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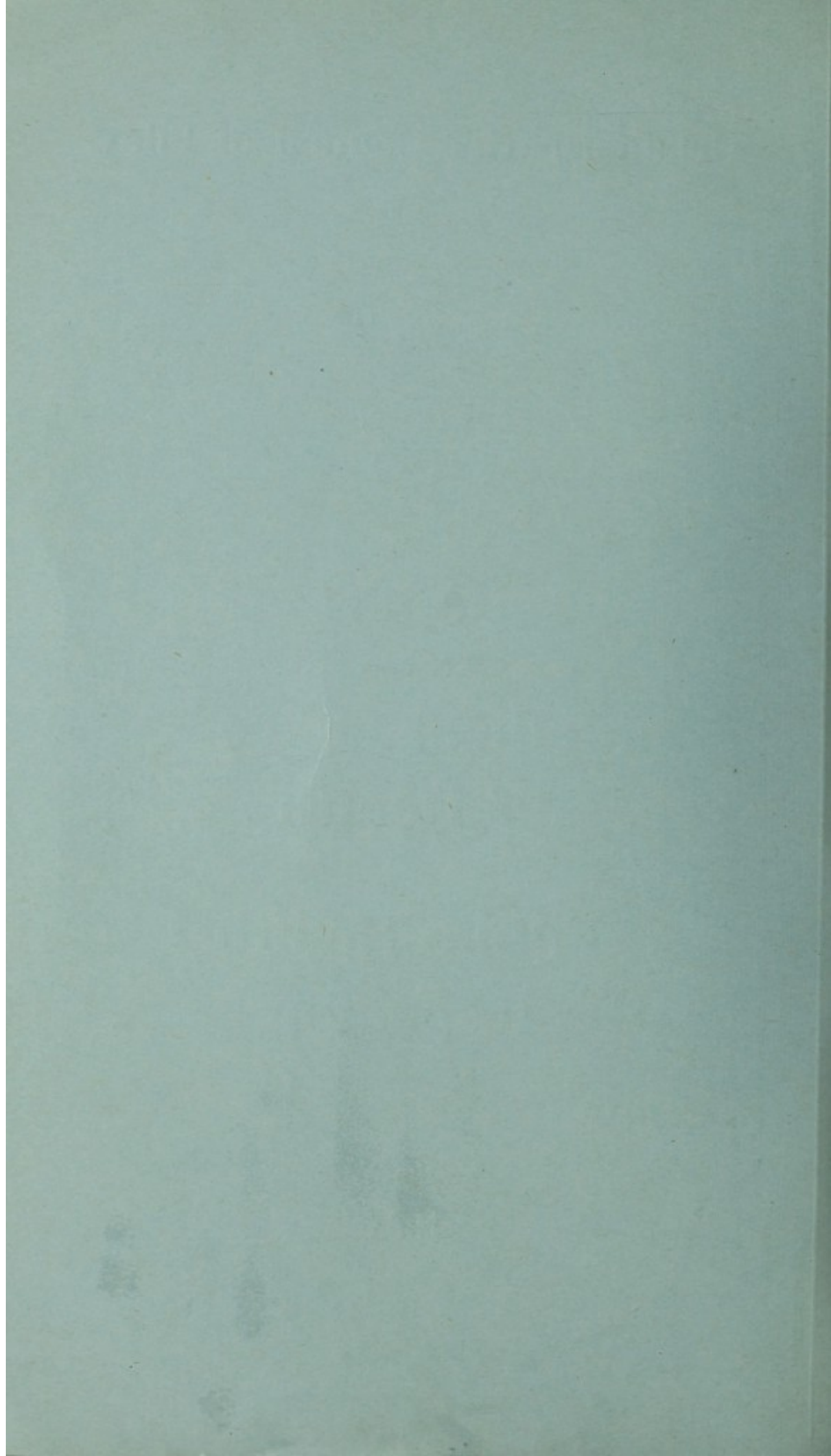

Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1963.

The Registrar General's figures for the year indicate a population of 4,490, the same figure as last year.

During the year there were 78 births, which is the highest annual figure for the District on record. An adjusted birth rate of 21.37 per 1,000 population compares with a national birth rate of 17.37 per 1,000 population.

