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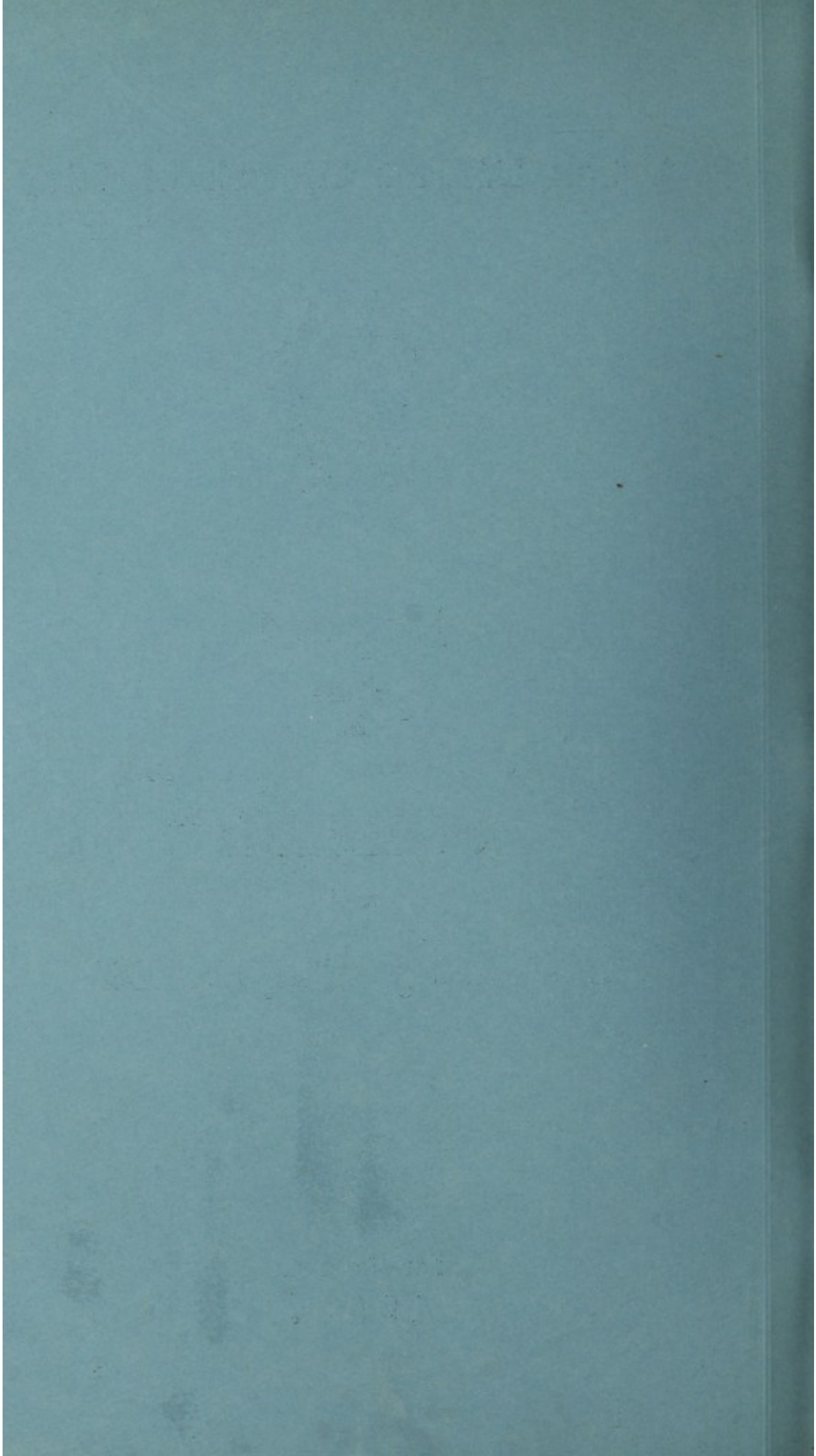

