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

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND COUNCILLORS OF THE URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

OF FAREHAM

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report of the Public Health Department for 1970. As this is my twentieth Annual Report I am placing on record some of the changes which have taken place in the Fareham Urban District in my time. The greatest change is in the population which has grown from 42,870 in 1951 to 82,000 in 1970. Fareham is still largely residential and industrial development has not kept pace with the growth in population. Ordinary movement of people has mainly contributed to the increase in numbers and there has not been any planned overspill from the nearby cities.

Since 1951 Fareham has become a Food and Drugs Authority assuming responsibility for the good condition of both food shops and food substances. The general public take full advantage of the Statutory provisions of the Food and Drugs Act and following complaints the Health Department and Council on many occasions institute proceedings in the Courts. When the Government sited their large Abattoir at Funtley this Council became responsible for the meat inspection there. With a throughput of about a quarter of a million animals each year seven inspectors are required full time for the inspection.

Drainage of the rapidly developing district has presented many difficulties. The greatest achievement in sewage disposal came with the Western Wards Scheme which gave water borne drainage to Sarisbury, Warsash, Locks Heath and the unsewered part of Titchfield Wards. Extension of the drainage systems in Fareham Town itself was also a major scheme, and the Sewage Works had considerable improvements carried out in 1958. Storm water drainage was undertaken in Portchester, Stubbington and North Fareham and gave some relief to the foul drainage systems. However, with the ever increasing numbers of new homes, the drainage systems are now proving inadequate and in 1970 the Council decided on the strict limitation of further housing development. House improvement under the Housing Acts especially the installation of bathrooms and hot water systems in the old houses has also contributed to the drainage problem.

Central Government seems to be determined on Local Government re-organisation and consequently Fareham's application for delegated powers in Education and Health and Welfare are not likely to be implemented. The trend is for larger Authorities but local participation will suffer as a result.

The number of live births registered 1,327 gives a birth rate of 16.2 per 1,000 population which is exactly the same figure as for 1969. The number of deaths registered 690 gives a death rate of 8.4 per 1,000 population and is the lowest ever recorded here. The infant mortality rate of 8 deaths under 1 year per 1,000 live births is also the lowest figure on record. Diseases of the heart and blood vessels were responsible for 377 deaths and 187 were attributed to Coronary disease. Malignant Diseases caused 134 deaths, with 33 deaths from Cancer of the Lung and Bronchus.

Immunisation against the following infectious diseases is available, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, Smallpox, Tuberculosis, Anterior Poliomyelitis, Measles and Rubella or German Measles. Vaccination against Rubella is offered to girls within the 11-13 year age group as the disease can lead to congenital defects in infants whose mothers contract Rubella in the early months of pregnancy. The Council Staff were offered vaccination against influenza and 69 were vaccinated.

I should like to express my gratitude to Mr. D.E.C. Hayward, Chief Public Health Inspector, both for the details of the work carried out by the Public Health Inspectors and for his very valuable assistance at all times.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the Council, in particular the Chairman and members of the Health Committee, for their keen interest in the Department, the Chief Officers for their co-operation, and all the staff of this Department for their high standard of work throughout the year

Section II

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES

IN THE AREA

(a) Laboratory Facilities

Full facilities are available through the Public Health Laboratory Service for the bacteriological examination of water supplies and other investigations. Chemical examinations are done by arrangement with the Public Analyst, Portsmouth.

(b) Ambulance Facilities

Requests for ambulance transport in the area are dealt with by the Central Ambulance Control, Winchester. (Telephone Winchester 61644).

The County Council has an agreement with the City of Portsmouth whereby all calls for the removal of infectious cases are passed to the latter authority's ambulance service for attention.

(c) Clinics

(d) Vaccination

Vaccination against Smallpox is carried out by General Medical Practitioners and at some Child Welfare Centres free of charge under the National Health Services Act, 1946.

NOTE: Parents are advised to have their children vaccinated preferably in the second year of life.

(e) Hospitals

Apart from the Geriatric Unit at St. Christopher's Hospital, there are no general hospitals in the Urban District. At present, hospital services are available at Portsmouth, Southampton and Winchester; the nearest is at Cosham five miles away. Infectious disease cases are sent to hospitals for infectious diseases at Portsmouth and Southampton. Most of the cases requiring hospital confinements are sent to Blackbrook Maternity Home, Fareham, but quite a number from the district are admitted to Saint Mary's Hospital, Portsmouth.

Special hospital facilities are provided for Smallpox.

Treatment for Tuberculosis is available at Bishopstoke and Southampton Chest Hospital.

