

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I beg to submit my Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary circumstances of the Borough for 1969 including a report on the Port Health Area.

The Registrar General's estimate of the mid-year population was 14610 being an increase of 240 over the preceding year.

The birth rate of 19.3 and death rate of 9.7 are to be compared with that of England and Wales which were 16.3 and 11.9.

There were five infant deaths of which 4 occurred in the first week of independent existence and were from causes associated with prematurity and birth risks.

The incidence of infectious diseases was low and all were relatively mild. Infective Hepatitis was made notifiable during the year and three cases were reported to the Department.

The routine work of the Health Department keeps increasing with still a disproportionate amount of lengthy visits to the offensive trade factories where the problems causing nuisances are so varied in extent.

I wish to express my thanks to Mr. Bampton your Senior Public Health Inspector who is responsible for the daily work of the Department and also to the other officers of the Council for their assistance and co-operation.

I also wish to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their courtesy and support throughout the year.

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SECTION I

STATISTICAL AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA

CLIMATOLOGY

The total rainfall during the year was 27.23 inches as compared with 31.93 inches in 1968 and 25.75 inches in 1967.

Maximum and Minimum temperatures, together with the rainfall recorded each month, are shown in Appendix "A"

AREA

The Borough of Faversham covers an area of 3,070 acres, and includes the villages of Davington and Preston.

POFULATION

The Registrar General estimated the mid-year population for 1969 as 14,610 an increase of 240 from the estimated population for the previous year i.e. 14,370.

NUMBER OF INHABITED HOUSES

The number of inhabited houses and flats a the end of 1969 was 5547 as compared with 5438 at the end of 1968. Towards this increase 14 houses were provided by the Council and 103 constructed privately. During the year 8 were demolished. The net increase in habitable houses was therefore 109.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICES

Local Authority Health Services under the National Health Service Act are provided and administered by the Kent County Council. SECTION VI

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Staff

An Additional Public Health Inspector, Mr. A.J. Longley, was appointed on the 1st January, 1969. The Department then operated throughout the year with a Senior Public Health Inspector, an Additional Public Health Inspector, a part time clerk and a part time rodent operator.

Water Supply

The responsibility for mains water supply to the Borough rests with the Mid-Kent Water Company. The local office remains at 41 Stone Street.

No major work to the mains was carried out during the year.

All samples were reported as satisfactory.

Drainage and Sewerage

The outline scheme for the modernisation of the sewage works has received Ministry approval and detailed schedules are being prepared by the consultants for sending out to tender.

The scheme for the drainage of Love Lane and Macknade area received Ministry approval and the contract has now been completed.

The relief sewage scheme for the Brents sewer also received Ministry approval and has been completed.

Refuse Collection and Disposal

During 1969 a further three hundred houses in the Borough were brought into the paper sack scheme.

The Borough refuse continued to be tipped in to the disused workings of the Ace, Sand and Gravel Company at Ham Road.

Public Cohveniences

The public conveniences within the Borough are maintained and supervised by the Borough Engineer and Surveyor's Department and the arrangements which existed in 1968 have continued. Up to now the conveniences have been unattended but arrangements are now being made for the main block in the car park to be supervised by an attendant.

Public Swimming Bath

During 1969 season 69,792 people paid for admission to the pool as compared with 59,117 in 1968. 488 season and weekly season tickets were issued as compared with 518 in 1968. 10,914 spectators paid admission.

The pool is regularly used for swimming instruction purposes by school pupils, club members and police cadets.

Regular routine testing and sampling of both the main and learners pool water was carried out by the Public Health Department and the Public Health Laboratory.

Hop Picking

With the advent of machine picking, camps, which in the past have housed many pickers from outside the area, are rapidly disappearing. Any labour which is required is recruited locally.

Mortuary Accommodation

Mortuary facilities are provided at the Faversham Cottage Hospital.

SECTION VII

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

Milk

The premises registered as a dairy continued to be used in 1969, it is anticipated that further re-organisation of the Company will take place in 1970 which will result in the closure of these premises.

Ice Cream

Fifty four premises are now registered for the sale of ice cream.

Bakehouses

The four small bakehouses in the Borough continued in use in 1969, no complaints were received about the products from these premises.

Market Stalls

The number of stalls using the Market Place on Fridays and Saturdays remain constant. The washing and sanitary facilities provided by the Council continue in use as for last year.

Infectious Diseases

The number of infectious disease cases during 1969 was 29 which is a decrease of 1 over the previous year .

23 visits were made to make enquiries and to give advice on control.

Offensive Trades

The two bone boiling and one hoof and horn cooking factories continued to operate during the year.

In the case of the hoof and horn premises agreement was reached with the Alkali Inspectorate that this factory should be registered under the provisions of the Alkali Act and inspection is now the responsibility of those inspectors.

Legal proceedings in respect of one of the offensive trade factories resulted in undertakings being given by the Company to provide additional equipment and staff.

386 visits were made to the factories during 1969.

Licensed Premises

48 visits were made to the licensed premises during the year only minor matters were found to need attention.

Petroleum

All the premises for which applications for the renewal of the annual licences were received were inspected during the year. A number of notices were served for the contraventions of "conditions of licence" as imposed by this Authority.

Fireworks

31 visits were made to premises where fireworks were being sold, improvement in storage conditions were brought about in three instances following these visits.
