CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES

Maternity and Child Welfare

The arrangements for child welfare clinics have continued so far as Eton is concerned at the Doctors' surgery at Eton Square.

The clinic at Eton Wick village hall was held twice monthly throughout the year.

Family Planning Clinics

The Slough Family Planning Clinic, which serves Eton as well as Slough, has continued to be very active and finds that its services are in ever greater demand. The Local Health Authority now has a duty to encourage the use of such clinics and to make contributions towards their expenses if, indeed, they do not provide the service themselves.

So far as this area is concerned, the clinic is a very good and forward looking one and it has been considered better to allow the previous administrative arrangements to remain and for payment to be made to the voluntary organisation running it.

Cervical Cytology

A clinic is held twice monthly at Burlington Road Clinic, Slough for women over 35 and for younger women who have been specially recommended by their family doctor.

Venereal Diseases Clinics

Clinics are held at the following hospitals:

King Edward VII Hospital, Windsor, Berks Hillingdon Hospital, Hillingdon, Middx. Royal Berkshire Hospital, Reading, Berks.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1970

DRAINAGE AND SANITATION

Inspections were carried out following complaints concerning obstructed and defective drainage.

Testing and supervision of remedied work was also carried out.

The programme of cleaning and inspection by T.V. cameras of the Eton Town sewer has been continued, resulting in a detailed survey of one section where several defects of a sprious nature were found. Provision has been made for the relaying of this section of the sewer.

Sixteen new houses and flats have been connected to the public sower. Two cesspools were abolished during the year, but some thirteen properties are still served by cesspools. Two of these have been combined on one new cesspool.

Sewage has continued to be disposed of by arrangement with the Slough Borough Council through their Cippenham Water Pollution Control Works via pumping stations at Eton and Eton Wick.

WATER SUPPLY

All premises in the area have a piped water supply from the Middle Thames Water Board and an adequate supply of water for all purposes has been maintained.

Regular sampling has been carried out by the Middle Thames Water Board and copies of the reports supplied to the Council. All reports have provied satisfactory throughout the year. Specimen samples submitted for chemical and bacteriological analysis were satisfactory and a report is set out elsewhere in this report.

There are two swimming baths in the area situated at Eton Wick Primary School and Eton College. Monthly samples and tests were taken and all proved satisfactory.

REFUSE DISLOSAL

A regular weekly collection service has been maintained throughout the year from all domestic premises.

The Council continues to collect refuse from trade premises and in most cases refuse is collected on a twice weekly basis.

All refuse is disposed of at the pulverising plant at Slough except during maintenance periods, when disposal is by way of controlled tipping at Hollow Hill Tip, Iver.

During the strike of Local Authorities' Manual Morkers refuse collection was maintained by the Council's refuse collectors who did not join adjoining Local Authorities' workers on strike. Disposal was at Hollow Hill Tip.

Additional waste material was collected and disposed of by the placing of bulk storage containers within the district, these being open for residents to dispose of excess material and bulky furniture. Approximately 1056 cubic yards of material was disposed of in this way.

PEST CONTROL

The bulk of pest control work in the area is concerned with the destruction of rats and mice, but the destruction of other pests, mainly wasps, has been undertaken.

All reported cases of infestation by rodents have been successfully treated. Some difficulty has been encountered with infestations of mice and the assistance of Officers of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food was sought, and with their guidance treatment proved successful.

Routine inspection and treatment has been carried out at the Council's sewage pumping stations and balancing tank.

Test baiting of sewers has continued and results have proved negative. An exemption period granted by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food is still in force. Fourteen complaints of wasps were received and treatment carried out.

A charge is made for pest control.

HOUSING

During 1970 fourteen houses were reported to the Council as unfit under the Housing Act 1957 and the occupants of five Council owned unfit houses were rehoused to make way for redevelopment of the area by wardencontrolled aged person's dwellings.

One complaint of disrepair was received, initial inspection carried out and re-inspection to secure compliance with preliminary notice served.

Work commenced on Phase III of the Eton Wick Redevelopment Scheme and the first part is now ready for occupation.

HOUSE IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

Six applications for Standard Improvement Grant were received and approved and £814 paid in grants.

Two applications for discretionary grants were received and approved and £800 paid.

COUNCIL HOUSING

Inspections were carried out for the purpose of ascertaining defects on change of tenancy and in connection with insanitary conditions and rodent control.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT

This Act makes provision for the safety, health and welfare of persons employed in offices and shops. The Act follows the pattern of the Factories Acts and the enforcement of it is divided between a number of Authorities according to the premises.

H.M. Inspector of Factories is responsible for enforcing the general provisions in premises occupied by Local Authorities together with offices in factories, whilst the Local Authorities enforce the general provisions in most other premises. The fire provisions of the Act are enforced by the Fire Authorities.

Routine general inspections have been carried out during the year. Minor contraventions were dealt with at the time of inspection.

Accidents. Section 48 of the Act requires notification of any accident which occurs in premises subject to the provisions of the Act. There have been only minor accidents during the year.

FOOD FRIMISES

The work of maintaining the standard of clean food handling in the Urban District is effected by advice on the basic principles of food hygiene to persons engaged in food premises during the course of inspection , on routine visits, of the structure of those remises and the equipment used. The Food Hygiene (General) Regulations provide the basis for this work. In addition assistance is given on the selection of equipment for kitchens, etc. There are sixty six premises on which food is prepared and sold, the type of business being divided as follows:

OUTWORKERS
