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

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND COUNCILLORS OF THE URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL OF FAREHAM

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report of the Public Health Department for 1971.

The upward trend in population continued and the Registrar General's estimated population 83,570 showed an increase of 1,570. The Census taken in April, 1971 gave a figure of 80,296 which showed an increase of 21,988 since 1961. The natural increase or excess of births over deaths for 1971 was 645. The number of births registered 1,359 gave a birth rate of 16.3 per 1,000 population and was higher than that of 16.0 per 1,000 for England and Wales.

The crude death rate of 8.5 per 1,000 population was a remarkably low one and compared very favourably with that of 11.6 per 1,000 population for England and Wales. The infant mortality rate of 13.0 per 1,000 live births was lower than the figure of 18.0 per 1,000 live births for England and Wales. Diseases of the heart and blood vessels were responsible for 372 deaths and 174 were due to coronary disease, malignant diseases caused 162 deaths which include the unnecessarily large number of 44 deaths from cancer of the lung and bronchus.

We live in an era of change and in 1971 we saw the creation of a County Department of Social Services. This new department took over the administration of the former Welfare, Mental Health, Home Help and the Children's Department Services. Still greater changes will come in 1974 with the Reform of both the Local Government and the National Health Services. More centralisation will inevitably result and the services provided will become more impersonal.

Owing to the drainage difficulties the ban on housing development continues throughout the whole district. This has led to an increased demand for any available accommodation in Fareham. Housing the older citizens has been helped by the construction of council flats for them and the appointment of a warden for every group of thirty six flats is a welcome move.

Control of infectious diseases is an important part of the Health Departments work. The incidence of cholera in Spain during the Summer led to our interviewing the people who had been on holiday there. Persons who did not possess valid international certificates of vaccination against cholera required surveillance. In all 54 people were involved but none developed cholera.

Inspection of the sanitation in Schools which had been carried out in 1968 was repeated during the Autumn of 1971. The increase in school population and the addition of temporary classrooms without the provision of extra toilets and washing facilities gave rise to another unsatisfactory report. Unless good personal hygiene can be practised in schools, health education in later life becomes increasingly difficult.

I should like to express my gratitude to Mr. D.E.C. Hayward, Chief Public Health Inspector, both for the details of the work carried out by the Public Health Inspectors and for his very valuable assistance at all times.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the Council, in particular the Chairman and members of the Health Committee, for their keen interest in the Department, the Chief Officers for their co-operation, and all the staff of this Department for their high standard of work throughout the year.

Section II

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES

IN THE AREA

(a) Laboratory Facilities

Full facilities are available through the Public Health Laboratory Service for the bacteriological examination of water supplies and other investigations. Chemical examinations are done by arrangement with the Public Analyst, Portsmouth.

(b) Ambulance Facilities

Requests for ambulance transport in the area are dealt with by the Central Ambulance Control, Winchester. (Telephone Winchester 61644).

The County Council has an agreement with the City of Portsmouth whereby all calls for the removal of infectious cases are passed to the latter authority's ambulance service for attention.

(c) Clinics

The following services in connection with tuberculosis, maternity and child welfare, orthopaedics, etc., are provided by the County Council and the Regional Hospital Board at clinics and treatment centres in the area:

(d) Vaccination

Vaccination against Smallpox is carried out by General Medical Practitioners and at some Child Welfare Clinics free of charge under the National Health Services Act, 1946.

NOTE: Parents are advised to have their children vaccinated preferably in the second year of life.

(e) Hospitals

Apart from the Geriatric Unit at St. Christopher's Hospital, there are no general hospitals in the Urban District. At present, hospital services are available at Portsmouth, Southampton and Winchester; the nearest is at Cosham five miles away. Infectious disease cases are sent to hospitals for infectious diseases at Portsmouth and Southampton. Most of the cases requiring hospital confinements are sent to Blackbrook Maternity Home, Fareham, but quite a number from the district are admitted to Saint Mary's Hospital, Portsmouth.

Special hospital facilities are provided for Smallpox.

Treatment for Tuberculosis is available at Bishopstoke and Southampton Chest Hospital.

(f) Homes for the Aged

The Hampshire County Council provide residential accommodation for 48 aged persons at Uplands, Park Lane, Fareham.

Section 111

SANITARY CONDITIONS OF THE AREA

1. Water Supply

The Urban District is supplied by two large water companies - the Portsmouth Water Company and the Southampton Waterworks. The number of houses and the approximate number of persons supplied in the different Wards are as follows:-

- (a) Portsmouth Water Company supplying Crofton 3,137 houses 9,065 population
- (b) Portsmouth Water Company supplying Fareham 12,195 houses - 36,822 population
- (c) Portsmouth Water Company supplying Portchester 4,680 houses - 14,149 population
- (d) Southampton Waterworks supplying Locks Heath, Sarisbury, Titchfield and Warsash 6,132 houses - 24,528 population

The Portsmouth Water Company take frequent water samples for both bacteriological and chemical analysis at their laboratory, and this Department also takes regular weekly samples of water for bacteriological examination. The Laboratory reports show that a very high standard of bacteriological purity in the water is maintained.

