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

# TO THE CHAIRMAN AND COUNCILLORS OF THE URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL OF FAREHAM

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report of the Public Health Department for 1972.

While the population continues to grow in numbers the increase in 1972 has been the lowest since 1961. The Registrar General's estimated population 84,890 showed an increase of 1,320 and the natural increase or the excess of births over deaths was 499. The number of births registered 1,244 gave a birth rate of 14.7 per 1,000 population which was just lower than that of 14.8 per 1,000 population for England and Wales.

The crude death rate of 8.8 per 1,000 population still remained well below that of 12.1 per 1,000 population for England and Wales. The infant mortality rate of 14.0 per 1,000 live births was also lower than the figure of 17.0 per 1,000 live births for England and Wales. Diseases of the heart and blood vessels were responsible for 373 deaths and of that number 195 were attributed to coronary disease. Malignant diseases caused 173 deaths with cancer of the lung and bronchus giving rise to 42 deaths.

The year showed a low incidence of infectious diseases. This resulted from the use of the very effective vaccines now available against most of the communicable diseases. Both scarlet fever and infective hepatitis were more prevalent than usual and so far vaccines against those two diseases are not available.

I should like to express my gratitude to Mr. D.E.C. Hayward, Chief Public Health Inspector, both for the details of the work carried out by the Public Health Inspectors and for his very valuable assistance at all times.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the Council, in particular the Chairman and members of the Health Committee, for their keen interest in the Department, the Chief Officers for their co-operation, and all the staff of this Department for their high standard of work throughout the year.

#### GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES

# IN THE AREA

#### (a) Laboratory Facilities.

Full facilities are available through the Public Health Laboratory Service for the bacteriological examination of water supplies and other investigations. Chemical examinations are done by arrangement with the Public Analyst, Portsmouth.

#### (b) Ambulance Facilities.

Requests for ambulance transport in the area are dealt with by the Central Ambulance Control, Winchester. (Telephone Winchester 61644).

The County Council has an agreement with the City of Portsmouth whereby all calls for the removal of infectious cases are passed to the latter authority's ambulance service for attention.

#### (c) Clinics.

(d) Vaccination.

Vaccination against Smallpox is carried out by General Medical Practitioners and at some Child Welfare Clinics free of charge under the National Health Services Act, 1946.

NOTE: Parents are advised to have their children vaccinated preferably in the second year of life.

(e) Hospitals.

Apart from the Geriatric Unit at St. Christopher's Hospital, there are no general hospitals in the Urban District. At present, hospital services are available at Portsmouth, Southampton and Winchester; the nearest is at Cosham five miles away. Infectious disease cases are sent to hospitals for infectious diseases at Portsmouth and Southampton. Most of the cases requiring hospital confinements are sent to Blackbrook Maternity Home, Fareham, but quite a number from the district are admitted to Saint Mary's Hospital, Portsmouth.

Special hospital facilities are provided for Smallpox.

Treatment for Tuberculosis is available at Bishopstoke and Southampton Chest Hospital.

(f) Homes for the Aged.

The Hampshire County Council provide residential accommodation for forty eight aged persons at Uplands, Park Lane, Fareham.

#### Section 111

#### SANITARY CONDITIONS OF THE AREA

#### 1. Water Supply.

The Urban District is supplied by two large water companies - the Portsmouth Water Company and the Southampton Waterworks. The number of houses and the approximate number of persons supplied in the different Wards are as follows:-

- (a) Portsmouth Water Company supplying Crofton 3,213 houses 9,293 population
- (b) Portsmouth Water Company supplying Fareham 12,487 houses 37,698 population
- (c) Portsmouth Water Company supplying Portchester 4,688 houses - 14,173 population
- (d) Southampton Waterworks supplying Locks Heath, Sarisbury, Titchfield and Warsash 6,215 houses - 24,860 population

The Portsmouth Water Company take frequent water samples for both bacteriological and chemical analysis at their laboratory, and this Department also takes regular weekly samples of water for bacteriological examination. The Laboratory reports show that a very high standard of bacteriological purity in the water is maintained.

#### 2. Drainage and Sewerage.

At long last something is likely to be done to relieve the overloaded sewers and sewage works. The scheme prepared by the Consulting Engineers is in two parts and Part One is due to start early in 1973. The restrictions on new buildings still continue.

#### 3. Refuse Collection.

The refuse collection service is satisfactory. Modern, high-capacity, compression type collection vehicles are used which are almost dustless in operation.

#### 6. SHOPS ACT, 1950.

#### REGISTRATIONS :-

There were forty two new registrations during the year making the total number of premises registered under the Act six hundred and one of which four hundred and fifty were inspected.

