

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for 1965.

It will be seen that the health of the Borough has been most satisfactory during the year under consideration. In particular the fact that there have been no stillbirths and no deaths of infants under the age of one year is one of which we have cause to be very proud. There have, in fact, been no deaths in persons under the age of 15 years and the records show that of the total of 40 deaths occurring in people of all ages, 25 were of persons over the age of 75.
