Child Welfare Clinic were patients of doctors practising in the town and these doctors moved to new purpose built premises. it was decided with their co-operation that they would undertake the child welfare work on behalf of the County Council. Such arrangements are made easier by the attachment of district nurses and health visitors to teams of general practitioners rather than operating as they did previously in districts or areas. Arrangements were made, of course, for a method of alternative care to be made available to those who were not patients of the practice concerned.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1969

WATER SUPPLY

Water to the area is supplied by the Middle Thames Water Board. A piped supply is available to the whole area and an adequate supply of water for domestic purposes has been maintained.

Sampling has been carried out at frequent intervals during the year by the Middle Thames Water Board and copies of the reports are supplied to the Council. The samples have proved satisfactory throughout the year.

Specimen samples submitted for bacteriological analysis were satisfactory and a report is set out elsewhere.

DRAINAGE AND SANITATION

Sewage has continued to be disposed of by arrangement with the Borough of Slough through their Cippenham Water Pollution Control Works.

Forty two houses and flats in the Eton Wick Redevelopment Scheme have been connected to the public sewer during the year.

The programme of cleansing of the main Eton Town sewer has been continued and subsequent inspection by means of closed circuit television equipment has been carried out. Further detailed surveys and an extension of the lengths inspected by television is planned, after which proposals for repair and alteration can be planned in association with any possible redevelopment in the area.

FOOD PREMISES

Inspection of all food preparation areas has been carried out and all premises comply with the Food Hygiene (General) Regulations 1960. No formal action has been necessary.

There are 49 premises at which food is sold or prepared and 24 of these are registered under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act 1955 for the manufacture of preserved foods and the storage and sale of ice cream. All ice cream is sold pre-packed.

REFUSE DISPOSAL

A regular weekly collection service has been maintained and the Council continues to collect refuse from trade premises.

Bulk storage containers provide facilities within the District for occupiers wishing to dispose of additional waste material.

The pulverising plant in the Borough of Slough is now fully operational and all refuse from the Urban District is treated at the plant.

RODENT CONTROL

All reported cases of infestation have been treated. Periodic inspection of the pumping stations and sewer balancing tank areas has been made and some treatment carried out.

A 10% baiting test was effected on sewers in association with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food and these proved to be negative. A two-year exemption period has therefore been granted.

HOUSING

Phases I and II of the Eton Wick Redevelopment Scheme have been completed and occupied. This has made possible the demolition of fifteen unfit houses on an adjoining site and the completion of rehousing from prefabricated bungalows followed by their demolition, together with a further seven unfit houses. This latter site will form the third stage of redevelopment which is expected to commence in 1970.