#### NOTIFICATIONS :-

Seventeen accidents were reported. Seven of these happened while handling goods and resulted in strained muscles and minor injuries. Five resulted in cut fingers and thumbs when using knives or slicing machines, in one case the guard had been removed by the operator. The remainder were caused by falls of one kind or another except for one case of scalding when making the tea.

#### 8. CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960.

Seven licences were in operation during the year in respect of sites in the area, permitting the siting of one hundred and forty nine residential caravans and two hundred and forty four holiday caravans.

Twenty-two individual site licences were in operation, two individual site licences expired during the year. There are, in addition, a number of caravans in the area which are, by virtue of exemptions provided in the Act, not subject to planning permission or site licence.

Dibles Road, Warsash. The municipal site opened in August and its complement of forty residential standings were quickly occupied.

The Public Analyst criticised the labelling of several samples. Instant Fruit Tea contained no tea solids. Low Sugar Strawberry Jam contained an undeclared potassuim salt and Dietade Apricots displayed an inaccurate carbohydrate declaration. Vitaminised Tablets for protection against sunburn provided large doses of Vitamin A which some medical opinion viewed as dangerous particularly in pregnancy. Reference was made to the Pharmaceutical Society and the Committee for Safety of Medicines but it became obvious that medical opinions were in conflict.

The usual crop of foreign bodies in various types of food were examined and prosecutions were made for a piece of plastic in a steak and kidney pie, glass in gravy mix, wire in sausages, insect faeces and webbing in marzipan sweets, a fly in a chicken and bacon pie, a piece of metal in another meat pie, cigarette filter tip in prunes and a metal ring in canned fruit. Several other cases of mouldy foods were also successfully prosecuted. In most cases the manufacturers explained the care taken to avoid such occurrences but mistakes and accidents are inevitable and these complaints will continue. A prosecution for snails in blackcurrant jam was lost on a technical point but another local authority made contact with us shortly afterwards and eventually successfully prosecuted the firm.

One complainant produced cauliflower heads which had turned bright yellow on cooking but this was found to be through natural causes. Another resident was alarmed when the Sunday joint and roast potatoes turned bright blue. He suspected the new cooker which had many failings apparently, but analysis proved the presence of indelible ink, possibly from the butchers pencil or ballpen.

#### MEAT INSPECTION

The Senior Meat Inspector reports as follows :-

The total number of animals slaughtered at Funtley Abattoir during 1972 showed a slight decrease over the previous year, but with more beef being exported to the continent the number of cattle slaughtered showed approximately a twenty per cent increase.

The slaughterhouse was granted its licence to export, but some structural alterations to the slaughtering lines were still outstanding at the end of the year. Even with the improvements brought about by electro-mechanical hoists and rails there is still far too much man handling and over-loading of the pig line during slaughtering and dressing operations. With this line capable of rates of two hundred and fifty pigs per hour complete mechanisation must be completed if the premises are to comply with hygiene regulations.

Chilling and hanging facilities for a maximum daily kill have been inadequate for a number of years, with the result that carcases are often hung overnight in the pre-cooling area and slaughterhall. If the internal heat of carcases is to be dispersed rapidly and bacterial growth controlled it is essential that carcases should be removed to chilling rooms as quickly as possible.

It has been necessary to draw the attention of the firm to the bad practice of operators moving from the dirty end to the clean end in line dressing of animals, as this can lead to contamination of the finished carcases. Rapid throughputs and high standards of hygiene can be maintained provided the labour force is employed in the correct manner with cleansing and sterilizing equipment at convenient points.

Staff engaged on meat inspection have had to cover a slaughtering week of fifty five hours with additional overtime work at the week-end. Despite these long hours of operation a hundred per cent inspection has been maintained.

Reviewing statistics of animal disease as revealed in the table appended, it is gratifying to record a downward trend over the past years, but the old problems of fluke in cattle and abscesses in pigs still remain.

#### 2. DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

No confirmed case of Diphtheria was notified here in 1972. The antigen against Diphtheria is combined with that against Whooping Cough and Tetanus and the age recommended for immunisation is six months. Parents are invited to take their children to their nearest clinic or, if they prefer, to their family doctor. In both cases the service can be carried out free of charge under the National Health Service.

Immunisation was carried out during 1972 at the Child Welfare Clinics at Fareham, Hill Park, Locks Heath, Portchester, Sarisbury, Stubbington and Warsash. Immunisation clinics giving reinoculations were also held at eight local authority schools.

In all, 2,240 children were immunised during the year, as follows:
