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

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee.

Gentlemen,

Like the two previous reports, the present one is, on the instruction of the Ministry of Health, abbreviated, and gives a mere outline of the work done during the year.

In spite of war conditions all the medical services of the town were maintained on a peace-time level.

The vital statistics for 1941 contain two outstanding features—the one pleasing, and the other rather disquieting.

The Infant Mortality Rate of 43.6 is not only the lowest on record for Farnworth, but, for the first time in the history of the town, is lower than the general rate for England and Wales, which is 59.

On the other hand, the fact that 33 babies were born dead, against an average of 17 for the previous 5 years, would seem to indicate that the present time of stress and strain is adversely affecting the health of expectant mothers. I do not know at the moment whether other districts have a similar story to tell. If the still-birth rate has shown a general rise, there would appear to be an urgent need for investigation.

HOSPITALS FOR INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

(1) Smallpox.

The arrangements which have existed for many years with Ainsworth Hospital for the reception of cases of smallpox still hold, but as that hospital has now been taken over by the Government for the treatment of cases of minor infectious disease occurring in billeted households for war evacuees, Ainsworth has arranged for any cases from Farnworth to be received temporarily at Astley Sanatorium.

(2) Other Infectious Diseases.

Salford Corporation, with whom arrangements exist for the admission of cases of infectious disease (other than smallpox) to Ladywell, have (owing to the closing of Ladywell) had to make arrangements with neighbouring hospitals. These arrangements have proved satisfactory. In addition, Bolton Corporation has helped us over a difficult time by admitting a proportion of our cases to Hulton Lane.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) MILK SUPPLY.

There are 11 dairy farms in the district with approximately 215 cows. The farms are inspected at frequent intervals for sanitary defects. They are all provided with dairies which have no communication with other buildings.

EXAMINATION OF MILK SAMPLES.

11 samples were examined during the year, 5 of which were bacteriologically unsatisfactory. Tubercle bacilli was not found in any of the samples.

(b) MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

All premises where food is stored or exposed for sale are inspected at regular intervals. During the year the following food was condemned and surrendered: 1130 lbs. beef, 488 lbs. lamb, 120 lbs. pork, 56 lbs. carrots, 112lbs. potatoes, 1059 tins of various foods.

(c) ADULTERATION OF FOOD.

The County Council are the Authority under the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts, and samples are taken by the County Sanitary Inspector in collaboration with the local Sanitary Inspector.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

DIPHTHERIA.

19 cases of diphtheria (including 2 Bolton cases from Townleys Hospital) were notified during the year, against an average of 31 for the previous 5 years. There were 3 deaths, in none of which cases had the child been immunised.

DIPHTHERIA ANTITOXIN.

Antitoxin is provided by the Council free of charge for patients residing within the district. A supply is always available for medical practitioners, and is supplied in phials of 8,000 and 10,000 units and 1,000 units, the two former for curative and the latter for prophylactic purposes.

During 1941 antitoxin to the amount of 208,000 units was issued to medical men.

ACTIVE IMMUNISATION AGAINST DIPHTHERIA.

An immunisation clinic was held weekly during the year, and much propaganda work was undertaken.

The following table shows the number of children who were fully protected during the year: —

There was one case of diphtheria notified in an immunised child.

SCARLET FEVER.

During the year 69 cases (including 2 Bolton cases from Townleys Hospital) were notified, against an average of 95 per year for the previous five years. There were no deaths.

PNEUMONIA.

Of the notifiable varieties 27 cases were reported, while the average number during the previous five years was 65 per year.

PUERPERAL PYREXIA.

25 cases were notified during the year, only 7 of which belonged to Farnworth; the remainder were notified from Townleys Hospital and belonged to outside districts.

CEREBRO SPINAL FEVER.

Of the 6 cases notified, only 1 was a Farnworth case.

OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM.

There were 12 cases notified during 1941. Only 3 of these were Farnworth cases. All made a satisfactory recovery.

SCABIES.

In common with other districts, a large number of cases of scabies occurred during the year.

These were mostly confined to school children, but in many cases the younger members of the family were also affected, and in a few cases the parents contracted the disease. All were treated at the clinic, and by the end of the year the disease had considerably abated.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE DEPARTMENT.

1. HEALTH VISITING.

Each of the four nurses employed by the Council carries out the combined duties of the school medical service and of health visiting.

2. THE WELFARE CLINIC. As before.

3. Antenatal and Post-Natal Clinic.

During the year 28 sessions were held, the Gynæcologist being in attendance.

244 expectant mothers came for consultation and examination, and they made 602 attendances. Of the 244 cases, 74 attended on one occasion only, 65 came twice, 58 three times. 21 four times, 18 five times, 6 six times, 2 seven times. 105 were expectant for the first time (primiparæ). The ages of the primiparæ are shown in the following table:—

All morbid conditions found on examination were given appropriate treatment.

6. MATERNITY CASES.

Arrangements exist with Townleys Hospital, whereby any woman can be admitted for her confinement. Payment is made according to her means. 63 cases were admitted to Townleys during the year.

In addition to the arrangements with Townleys Hospital the Council has made financial arrangements with St. Mary's Hospitals, Manchester, for the reception of difficult cases of labour. Six such cases were admitted during the year.

7. MATERNAL MORTALITY.

There was one maternal death during 1941.

8. EMERGENCY UNIT.

In the case of confinement taking place at home, arrangements have been made with St. Mary's Hospitals for an emergency unit to be provided if the patient is so gravely ill that removal to a hospital would be dangerous. There were no cases requiring this service during 1941.

9. Infant Life Protection.

At the end of the year there were only three cases on the register. They were visited regularly.

11. TONSILS AND ADENOIDS.

Dr. Gordon Mowat, Aurist to the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee and to the Education Committee, held 17 sessions during the year. 28 pre-school children were examined and treated.

11 pre-school children had operative treatment at Bolton Royal Infirmary.

12. MINOR AILMENTS.

112 pre-school children attended the clinic during the year, making in all 706 attendances.

13. Orthopædics.

16 pre-school children attended the Orthopædic Clinic during the year, and made 35 attendances. 12 surgical appliances. i.e., boots, irons, etc., were supplied through the Clinic. 1 pre-school child, admitted to Biddulph Hospital during 1940, was still in at the end of 1941.

14. Defective Vision.

31 pre-school children were examined by the School Oculist. In 14 cases suitable glasses were prescribed, and for the remainder other treatment was advised.

15. MEDICAL OFFICER'S CONSULTATIONS AT THE CLINIC.

The Medical Officer had 540 consultations at the clinic during the year. Defects were treated.
