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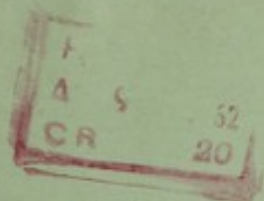
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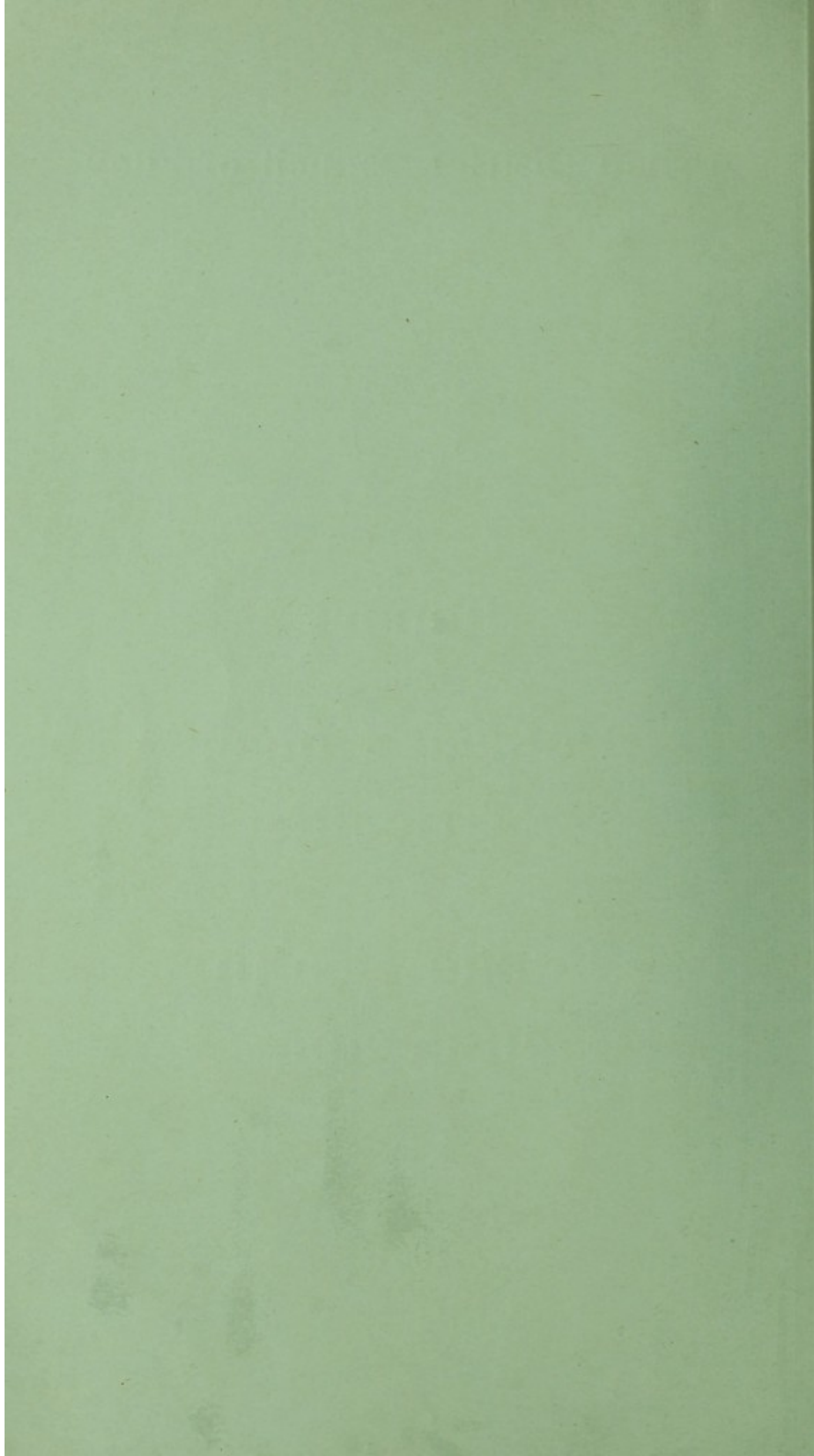

Nr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1961.

The Registrar General's figures indicate an estimated population of 4,500, a decrease of 300 compared with last year. There were 62 live births in the District during the year compared with 57 last year, and an adjusted birth rate of 14.47 per 1,000 population compares with a national birth rate of 17.4 per 1,000 population. 69 deaths occurred during the year compared with 67 last year, and an adjusted death rate of 14.26 per 1,000 population compares with a national death rate of 12.0 per 1,000 population. There were 3 deaths of infants under one year of age due to Congenital Malformations and Prematurity.

Of the infectious diseases, Measles was outstanding during the year, there being 181 cases. Of these, only 2 were of persons over 14 years of age.

Concerning the sanitary circumstances of the District, there were few changes during the year. The water supply continued as previously and 26 samples taken for bacteriological examination proved satisfactory. The Primrose Valley sewerage scheme was completed and schemes for Hunmanby Gap and Royal Oak are still in hand.

During the year the Public Health Inspector continued the administration of the scavenging service. Tipping at Hunmanby was discontinued and a new tipping site off the Scarborough Road was brought into use. Meat inspection continues to cover 100% of animals slaughtered in the district.

In presenting this report may I express my thanks to the staff of the Department for their work and help during the year and also to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

Dear Sirs,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1921.

The Registrar General's figures indicate an estimated population of 4,500, a decrease of 200 compared with last year. There were 62 live births in the District during the year compared with 67 last year, and an estimated rate of 14.4 per 1,000 population compared with a national rate of 17.4 per 1,000 population. 88 deaths occurred during the year compared with 67 last year, and an estimated death rate of 19.3 per 1,000 population compared with a national death rate of 15.0 per 1,000 population. There were 2 deaths of infants under one year of age due to genital inflammation and tetanus.

Of the infectious diseases, diphtheria was outstanding during the year, no being 181 cases. Of these, only 2 were of persons over 15 years of age.

Concerning the sanitary conditions of the District, there were changes during the year. The water supply continued as previously and samples taken for bacteriological examination proved satisfactory. The sewage valley sewerage scheme was completed and schemes for Burnaby Gap and Royal Oak are still in hand.

During the year the Public Health Inspector continued the disinfection of the sewerage service. Tipping at Burnaby was continued and a new tipping site at the Burnaby Road was brought into use. Pest inspection continued to cover 100% of animals slaughtered in the district.

In presenting this report may I express my thanks to the staff of the District Council for their work and help during the year and also to the Chairman and members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

### HOSPITAL SERVICES

There are no hospitals in Filey. Hospital facilities are available at Scarborough and Bridlington.

### Miniature Mass Radiography

The Miniature Mass Radiography Unit of the Leeds Regional Hospital Board visited Filey in April and held public sessions. A total of 382 persons were examined.

### NURSING HOME

There is a Nursing Home in the District registered with the County Council to provide accommodation for up to 30 patients.

### NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

#### Part III Accommodation

Accommodation is provided by the County Council at Burlington House, Bridlington, Danes Lea, Bridlington, "The Limes", Driffield and Wold House, Driffield.

#### Section 47

It was not necessary to take proceedings under this section during the year.

### LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY SERVICES - NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946

The following services are provided in the District by the East Riding County Council as the Local Health Authority.

#### Infant Welfare Clinic

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held in the Conference Hall on alternate Tuesdays from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

#### Domiciliary Midwifery Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Home Nursing Service. There is one District Nurse/Midwife residing and working in the District.

#### Health Visiting

One Health Visitor works in the Filey area, her office being situated in the Conference Hall (telephone number 2282).

#### Home Nursing Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Midwifery Service as indicated above.

#### Ambulance Service

The St. John's Ambulance Brigade run the Ambulance Service on an agency basis for the County Council. The ambulance station is situated in Witford Street (telephone number 2225).

HEALTH SERVICES

There are no hospitals in Elgin. Hospital facilities are available at Scarborough and Hamilton.

Elgin County Health Department

The Elgin County Health Department is part of the Local Health Board. The Health Board is responsible for the health of the County. A total of 242 persons are employed.

HEALTH SERVICES

There is a Health Board in the District responsible with the County Council to provide recommendations for up to 10 patients.

LOCAL HEALTH SERVICES ACT, 1984

Part III - Recommendations

Recommendations are provided by the County Council at Scarborough, Hamilton, and other locations. The Health Board is responsible for the health of the County. A total of 242 persons are employed.

ELGIN COUNTY HEALTH SERVICES - NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1948

The following services are provided in the District by the Elgin County Council as the Local Health Authority.

Infant Welfare Clinic

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held in the Conference Hall on alternate days from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Consulting Midwifery Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Health Board. The service is provided by a midwife who is working in the District.

Health Visiting

One Health Visitor works in the Elgin area, her office being located in the Conference Hall (telephone number 2282).

Home Nursing Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Health Board. The service is provided by a nurse who is working in the District.

Physiotherapy Service

The Health Board's physiotherapy service is provided by a physiotherapist who is working in the District. The physiotherapy service is located in the Conference Hall (telephone number 2282).



### Domestic Help

Home Help service which is rendered in the District is administered at County Hall, Beverley, and all applications for the service are dealt with by the Home Help Organiser (telephone number ONE 261281).

### LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authority schools in the District. Head inspection of children in the primary schools is undertaken by the school nurse at the beginning of each term, and the service of a speech therapist is available for half a day each week to children of all ages.

Immunisation against diphtheria and poliomyelitis and B.C.G. vaccination is made available to children in school.

### OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

#### Buckrose Health Division Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months a Co-ordinating Committee, under the aegis of the County Council, meets in Bridlington to co-ordinate the work of officers in the district who are concerned with the welfare of children. The primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of break-up of families.

On the Committee are representatives of the County Children's Department, the County Health Department, the School Welfare Department, the Housing managers of the District Councils, the National Assistance Board, the National Society for the prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Voluntary Service and a Consultant Psychiatrist. Your Medical Officer of Health in his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer takes the Chair of the Committee.

### PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY SERVICE

Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory of the Medical Research Council at Hull.

### VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS

#### Women's Voluntary Service

The W.V.S. undertakes the sale of welfare foods for infants at the Conference Hall each Friday 9.30 am. at 11 a.m. and also at each infant welfare clinic.

They also administer a Meals on Wheels Service, a Chiropody service, a Darby and Joan Club and at 18, Queen Street, an Old Persons Centre.

#### National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children

Filey lies within the North East Yorkshire Branch of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and cases requiring the services of the Society are visited by Inspector White working from Scarborough. Inspector White's work is much appreciated by those of us concerned with child welfare.



Domestic help service which is provided in the District is administered by the County Health Department, and all applications for service are dealt with by the County Health Department (see page 10).

# LOCAL NUTRITION SURVEILLANCE - CHILDREN'S SERVICE

Domestic medical inspection and control of all children attending school is provided in the District. Local inspection of children in the primary schools is conducted by the school nurse at the beginning of each year, and the service is continued as necessary for half a year each year.

Inspection of children is provided by the County Health Department and is available to children in the District.

# THE LOCAL NUTRITION SERVICE

## Domestic Health Department - Children's Service

Domestic health service is provided by the County Health Department, under the supervision of the County Health Officer, who is responsible for the work of the District Health Officer and the prevention of disease in children in the District. 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# LOCAL NUTRITION SERVICE

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## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

### GENERAL

During the year the Primrose Valley Sewerage Scheme was completed and it is now possible for all properties in the Valley to be connected to the public sewer. Unfortunately some premises still remain to be connected and the stream will continue to be polluted until all properties are connected.

The Council discontinued the use of Hummanby Tip midway through the year and tipping commenced at the new tip off Scarborough Road.

### FOOD HYGIENE

Food handling standards within the area are generally good and reliance is placed on education of food handlers to maintain and improve conditions, the advice being given during the course of inspections of the premises. Informal action has been sufficient to obtain improvements in the few instances where conditions were below standard.

#### Preserved Food - Registered Premises - Section 16 Food and Drugs Act, 1955.

8 premises are registered in the District. 12 inspections were made, and the standard was found to be satisfactory.

#### Milk and Dairies Regulations.

One Dairy is registered and 26 inspections were made which revealed a high standard of cleanliness and efficiency. 18 samples of milk both Pasteurised and T.T. Pasteurised were submitted to the Public Analyst and all proved to be satisfactory.

#### The Ice Cream (Heat Treatment etc.) Regulations.

29 premises are registered under the Food and Drugs Act 1955 for the sale of Ice Cream. At only one of the premises is Ice Cream manufactured using heat treatment in accordance with the Regulations. At the majority of premises pre-packed Ice Cream is sold from the freezing cabinets. 8 samples of Ice Cream were submitted to the Public Analyst with the following results:-

At only one of the premises is the Council maintained using best treatment in accordance with the Regulations. ### Slaughterhouses

There are two licensed slaughterhouses in the district serving the needs of two local butchers. One is limited to the slaughter of sheep and pigs only. The owners of both premises have carried out the improvements and alterations in accordance with the Slaughterhouses Act 1958. The Slaughterhouses have been operated satisfactorily during the year.
