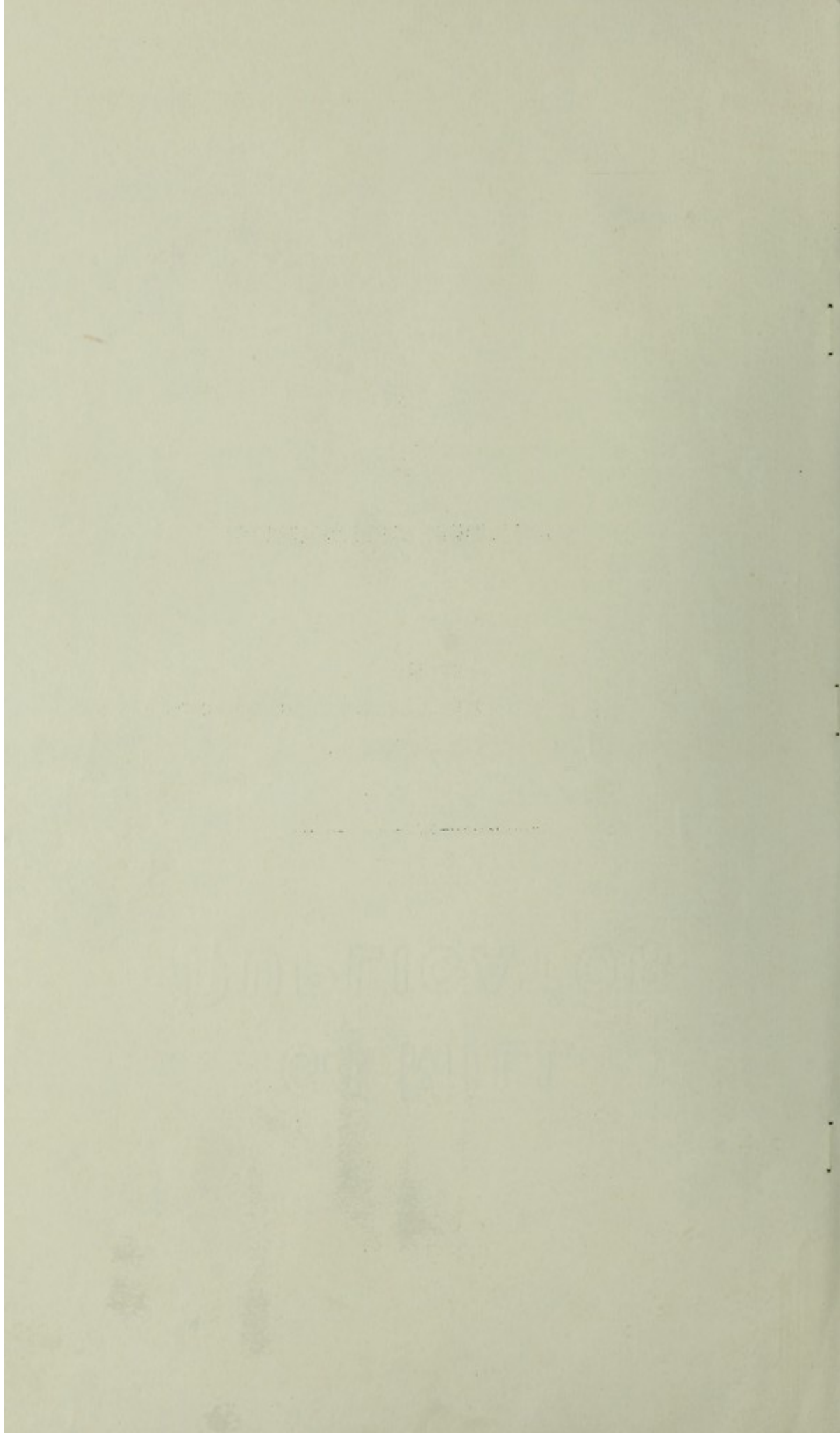

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report upon the health of the District, and the work of the Public Health Department for the year 1942.

I was appointed Medical Officer of Health in October, when Dr.A.R.Graham left for service with H.M.Forces.

The Registrar General's estimate of the population is 36,950.

The Birth Rate is 20.16 per 1,000 compared with 15.8 for England and Wales.

The Death Rate is 11.2 per 1,000 compared with 11.6 for England and Wales.

The Infant Mortality Rate is 40.0 per 1,000 live births compared with 49.0 for England and Wales.

The general health of the district is satisfactory.

SECTION B. - GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Public Health Officers:- G. Harley Ross, M.B., Ch.B., B.A.O., B.A., Medical Officer of Health. R.J. Baker, M.R.S.M.I., Chief Sanitary Inspector and Meat Inspector. Miss I.A. Gardner, Clerk. Miss J.A. Reid, Typist. Mr. E.R.R. Mengham was appointed as Additional Sanitary Inspector in May, but left again in September.

Laboratory Facilities.- The Hampshire County Council provide full facilities for Chemical and Bacteriological Examinations. Also the services of the Public Health Emergency Laboratory are available for Bacteriological Examinations.

Ambulance Facilities.

General and Accident Cases.- A motor Ambulance is provided by the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society. It is maintained by the Council. Telephone Fareham 2285. (Police). In emergency A.R.P. Ambulances are also available.

Infectious Diseases.- The Fareham Urban District Council provide an Ambulance for removal of Infectious cases.

Nursing in the Home.- Training and provision of District Nurses and Midwives is supervised by the Hampshire County Nursing Association, 81, North Wall, Winchester, Tel. Winchester 1502.

HOSPITALS.

Infectious Diseases.

The Infectious Diseases Hospital is situated in the Fareham West Ward and is the property of the Council. Cases are received from Fareham and part of the Droxford Rural District. As there is limited accommodation arrangements are made as required for treating surgical and other cases at other infectious diseases hospitals.

Tuberculosis.- Sanatorium treatment is provided by the County Council at Chandlers Ford and Bishopstoke.

Small Pox.- Accommodation for these cases is provided by the County Council.

General Hospitals.- There are none within the boundaries of the Urban District. The hospitals at Southampton, Portsmouth and Winchester are available. Necessitous cases are accommodated through the Public Assistance Committee.

Maternity.- At present, patients requiring hospital treatment go to St. Marys Hospital, Portsmouth, or in necessitous cases through Public Assistance.

SECTION C. - SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLY. - The District is supplied with water from various sources, namely:-

1. FAREHAM. - Fareham Waterworks.
2. PORTCHESTER. - The Portsmouth Waterworks Company.
3. CROFTON. - The Gosport Waterworks Company.
4. SARISBURY, TITCHFIELD and WARSASH. - The Southampton Corporation.

Fareham. - The Fareham Waterworks are the property of the Fareham Urban District Council and supply all the properties in the Fareham East and West Wards except for a few houses, which for convenience are supplied by the Gosport water mains.

The consumption of water from the Fareham Waterworks for the year was 270,552,000 an increase of 8,158,000 galls, over the previous year.

Samples of water were taken for analysis at least once a month, the results being consistently satisfactory.

Crofton, Portchester, Sarisbury, Titchfield and Warsash.

Reports on samples are periodically received and have been consistently satisfactory.

Other Supplies. - There are still a number of shallow wells existing in the Districts.

DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE.

Fareham. - The Sewage Disposal Works are still in the process of being enlarged - the work has been delayed owing to the war.

Crofton and Portchester. - Most of the residential portions of the area of these two wards have now been provided with sewers. There is still some portions of the Portchester Ward requiring sewers, but this work has been postponed owing to the war. The sewage from these two wards is brought to Fareham for treatment.

Sarisbury. - The Sewerage System for the Housing Site at Addison Road is working satisfactorily.

Titchfield. - The Sewage Works to deal with this area was found to be inadequate.

It is proposed to scrap the existing works - install larger motors and lay pumping main to a point in Ranvilles Lane, from here it will gravitate to Fareham and be dealt with at the Fareham disposal works. Tenders for the work have been accepted.

Arrangements have been made to deal with the Tannery waste from the Titchfield Tannery.

PUBLIC CLEANSING. - In the Fareham & Crofton Wards the work is done by direct labour, two S.D.Freighters being employed for this purpose. In the other Wards the work is done by Contract-Lorries being employed.

During the year the Council decided to collect house refuse and salvage once fortnightly, so that refuse and salvage are now collected on alternate weeks. This system has worked very well few complaints being received. At certain premises where considered advisable, the refuse and salvage such as bones are collected every week.

CESSPIT EMPTYING.- This work is done by direct labour S.D. Freighters being employed. The Council have five vehicles but only three drivers.

Difficulty is experienced in keeping the vehicles in servicable condition, breakdowns being frequent. Consequently there are complaints of non emptying of pits.

During the year 157 properties were connected to the sewers, making a total of 1708 premises connected since the sewers were laid in the Portchester & Crofton Wards.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.- No complaints of pollution of rivers and streams have arisen.

General Remarks.

No change from 1941.

SECTION E.- IN PECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk Supply.- There are 43 dairy farms, and 9 milk shops and stores in the District, also 19 retail purveyors of milk, 5 of whom supply milk from premises outside the District. The majority of the cowsheds are satisfactory.

Meat and other Foods.- Shops were visited as required.

Bakehouses.- Bakehouses continue to be kept in a clean and satisfactory condition. One bakehouse was removed from the register during the year.

SECTION F. - PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTION AND OTHER DISEASES.

Diphtheria.- 8 cases of Diphtheria occurred during the year, one of which was fatal.

Free supply of Diphtheria Antitoxin is available to general practitioners for early treatment of cases.

Scarlet Fever.- 62 cases of Scarlet Fever occurred of which 58 went to hospital.

Cerebro Spinal Meningitis.- 3 cases occurred during the year.

Enteric Fever.- No cases occurred during the year.

Typhoid Immunisation.- A scheme for free inoculation is in operation.

Only 56 people took advantage of inoculation.

Scabies.- This disease has been somewhat prevalent throughout the District during the year. The method of treatment has been the issue of a Lotion of Benzyl Benzoate to the public at cost price with directions for its use and the further prevention of the disease. In necessitous cases the Lotion is issued free of charge.

This method of treatment has proved so far to be effective in checking and preventing the spread of the disease.

340 bottles of lotion were issued during the year.

The questions of instituting a Scabies Clinic in Fareham or the use of the Gas cleansing (ARP) Stations in the District for the treatment of Scabies have been considered. It was decided that for the present the above distribution of Lotion and Leaflet be continued.

Immunisation against Diphtheria.- There were 8 cases of Diphtheria during the year. Only 3 of these cases occurred in children of Immunisation age. The two immunised cases were mild and recovered. The third case was not immunised and was very severe and died.

The material now used for immunisation is Alum Precipitated Toxoid (A.P.T), which is supplied free of charge from the Emergency Laboratory, Winchester.