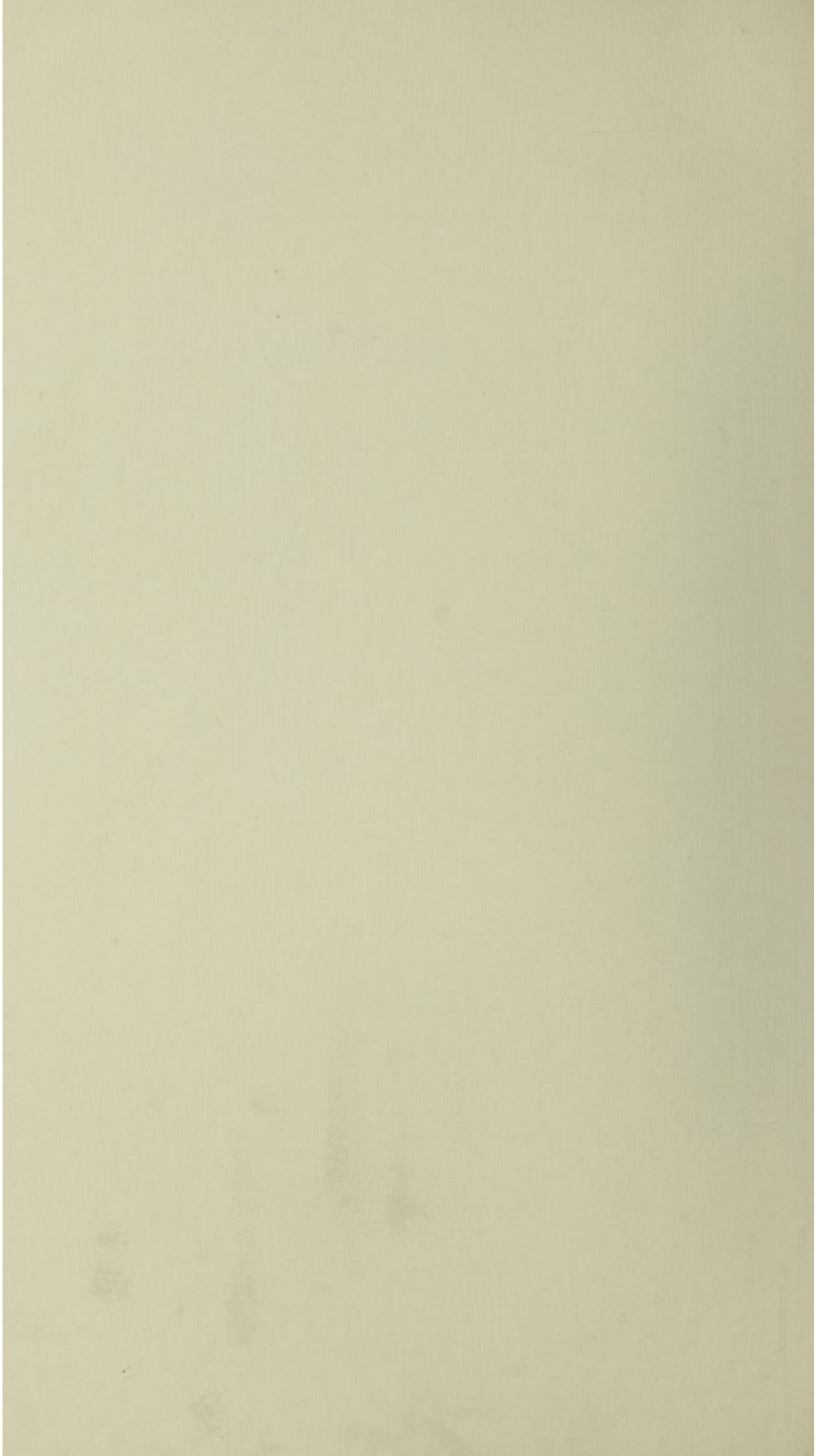

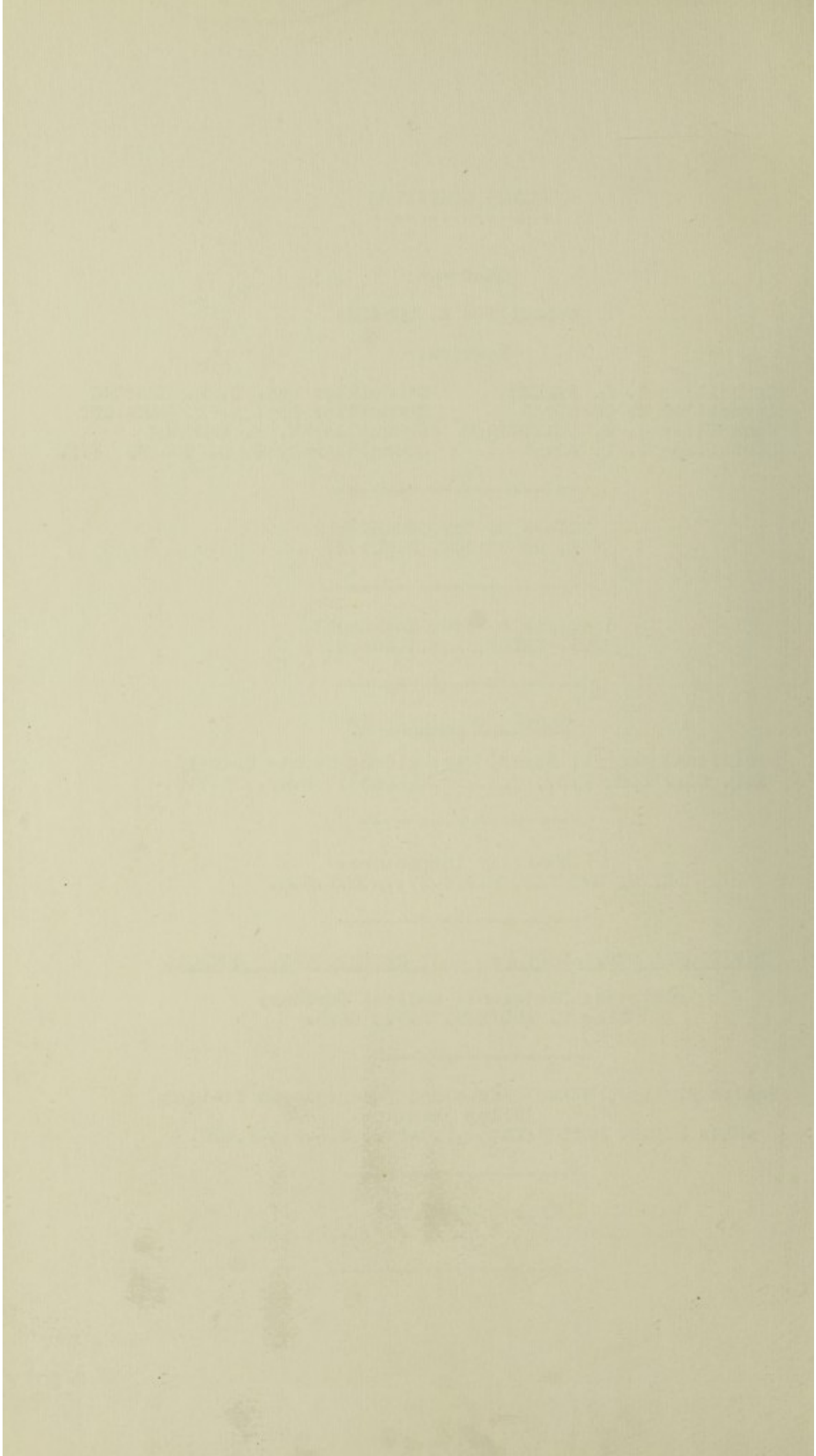

(b) Still-births:

There were 2 still-births (legitimate) during the year, equivalent to a rate of 32.8 per 1,000 births.

(c) Deaths:

The number of deaths registered during the year as belonging to the Urban District was 54. This is equal to a death-rate of 11.2 per 1,000. The comparability factor to correct the crude death-rate for age and sex distribution in the Urban District was calculated by the Registrar General at 0.86, this on multiplication with the actual rate gives a comparative death-rate of 9.6.

The causes of death are given in Table 1.

(d) Infant Mortality Rate:

There was 1 death in an infant under 1 year of age (legitimate). The infantile mortality rate based upon the number of live births registered in the year, i.e., 59 is equivalent to a rate of 16.9 per 1,000 births.

(e) Maternal Mortality:

There were no deaths from maternal causes.

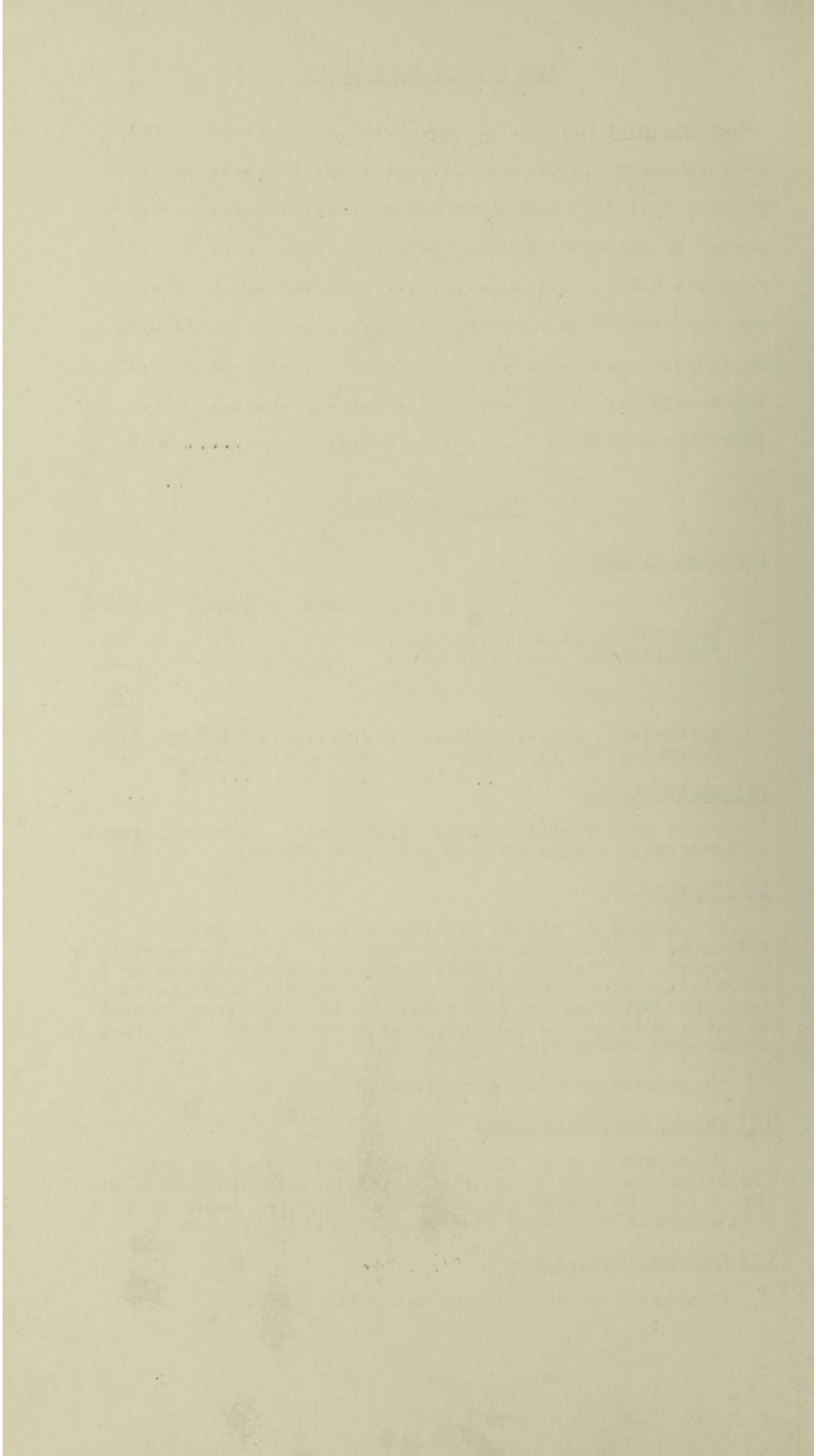

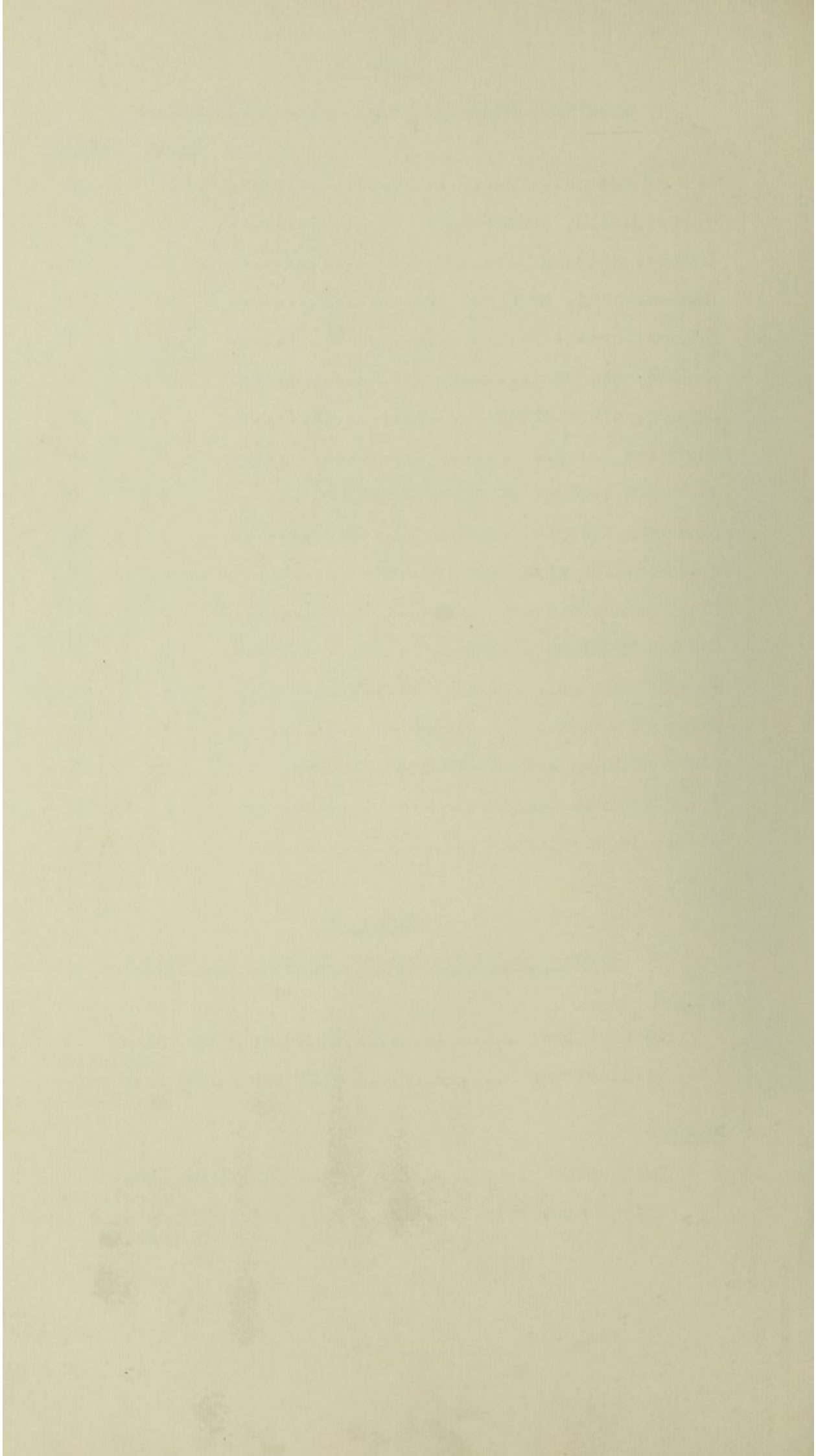

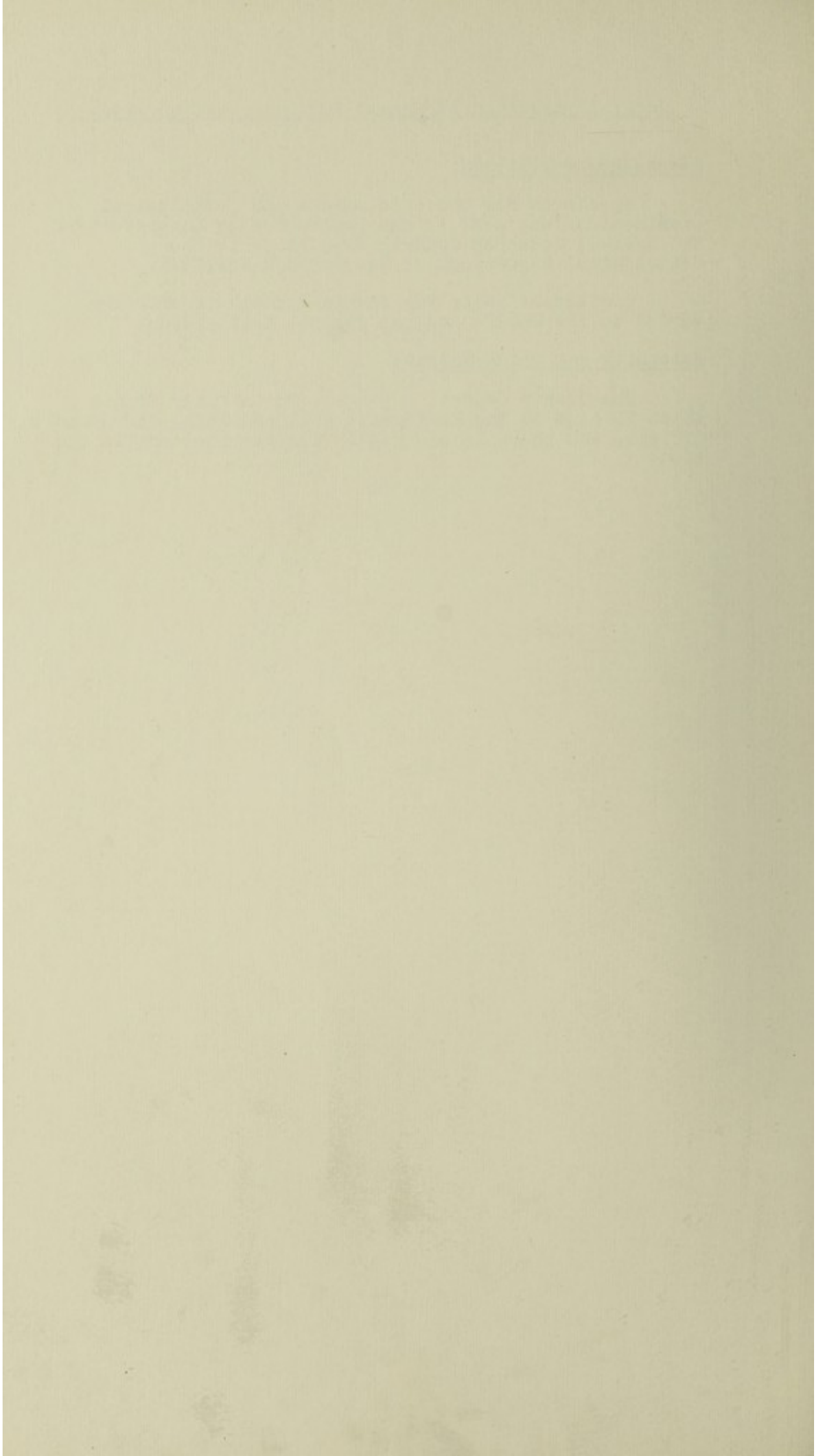
Laboratory Facilities

Specimens for bacteriological and pathological examinations are sent to the Public Health Laboratory of the Medical Research Council at Hull or to the Pathological Laboratory at Scarborough Hospital.

Samples of water for chemical analysis are forwarded to the Public Analyst for the East Riding.

Maternity and Child Welfare

The County Council provide a fortnightly Clinic which is held in the Conference Hall adjoining the Council Offices, and there is one Health Visitor resident in the town.

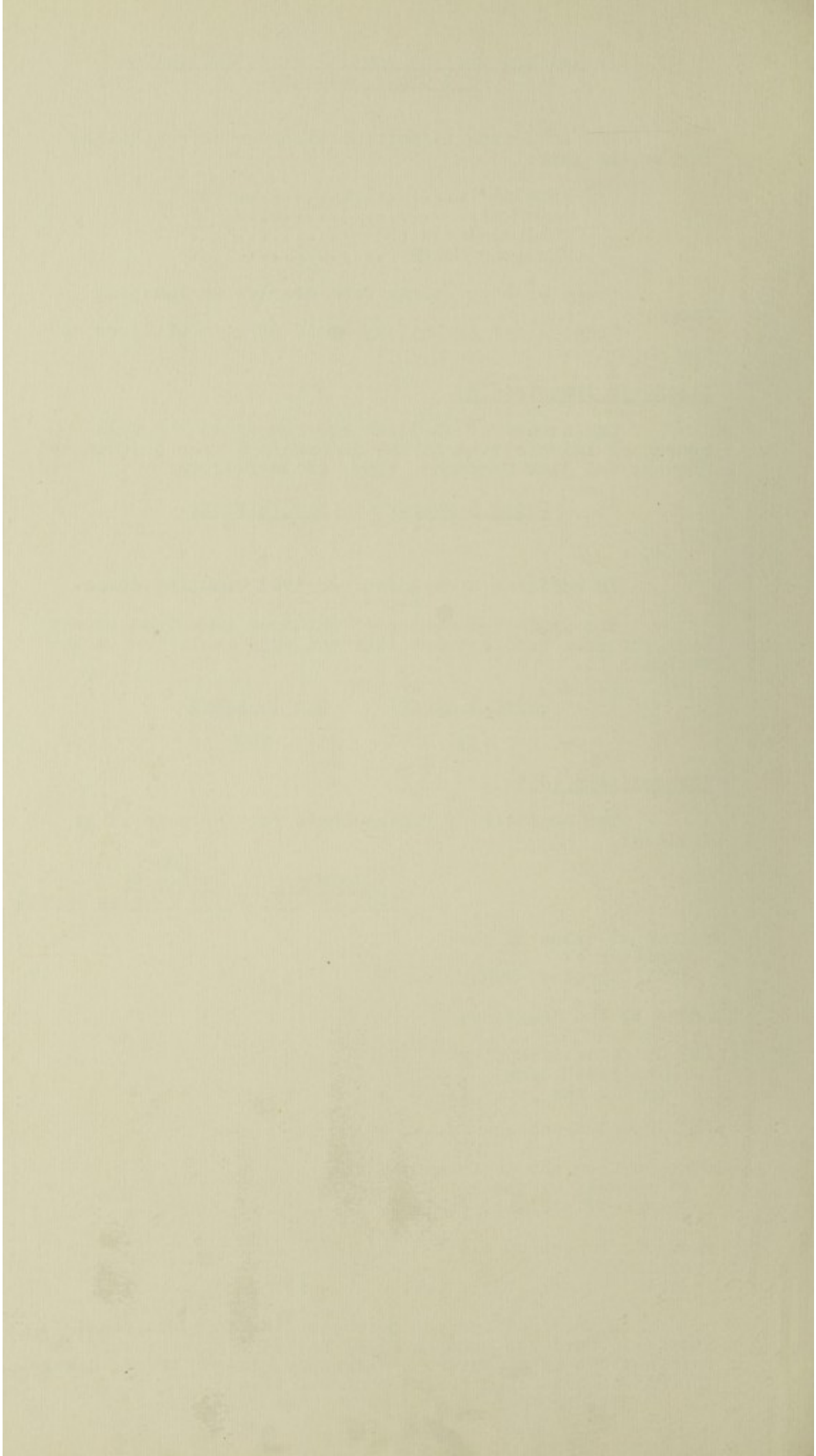

Annual Report of the Sanitary Inspector
for the year ending 31st December, 1955.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies' and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the work of the Sanitary Inspector for the year 1955.

GENERAL

The general sanitary condition of the district was satisfactory with the exception as in previous years of the pollution of the beach by the sewer outfall, and the pollution of the Primrose Valley stream by discharge from septic tanks.

FOOD

All food premises in the district were inspected and hygienic standards generally found to be satisfactory. Informal action was taken in respect of minor infringements of the Food Handling Byelaws, the owner or shopkeeper concerned in each case being willing to co-operate. There were no instances when formal action was necessary.

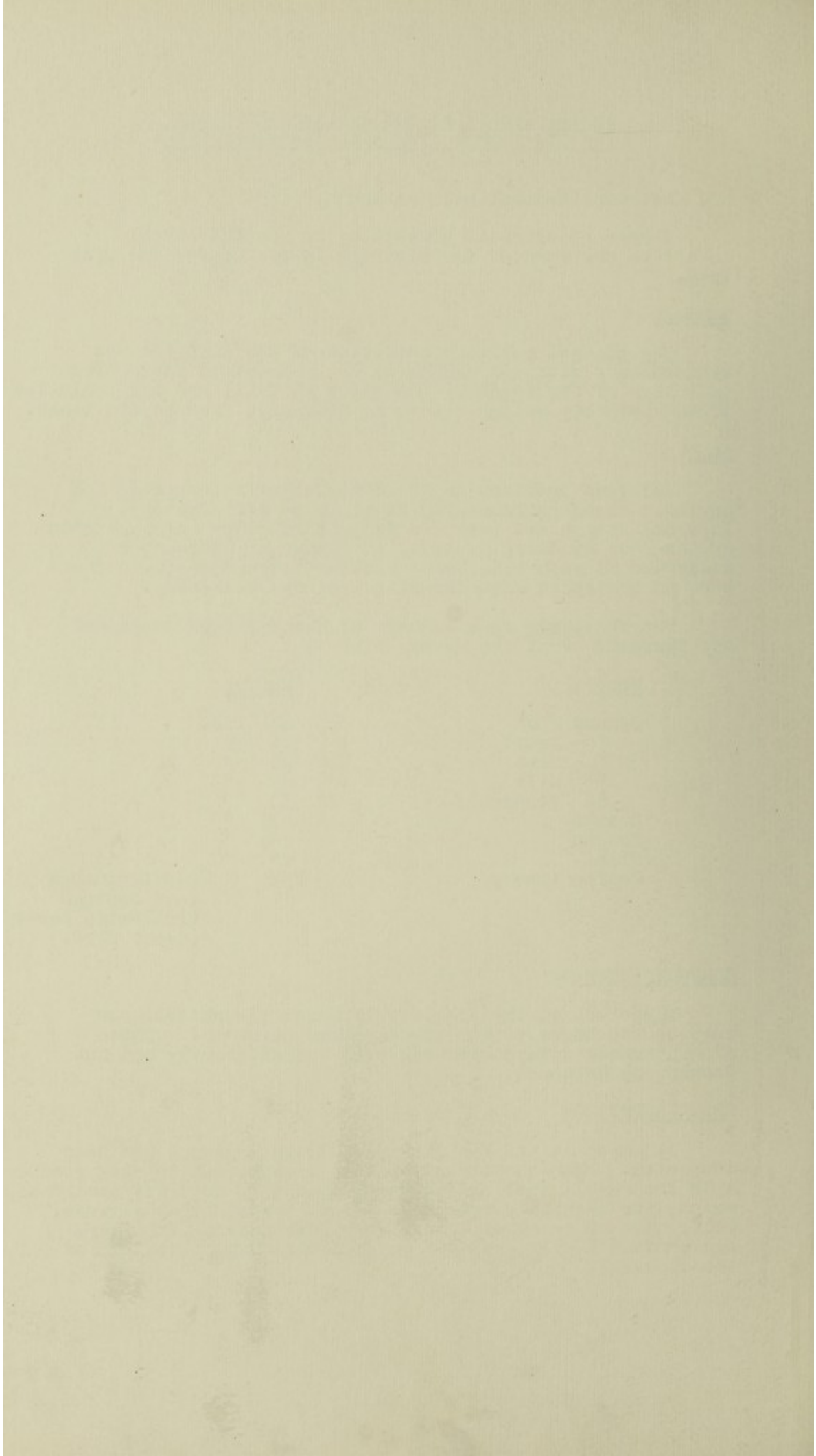

SLAUGHTERHOUSES

There are in the area two licenced slaughterhouses serving the needs of two of the local butchers. These slaughterhouses have been operated satisfactorily and not caused any nuisance.

MEAT INSPECTION

All meat at the two licenced slaughterhouses has been inspected. The quality of animals slaughtered is very good with the result that only a small amount of meat was condemned, mainly for localised tuberculosis and parasitic conditions. There were no cases of Cysticercus Bovis during the year. All condemned meat was dyed green before being taken out of the district.

MILK

Most of the milk sold within the district was either Tuberculin Tested or Pasteurised. Raw ungraded milk was supplied by one retailer, but this was discontinued when "The Milk (Special Designations) (Specified Areas) No. 2 Order 1955" came into operation. There is one pasteurising and bottling plant in the area, which received regular inspection and from which milk samples were frequently submitted for bacteriological examination.

30 samples of milk were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for examination and of this number one did not conform to the required standard.

ICE CREAM

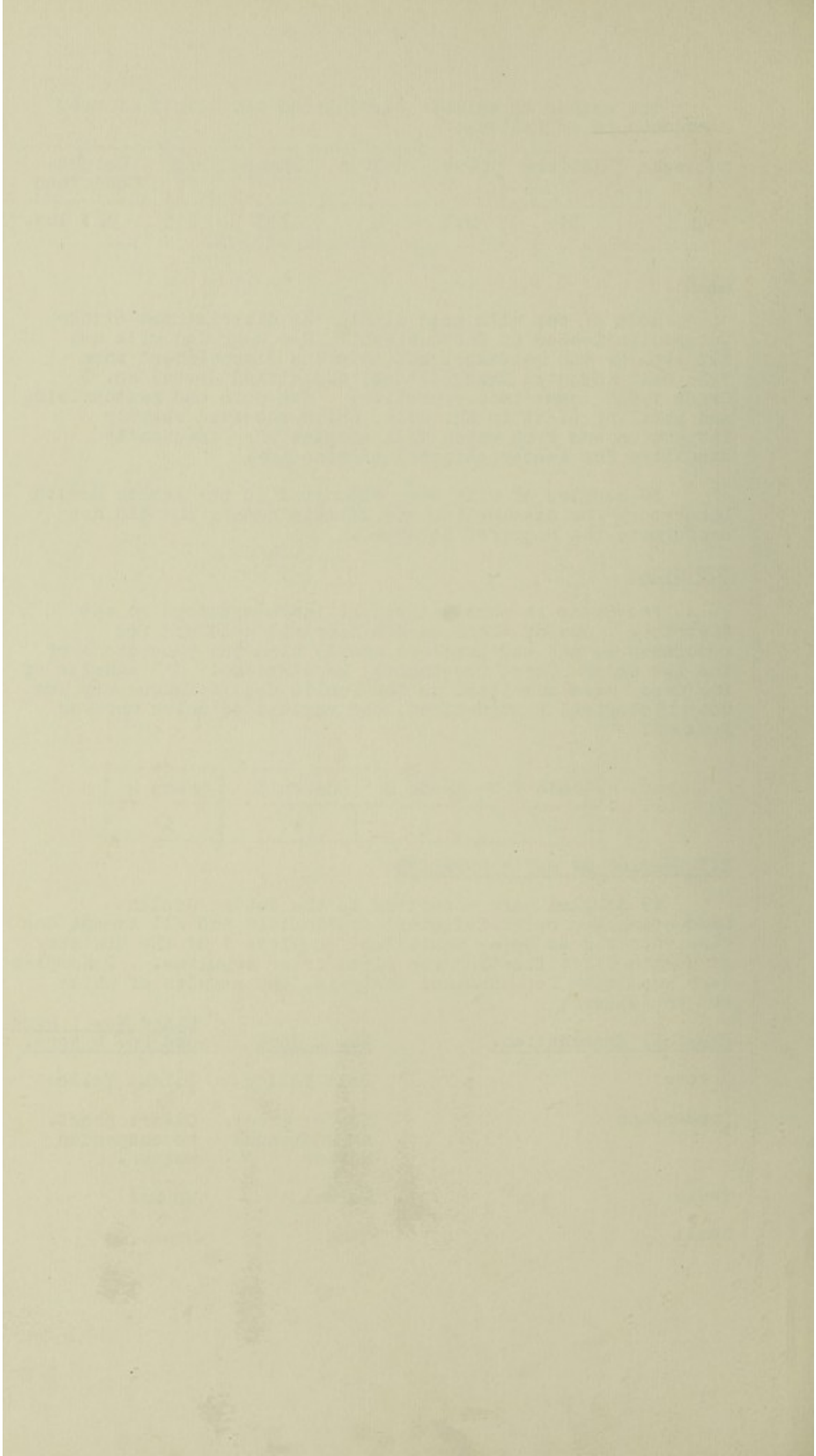
Ice Cream is manufactured at three premises in the district. One of these uses a complete cold mix for manufacture, and all premises comply with the provisions of the Ice Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations. 13 samples of ice cream were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for bacteriological examinations, the results of which were as follows:

SEWAGE DISPOSAL

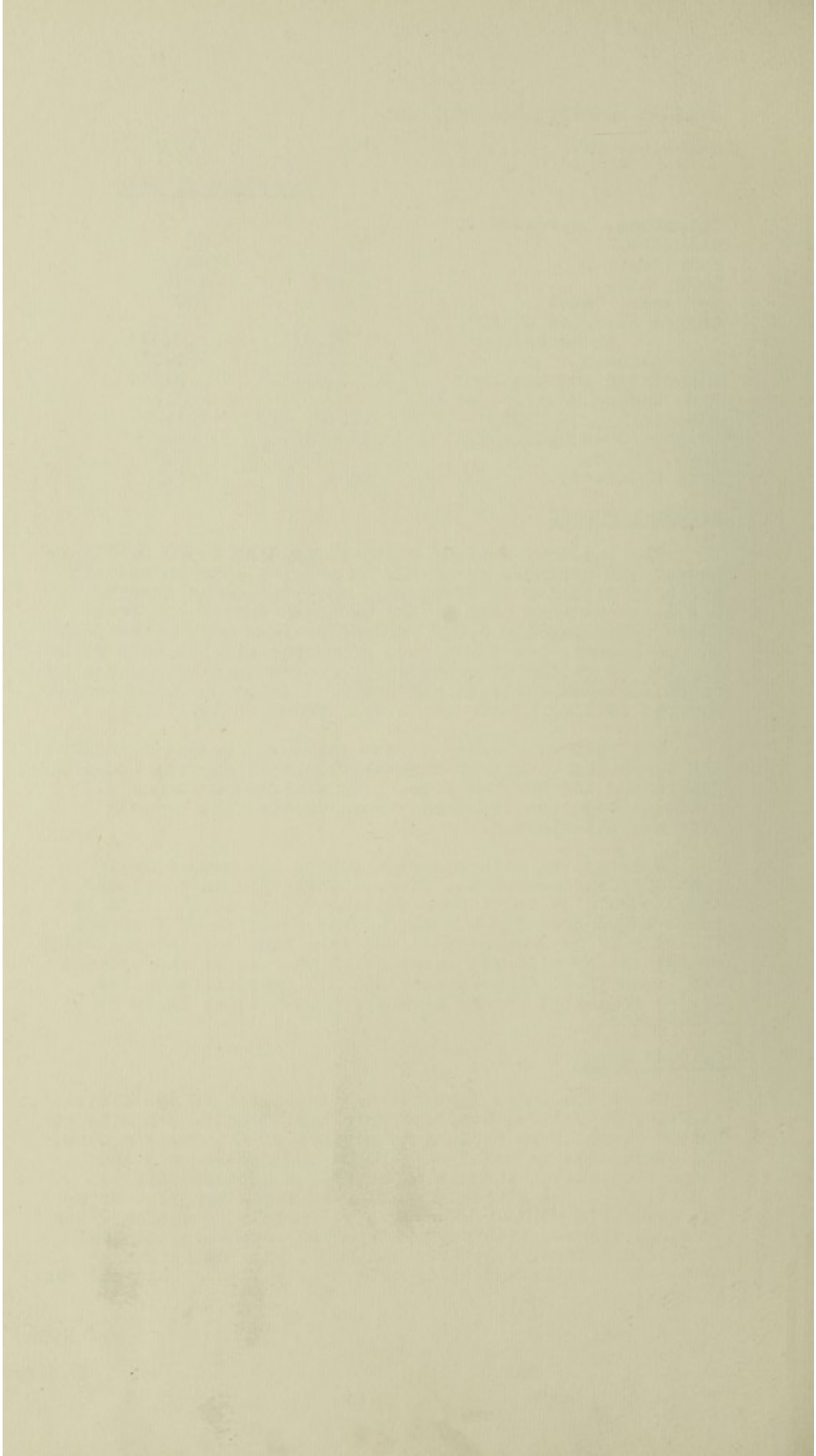
The built up area of Filey comprising 1,300 dwelling-houses and business premises, is sewered into an outfall which is situated in Filey Bay, near the Coble Landing. The large holiday camp at the southern end of the area, where approximately 8,000 persons resided during the peak of the summer, has a separate temporary outfall into Filey Bay and is fitted with storage tanks so that sewage can be released twice daily at high tide. As in previous years serious fouling of the beach was caused at low tide.

The Primrose Valley stream was again polluted during the summer by discharge from septic tanks serving houses, hotels and the caravan site. To minimise nuisance all effluent from the treatment tanks serving the caravan site was chlorinated.

Work on the main sewerage scheme and new outfall continued throughout the year. When this is completed there should be no further fouling of the beach. It is to be hoped that the scheme for the sewerage of Primrose Valley will be completed at the same time but the pollution of the stream will not cease until the use of the various septic tanks is discontinued and all properties in the valley connected to the sewerage system which is to be constructed.

CAMPING SITES

There are three licenced camping sites in the district, at Primrose Valley, Lowfield Farm and Seadale. A site at Muston Grange Farm is used by members of the Caravan Club. The camps were in use from March to September only and inspection showed them to be kept in a satisfactory condition. All sites have adequate water supplies from the Council's mains. The site at Seadale is on the water carriage system, with a private sewer connecting to the Council's sewers. At Lowfield Farm, pail closets are used and at Primrose Valley both pail and water closets are in use.



RODENT CONTROL

This work is carried out by one Rodent Operator working part time, the cost of which qualifies for the 50% Ministry Grant. The sewer system was test baited during the year and found to be almost free from infestation. This service is free for domestic premises but a charge is made for business premises. No major infestations were found during the year.

HOUSING

A considerable number of unfit houses were the subject of clearance orders before the war and have been demolished although the sites have not been redeveloped. A survey carried out during the year indicated that some 56 houses would have to be included for demolition. Of this number 33 houses were the subject of clearance orders confirmed by the Minister in 1937. Most of these 33 houses are now unoccupied and awaiting demolition, some have been modified for a temporary period under the building byelaws, and are being used as workplaces. The houses which have not yet been represented will be included in future clearance orders and all the unfit houses should be demolished within 5 years.

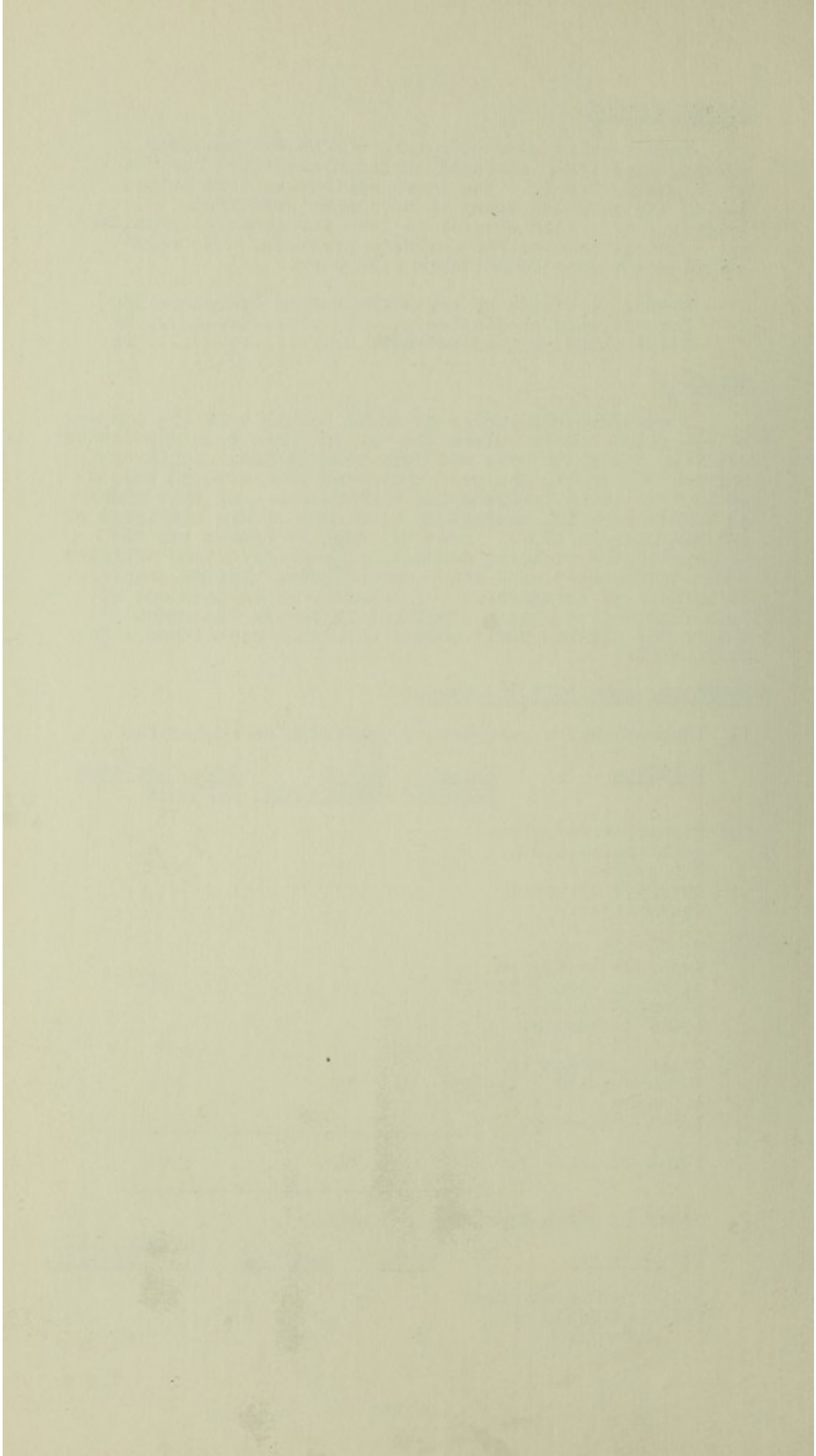