2. Drainage and Sewerage

The very unsatisfactory conditions at the Sewerage Works were reported on in last years Annual Report and the restrictions on new buildings continue. The Consulting Engineers are preparing a scheme which it is hoped will deal with all the problems. The blood from Funtley Abattoir which formerly went to Farehams sewers damaging both the sewers and the sewerage works is now treated in a blood dewatering plant at the Abattoir and several tons of a very useful product are salvaged each week.

3. Refuse Collection

The refuse collection service provided is very satisfactory.

Modern, high-capacity, compression type collection vehicles are used which are almost dustless in operation.

6. SHOPS ACT, 1950

7. OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

REGISTRATIONS :-

There were 51 new registrations during the year making the total number of premises registered under the Act 592 of which 461, were inspected. A survey of all premises in the district would be necessary to bring the register up to date and this would not be possible without additional staff.

NOTIFICATIONS :-

There were twelve notified accidents during the year affecting eight men and four women. The majority of them were caused by the handling of goods or by falls. One man was hurt by a broom being wielded by a workmate and another unfortunate man reversed an electric hand trolley onto his own feet.

8. CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960

Seven licences were in operation during the year in respect of sites in the area, permitting the siting of 132 residential caravans and 244 holiday caravans.

Twenty-two individual site licences are in operation. There are, in addition, a number of caravans in the area which are, by virtue of exemptions provided in the Act, not subject to planning permission or site licence.

Dibles Road, Warsash. Progress on policy in connection with the provision of a Council Caravan Site permitted work to start. Some progress was made toward the provision of standings for 40 residential caravans. The site will also cater for a maximum of 22 touring caravans and should be in use during the latter half of 1972.

9. PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951 AND ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1963

During the year six licences were issued under the Pet Animals Act. Nine licences were renewed under the Animal Boarding Establishments Act.

The Public Analyst criticised samples of biscuits and fruit drinks under the Labelling of Food Orders and some lengthy correspondence and interviews took place with the manufacturers. Understandably a manufacturer is wary of altering his label unless he can be certain that a different interpretation of the Labelling Order is not going to be made by another authority. In each case mentioned an agreement was reached to alter the labels on reprinting. Criticism of the claim that barley wine was "as strong as a double scotch" was not acceptable to the manufacturers, and the Public Analyst is consulting other expert opinion before a serious challenge of the validity of the claim is made.

Foreign bodies in various foods and mouldy foodstuffs were the cause of many complaints. One case in which the complainant damaged a tooth on a stone in a malt loaf was successfully prosecuted.

A well known brand of indigestion powder was deficient of sodium bicarbonate to the astonishment of the manufacturers. The discrepancy had been caused by a new vacuum filling process which had separated the ingredients after they had been mixed. The fault was remedied by an adjustment of the filling rate. A sample of crabmeat containing excess of zinc caused considerable concern to the importers and samples of crabs were flown from the country of origin for analysis. A full report has been prepared and the Ministry have been consulted. The outcome of a very prolonged and detailed investigation has yet to be finalised.

These two latter cases illustrate the value of routine sampling and the willingness of reputable traders to comply with the law.

MEAT INSPECTION

The Senior Meat Inspector reports as follows :-

The number of animals slaughtered at Funtley Abattoir during 1971 again showed a substantial increase, mainly due to a rise in the number of sheep slaughtered. As in previous years one hundred per cent inspection has been carried out.

Charges for meat inspection services were increased by approximately forty per cent in October. Charges had not been changed since 1963.

The slaughterhouse was granted its licence to export to some of the Common Market Countries, but only after major structural alterations to the slaughtering lines, and the provision of a small casualty slaughterhouse for animals suspected of being diseased. Improvements to changing rooms and showers were necessary, and additional foot operated wash basins were provided. Further work on the pig slaughtering area remained outstanding at the end of the year.

Alterations to the dressing lines have resulted in a faster and bigger throughput, but the premises frequently become overloaded resulting in finished carcases being left overnight outside the chillers. Chilling and hanging facilities have been inadequate for a number of years, and with the present large throughput consideration should be given to providing additional chilling arrangements and hanging space.

Facilities are provided for the jointing of pig carcases in a suitable cutting room, but no provision has been made for the breaking down of beef carcases. The existing practice of preparing and jointing beef carcases in the main passage-way and on the loading bay is far from satisfactory, as these areas are in constant use for other purposes. The mangement has been informed of the unsatisfactory arrangements prevailing in the cutting of beef, but no improvements have been made.

Student Public Health Inspectors from other authorities continue to use the facilities available for training in meat inspection, and colleges and schools regularly collect specimens from the abattoir.

2. DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION

No confirmed case of Diphtheria was notified here in 1971. The antigen against Diphtheria is combined with that against Whooping Cough and Tetanus and the age recommended for immunisation is six months. Parents are invited to take their children to their nearest clinic or, if they prefer, to their family doctor. In both cases the service can be carried out free of charge under the National Health Service.

Immunisation was carried out during 1971 at the Child Welfare Clinics at Fareham, Hill Park, Locks Heath, Portchester, Sarisbury, Stubbington and Warsash. Immunisation clinics giving reinoculations were also held at eight local authority schools.

In all, 3,619 children were immunised during the year, as follows:

While the patients who had recovered clinically were allowed to return to school, faecal specimens were taken from them until they produced negative results. No further cases occurred after the summer holiday. Special attention to personal hygiene and the cleanliness of toilets helped to control the outbreak.