SANITARY CONDITIONS OF THE AREA

1. Water Supply

The Urban District is supplied by two large water companies - the Portsmouth Water Company and the Southampton Waterworks. The number of houses and the approximate number of persons supplied in the different Wards are as follows:-

- (a) Portsmouth Water Company supplying Fareham 11,985 houses - 35,845 population
- (b) Portsmouth Water Company supplying Portchester 4,656 houses - 13,948 population
- (c) Portsmouth Water Company supplying Crofton 2,946 houses - 8,796 population
- (d) Southampton Waterworks supplying Locks Heath, Sarisbury, Titchfield and Warsash 5,999 houses - 24,000 population

The Portsmouth Water Company take frequent water samples for both bacteriological and chemical analysis at their laboratory, and this Department also takes regular weekly samples of water for bacteriological examination. The Laboratory reports show that a very high standard of bacteriological purity in the water is maintained.

2. Drainage and Sewerage

The Sewerage Works at Salterns, Fareham, is still grossly overloaded due to the increase in population and the increased water consumption per head of population.

To avoid further deterioration of the situation a general ban on the granting of further planning approvals for residential development in areas draining to the Salterns Works has been agreed by the Local Planning Authority.

In the meantime, new Consulting Engineers have been appointed by the Council to prepare a scheme to deal with the whole problem of sewage disposal within the Urban District.

3. Refuse Collection

The refuse collection service provided is very satisfactory.

Modern, high-capacity, compression type collection vehicles are used which are almost dustless in operation.

6. SHOPS ACT, 1950

Thirty-eight visits were made to new shops or to premises where a change of occupier had occurred. Stocks of the relevant notices are retained in the Department for sale to shop occupiers.

7. OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

REGISTRATIONS:

The total number of premises registered under the Act is 546 of which 391 were inspected during the year. There were only 27 new registrations, which probably indicates an unawareness of the need to register by employers. A survey of all premises in the district would be necessary to bring the register up to date and this would not be possible without additional staff.

NOTIFICATIONS:

Most of the thirteen accidents reported were caused by falls or minor injuries to hands while handling goods. One accident with a food slicer was investigated and it was found that the guard had been removed from the machine by an employee to speed up the work. Fortunately the injury was not serious and instructions were issued by the management to prevent removal of guards.

A free handout booklet on the "Safe Use of Slicing Machines" has proved very useful.

8. CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960

Nine licences were in operation during the year in respect of sites in the area, permitting the siting of 169 residential caravans and 256 holiday caravans.

Twenty-one individual site licences are in operation. There are, in addition, a number of caravans in the area which are, by virtue of exemptions provided in the Act, not subject to planning permission or site licence.

9. PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951 AND ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1963

During the year five licences were issued under the Pet Animals Act. One new licence was issued and eleven licences renewed under the Animal Boarding Establishments Act.

Six samples were criticised under the Labelling of Food Orders and in each case arrangements were made to alter the wording on the label to comply with the law.

Six samples of bread containing foreign bodies were examined, two containing oil, one containing string and one containing an unstruck match were not proceeded with, while prosecutions were instituted in the cases of a hairpin and a piece of glass. The former prosecution was successful but the latter case was lost because the prosecution failed to prove that the glass was baked in the bread. Three cases of mouldy flour confectionery were also successfully prosecuted and one was lost due to the absence of analytical evidence. Ginger beer which contained non permitted cyclamate was withdrawn from sale, as was a cask of South African sherry which contained an excessive amount of invert sugar. A successful prosecution for a can of beer contaminated by lacquer solvents caused the rejection of thousands of unfilled cans at the brewery.

MEAT INSPECTION

The senior Meat Inspector reports as follows :-

The Meat inspection staff at the now privately owned slaughterhouse give a service for 56 hours a week and are always present when slaughtering is in operation, maintaining one hundred per cent inspection.

The number of animals slaughtered at Funtley Abattoir during 1970 again showed a substantial increase, but despite additional overtime work at the weekend a hundred per cent inspection has been maintained.

A number of inspections were carried out by veterinary officers of the Ministry to insure that the premises were up to the standards required by the European Economic Council's regulations. If Funtley is to remain on the list of approved slaughterhouses for export of meat to the continent certain structural allerations to the slaughtering lines will be necessary and additional equipment will have to be installed. Most of the works necessary were still outstanding at the end of the year.

To maintain satisfactory standards of hygiene in the abattoir constant supervision by inspectors is always necessary. Animals presented for slaughter were often in a dirty condition making it very difficult for operators to keep their hands and clothing clean.

With the increase in throuthput the premises were often overloaded resulting in finished carcases having to be hung in passages and sometimes in the slaughtering area. If the present throughput is maintained additional chilling space will be necessary.

2. DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION

No confirmed case of Diphtheria was notified here in 1970. The antigen against Diphtheria is combined with that against Whooping Cough and Tetanus and the age recommended for immunisation is six months. Parents are invited to take their children to their nearest clinic or, if they prefer, to their family doctor. In both cases the service can be carried out free of charge under the National Health Service.

Immunisation was carried out during 1970 at the Child Welfare Clinics at Fareham, Hill Park, Locks Heath, Portchester, Sarisbury, Stubbington and Warsash. Immunisation clinics giving reinoculations were also held at eight local Authority schools.

In all, 6,418 children were immunised during the year, as follows:


