Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1962.

The Registrar General's figures for the year indicate a population of 4,490, a decrease of 10 compared with last year. This is the second year running that there has been a decrease in the estimated population. There were 53 births during the year compared with 62 last year and an adjusted birth rate of 12.39 per 1,000 population compares with the national figure of 18.0 per 1,000 live births. 69 deaths occurred during the year, the same number as last year and an adjusted death rate of 14.2 compares with the national death rate of 11.9 per 1,000 population. There were no deaths in infants under 1 year of age.

Of the infectious diseases, measles continued to be the most prominent, 42 cases being notified during the year. All cases were under 14 years of age.

Once again, there were few changes in the sanitary circumstances of the District. The water supply continued as in previous years, but is now managed by the East Yorkshire (Gold Area) Water Board. The sampling of water at source is undertaken by the Board but the Council's Public Health Inspector still takes samples of water as received by the consumer. 18 such samples submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for examination were satisfactory. Concerning sewage disposal, the Public Health Inspector reports an improvement in the condition of the Primrose Valley stream since completion of the sewer, and the schemes for Royal Oak and Hunmanby Gap still remain in hand.

On food hygiene it is pleasing to note that 100 per cent meat inspection has been maintained during the year.

In presenting this report may I express my thanks to the staff of the Department for their work and help during the year and also to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

The Registrar-General's figures for the year indicate a population of 4,400, a decrease of 10 compared with last year. This is the second year running that there has been a decrease in the estimated population. There were 33 births during the year compared with 62 last year and an adjusted birth rate of 12.36 per 1,000 population compared with the national figure of 18.0 per 1,000 live births. 88 deaths occurred during the year, the same number as last year and an adjusted death rate of 14.2 compared with the national death rate of 11.9 per 1,000 population. There were no deaths in infants under 1 year of age.

Of the infectious diseases, measles continued to be the most prominent, 48 cases being notified during the year. All cases were under 14 years of age.

Once again, there were few changes in the sanitary circumstances of the District. The water supply continued as in previous years, but in now managed by the East Yorkshire (Water) Board. The sampling of water at sources is undertaken by the Board but the Council's Public Health Inspector still takes samples of water as received by the consumer. In such samples submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for examination were satisfactory. Concerning sewage disposal, the Public Health Inspector reports an improvement in the condition of the Easington Valley stream since completion of the sewer, and the scheme for Royal Oak and Hammanby Gap still remains in hand.

On food hygiene it is pleasing to note that 100 per cent meat inspection has been maintained during the year.

In presenting this report may I express my thanks to the staff of the Department for their work and help during the year and also to the Chairman and members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

### HOSPITAL SERVICES

There are no hospitals in Filey. Hospital facilities are available at Scarborough and Bridlington.

#### Miniature Mass Radiography

The Miniature Mass Radiography Unit of the Leeds Regional Hospital Board visited Filey in April and held public sessions. A total of 405 persons were examined.

### NURSING HOME

There is a Nursing Home in the District registered with the County Council to provide accommodation for up to 30 patients.

### NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

#### Part III Accommodation

Accommodation is provided by the County Council at Burlington House, Bridlington, Danes Lea, Bridlington, "The Limes", Driffield and the Wold House, Driffield.

#### Section 47

It was not necessary to take proceedings under this section during the year.

### LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY SERVICES - NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946.

The following services are provided in the District by the East Riding County Council as the Local Health Authority :

#### Infant Welfare Clinic

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held in the Conference Hall on alternative Tuesdays from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

#### Domiciliary Midwifery Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Home Nursing Service. There is one District Nurse/Midwife residing and working in the District.

#### Health Visiting

One Health Visitor works in the Filey area. Her office being situated in the Conference Hall (telephone number 2282).

#### Home Nursing Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Midwifery Service as indicated above.

#### Ambulance Service

The St. John's Ambulance Brigade run the Ambulance Service on an agency basis for the County Council. The ambulance station is situated in Mitford Street (telephone number 2225).

HOSPITAL SERVICES

There are no hospitals in Piley. Hospital facilities are available at Southborough and Bridlington.

Ministère des Radiology

The Ministère des Radiology Unit of the Quebec Regional Hospital Board visited Piley in April and held public sessions. A total of 408 persons were examined.

NURSING HOME

There is a Nursing Home in the District registered with the County Council to provide accommodation for up to 30 patients.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

Part III Accommodation

Accommodation is provided by the County Council at Burlington House, Burlington, House Lane, Bridlington, "The Limes", Wiltford and the Vale House, Wiltford.

Section 47

It was not necessary to take proceedings under this section during the year.

LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY SERVICES - NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1948.

The following services are provided in the District by the East Riding County Council as the Local Health Authority:

Infant Welfare Clinic

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held in the Conference Hall on alternative Tuesdays from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Postnatal Midwifery Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Home Nursing Service. There is one District Nurse/Midwife residing and working in the District.

Health Visiting

One Health Visitor works in the Piley area. Her office being situated in the Conference Hall (telephone number 2323).

Home Nursing Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Midwifery Service as indicated above.

Ambulance Service

The St. John's Ambulance Brigade run the Ambulance Service as an agency basis for the County Council. The ambulance station is situated in Bedford Street (telephone number 2323).



### Domestic Help

Home Help service which is rendered in the District is administered at County Hall, Beverley, and all applications for the service are dealt with by the Home Help Organiser (telephone number OHU281281)

### LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authority schools in the District. Head inspections of children in the primary schools is undertaken by the school nurse at the beginning of each term.

Immunisation against diphtheria and poliomyelitis and B.C.G. vaccination is made available to children in school.

### OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

#### Buckrose Health Division Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months a co-ordinating Committee, under the aegis of the County Council, meets in Bridlington to co-ordinate the work of officers in the district who are concerned with the welfare of children. The primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of break-up of families.

On the Committee are representatives of the County Children's Department, the County Health Department, the School Welfare Department, the County Welfare Department, the Housing Managers of the District Councils, the National Assistance Board, the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Voluntary Service, Probation Officers, and a Marriage Guidance Counsellor. Representatives of other organisations are co-opted from time to time as the need arises. Your Medical Officer of Health in his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer takes the Chair of the Committee.

### PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY

Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory of the Medical Research Council at Hull.

### VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS

#### Women's Voluntary Service

The W.V.S. undertakes the sale of welfare foods for infants at the Conference Hall each Friday 9.30 a.m. to 11 a.m. and also at each infant welfare clinic.

They also administer a Meals on Wheels service, a Chiropody service, a Darby and Joan Club and at 19, Queen Street, an Old Persons Centre.

### NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN

Filey lies within the North East Yorkshire Branch of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and cases requiring the services of the Society are visited by Inspector White working from Scarborough. Inspector White's work is much appreciated by those of us in Bridlington concerned with child welfare.



Home Help service which is rendered in the District is administered at County Hall, Dover, and all applications for the service are dealt with by the Home Help Organiser (Telephone number 01323 12345).

#### LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Health medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authority schools in the District. Health inspections of children in the primary schools are undertaken by the school nurse at the beginning of each term.

Immunisation against diphtheria and poliomyelitis and B.C.G. vaccination is made available to children in schools.

#### OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

##### East Kent Health Division Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months a co-ordinating Committee, under the aegis of the County Council, meets in Brighton to co-ordinate the work of officers in the district who are concerned with the welfare of children. ## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

### GENERAL

The condition of the stream at Primrose Valley has improved since the sewer was completed but a few premises are still connected to a septic tank and are not taking advantage of the new sewer.

The Queen Street re-development scheme continues and in June a further scheme was commenced which entails the building of nineteen homes in Padbury Avenue for tenant purchase.

### PRESERVED FOOD - REGISTERED PREMISES - SECTION 16 FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1955.

8 premises are registered in the District. 16 inspections were made and the standard was found to be satisfactory.

### FOOD HYGIENE

The standard of food preparation and handling within the area is generally good and informal action has been sufficient to obtain improvements where required. Reliance is placed on the education of food handlers to maintain conditions, and advice is given during the course of inspections of the premises.

### MILK AND DAIRIES REGULATIONS.

One Dairy is registered and 18 inspections were made which revealed a high standard of cleanliness and efficiency. 15 samples of milk were submitted to the Public Analyst and all proved to be satisfactory.

### THE ICE CREAM (HEAT TREATMENT ETC) REGULATIONS.

29 premises are registered under the Food and Drugs Act 1955 for the sale of Ice Cream. At only one is Ice Cream manufactured using heat treatment in accordance with the regulations. At the majority of premises pre-packed Ice Cream is sold from the freezing cabinets. A new type which is becoming increasingly popular is the Soft Ice Cream, and great care must be observed in the cleaning and sterilising of the machine and a set routine strictly adhered to otherwise samples fall into the lower grades. I have received the fullest co-operation from the operators of this type of machine. Ten samples of Ice Cream were submitted to the Public Analyst with the following results:-
