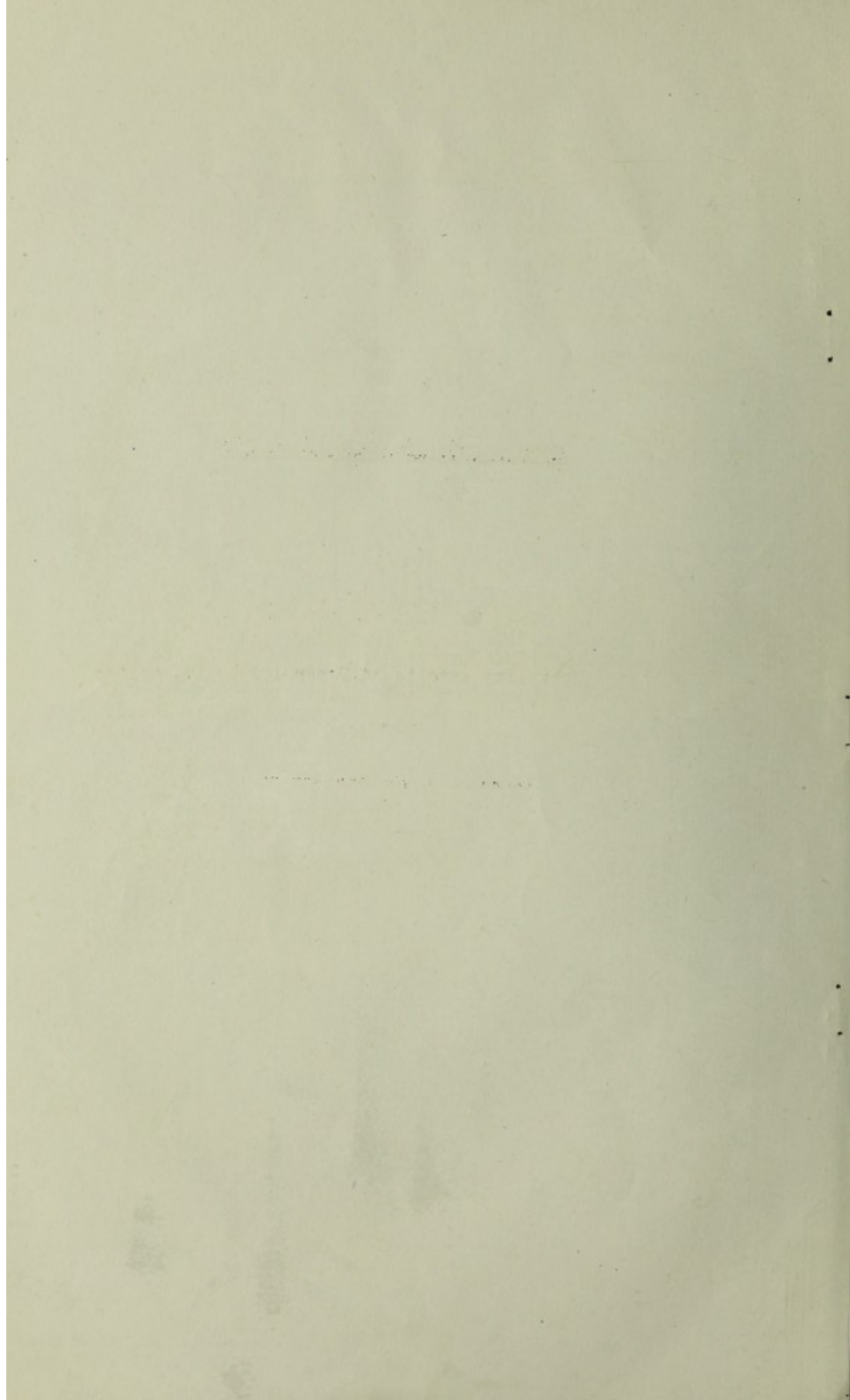

To the Chairman and Members of the  
Fareham Urban District Council.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report upon the health of the District, and the work of the Public Health Department for the year 1943.

The Registrar General's estimate of the population is 35,820.

The Birth Rate is 19.17 per 1,000 compared with 16.5 for England and Wales.

The Death Rate is 10.6 per 1,000 compared with 12.1 for England and Wales.

It is worthy of note that the Birth Rate continues to be higher than the General Rate and the Death Rate continues to be lower than the Rate for England and Wales.

The Infant Mortality Rate is 34.9 per 1,000 live births compared with 49.0 for England and Wales. This is a considerable improvement on 1942, and is one of the lowest Infant Mortality Rates in the Kingdom.

The general health of the district is satisfactory.

## SECTION B. - GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

### Public Health Officers:-

G. Harley Ross. M.B., Ch.B., B.A.O., B.A., Medical Officer of Health.

Laboratory Facilities.- The Hampshire County Council provide full facilities for Chemical and Bacteriological Examinations. Also the services of the Public Health Emergency Laboratory are available for Bacteriological Examinations.

### Ambulance Facilities.

General and Accident Cases.- A motor Ambulance is provided by the Order of St. John and the British Red Cross Society. It is maintained by the Council. Telephone Fareham 2285 (Police). In emergency A.R.P. Ambulances are also available.

Infectious Diseases.- The Fareham Urban District Council provide an Ambulance for removal of Infectious cases.

Nursing in the Home.- Training and provision of District Nurses and Midwives is supervised by the Hampshire County Nursing Association, 81, North Wall, Winchester, Tel. Winchester 1502.

## HOSPITALS.

### Infectious Diseases.

The Infectious Diseases Hospital is situated in the Fareham West Ward and is the property of the Council. Cases are received from Fareham and part of the Droxford Rural District. As there is limited accommodation arrangements are made as required for treating surgical and other cases at other infectious diseases hospitals.

Tuberculosis.- Sanatorium treatment is provided by the County Council at Chandlers Ford and Bishopstoke.

Small Pox.- Accommodation for these cases is provided by the County Council.

General Hospitals.- There are none within the boundaries of the Urban District. The hospitals at Southampton, Portsmouth and Winchester are available. Necessitous cases are accommodated through the Public Assistance Committee.

Maternity.- At present, patients requiring hospital treatment go to St. Mary's Hospital, Portsmouth.



## SECTION C. - SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLY. - The District is supplied with water from the following sources:-

Fareham Waterworks are the property of the Fareham Urban District Council, and supply all the properties in the Fareham East and West Wards, except for a few houses, which for convenience are supplied by the Gosport Water Company.

The water supply from the Fareham Waterworks is sufficient for all purposes. Samples are taken monthly and are found to be consistently satisfactory. The supply is constant and the population supplied is approximately 16,500. The water is not liable to Plumbo - Solvent action.

The amount of water pumped during the year was 280,692,000 gallons, which is an increase above the previous year of 10,140,000 gallons.

Portsmouth Water Company supply water to Portchester. The supply is satisfactory and is sufficient for all purposes. Periodical reports are received which show that this water is consistently satisfactory. The population supplied is 10,000 approximately.

Gosport Water Company supply the Crofton area. Periodical reports show this water to be of good quality. The population supplied is approximately 2,000.

Southampton Corporation supply Sarisbury, Titchfield and Warsash. Periodical reports show this water to be of good quality. The population supplied is approximately 7,000.

Some houses in these districts have not yet been connected to the Southampton Corporation Mains. There are still a number of shallow wells in use, chiefly in Sarisbury, Titchfield and Warsash Districts.

When conditions are more favourable, it is proposed to take samples from all shallow wells, and where found necessary appropriate action will be taken under the Public Health Act, to provide an assured supply from the water mains.

## DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

Fareham. - The enlargement of the Sewage Disposal Works was completed during the year.

Crofton and Portchester. - Most of the residential portions of the area of these two wards have now been provided with sewers. There is still some portions of the Portchester Ward requiring sewers, but this work has been postponed owing to the war. The sewage from these two wards is brought to Fareham for treatment.

Sarisbury. - The sewerage system for the Housing Site at Addison Road is working satisfactorily.

Titchfield. - The Sewage Works were found to be inadequate, and during the year works were carried out to pump the sewage to a gravitating sewer flowing to the Fareham Sewage Disposal Works to be dealt with at these works.

PUBLIC CLEANSING. -

In the Fareham and Crofton Wards the work is done by direct labour, two S.D. Freighters being employed for this purpose. In the other Wards the work is done by Contract, lorries being employed.

The house refuse is collected fortnightly, except in special cases, when it is collected weekly, and in some cases more frequently. Salvage is dealt with similarly. This system appears to be working satisfactorily, very few complaints being received.

CESSPIT EMPTYING. -

This work is done by direct labour, three S.D. Freighters being employed.

Difficulty is experienced in keeping the vehicles in a serviceable condition, and breakdowns are frequent, consequently complaints are made of non-emptying of cesspits.

During the year 123 properties were connected to the sewers, making a total of 1831 premises connected since the sewers were laid in the Portchester and Crofton Wards.

During the year 14 pail closets were converted to W.C's.

## RATS AND MICE DESTRUCTION ACT. 1919.

With the coming into force of the Infestation Order 1943, this Act has taken on a new lease of life. To enable concerted action to be taken between neighbouring Authorities, "Workable Areas" were constituted. Fareham and Gosport constituted a "Workable Area" and a joint Committee was formed to enable common action to be taken.

Mr.R.A.Powell was appointed as Rodent Operative, and commenced his duties on 25th October, 1943.

## SECTION E.- INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk Supply.- There are 44 dairy farms, and 9 milk shops and stores in the District, also 14 retail purveyors of milk, 5 of whom supply milk from premises outside the District. The majority of the cowsheds are satisfactory.

One pasteurisers licence was issued in respect of a process of "High Temperature Short Time" pasteurisation.

Frequent inspections were made, and samples taken have been found to be consistently satisfactory.

Meat and other Foods.- Shops were visited as required.

Bakehouses.- Bakehouses continue to be kept in a clean and satisfactory condition.

SECTION F.- PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

Diphtheria.- 4 cases occurred during the year, one of which was fatal. This case was an adult, aged 33, who contracted the disease while in the Royal South Hants and Southampton Hospital and died in the Borough Isolation Hospital, Southampton. Of the other three cases, one was an adult, aged 44, the others were children, one was immunised the other not immunised.

Scarlet Fever.- 47 cases occurred none of which were fatal. 46 cases were admitted to Hospital.

Cerebro Spinal Meningitis.- No cases occurred in the district during the year. One case - a ships cook - whose home is in Park Gate, was reported to have died in the Borough Hospital, Southampton.

Typhoid Fever.- No cases occurred during the year.

Measles.- An epidemic occurred during the spring and summer, but was of a mild type. 559 cases notified - one death.

Whooping Cough.- 62 cases notified with two deaths, both in Hospital.

Pneumonia.- 30 cases notified with 12 deaths, one in Hospital.

Scabies.- This disease is still prevalent throughout the district. The method of treatment by the issue of a lotion with directions for use and the disinfection of clothing has been continued throughout the year. Lotion (cost price 1/3) is issued by the Public Health Department, "Merton", 5, Grove Road, Fareham, and by Councillor Brown, 106, Edward Grove, Portchester, and at 73, West Street, Portchester.

The number of bottles issued during 1943 was 515. This compares with 340 bottles for five months of 1942. The demand for the lotion has declined in recent months.

In severe and protracted cases domiciliary visits are paid and lotion is issued free in necessitous cases.

Immunisation against Diphtheria.- Monthly Clinics have been held in Crofton, Fareham, Portchester, Titchfield, Sarisbury and Warsash. The material used for immunisation is Alum Precipitated Toxoid (A.P.T.), which is obtained free of charge from the Emergency Laboratory, Winchester. Two doses are given at an interval of one month between doses. Reinoculation after five years is advisable in children.

There was one case of Diphtheria in an immunised child, this case was very mild. There were no deaths among children.

The District is now well protected by Immunisation and fewer children now require protection. This reduces the number requiring treatment.