70 deaths occurred during the year, which is one more than last year and an adjusted death rate of 12.94 per 1,000 population compares with a national death rate of 12.2 per 1,000 population. There was one death of an infant under 1 year of age.

Of the infectious diseases, measles was once again the most prominent, 44 cases being notified during the year. All but 3 were of children under 15 years of age.

Concerning sanitary circumstances, there were few changes during the year. The town's water is supplied by the East Yorkshire (Wolds Area) Water Board and 19 samples taken during the year were satisfactory. A sewage disposal scheme for Hunmanby Gap neared completion and there now remains only Airey Hill and Royal Oak requiring attention.

On housing, the year saw the completion of the Queen Street Redevelopment Scheme involving the erection of 4 houses, 6 old persons bungalows and 6 flats. Also 41 private dwellings were erected by private enterprise. Consideration was also given during the year to the need for any further slum clearance action under the Housing Act, 1957, but it was considered that at present the remaining houses needing attention could be dealt with on an individual basis.

In presenting this report may I express my thanks to the staff of the Department for their work and help during the year and also to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authority schools in the District. Head inspections of children in the primary schools is undertaken by the school nurse at the beginning of each term.

Immunisation against diphtheria and poliomyelitis and B.C.G. vaccination is made available to children in school.

OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

Buckrose Health Division Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months a co-ordinating Committee, under the aegis of the County Council, meets in Bridlington to co-ordinate the work of officers in the district who are concerned with the welfare of children. The primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of break-up of families.

Representatives of other organisations are co-opted from time to time as the need arises. Your Medical Officer of Health in his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer takes the Chair of the Committee.

PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY

Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory of the Medical Research Council at Hull.

VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS

Women's Voluntary Service

The W.V.S. undertakes the sale of welfare foods for infants at the Conference Hall each Friday 9.30 a.m. to 11 a.m. and also at each infant welfare clinic.

OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

Hucknall Health Division Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months a co-ordinating Committee, under the aegis of the County Council, meets in Hucknall to co-ordinate the work of officers in the District who are concerned with the welfare of children. The primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of break-up of families.

On the Committee are representatives of the County Children's Department, the County Health Department, the School Welfare Department, the County Welfare Department, the Housing Department, the District Council, the National Assistance Board, the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Voluntary Service, Probation Officers, and a Marriage Guidance Counsellor. Representatives of other organisations are co-opted from time to time as the need arises. Your Medical Officer of Health in his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer takes the Chair of the Committee.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

GENERAL

With the exception of a few properties, all premises at Primrose Valley and Flat Cliffs are now connected to the Council's sewers.

A Contract was entered into at the end of the year under review, for the provision of a pumping station and sewer at Hunmanby Gap. Once this is completed it will leave the small groups of houses at Airey Hill and Royal Oak as the only part of the Urban Area still requiring attention.

The Queen Street Re-Development scheme providing for 4 three bedroomed houses, 2 two bedroomed flats, 4 bed sitter flats and 5 old persons bungalows was completed during the year and work commenced on modernising the Council owned houses in Ebenezer Terrace which forms part of the same area.

Forty one dwellings principally of the bungalow type were completed by private enterprise.

The compulsory inspection and stamping of all animals slaughtered for human consumption came into operation in October and an arrangement operates whereby an Inspector from a neighbouring Authority carries out meat inspection duties whenever I have been absent.

PRESERVED FOOD - REGISTERED PREMISES - SECTION 16 FOOD & DRUGS ACT 1955

8 premises are registered in the district. 16 inspections were made and the standard was found to be satisfactory.

FOOD HYGIENE

The hygienic standard of food premises was generally satisfactory, informal action being sufficient to obtain improvements where required. Food handlers and the public are becoming more aware of the Food Hygiene Regulations, and this is resulting in a gradual but steady improvement.

MILK & DAIRIES REGULATIONS

One Dairy is registered and 12 inspections were made which revealed a high standard of cleanliness and efficiency. 11 samples of Milk were submitted to the Public Analyst and all proved to be satisfactory.

THE ICE CREAM (HEAT TREATMENT ETC) REGULATIONS.

42 premises are registered under the Food and Drugs Act 1955 for the sale of Ice Cream. At the majority of premises pre-packed Ice Cream is sold from freezing cabinets, but one establishment manufactures its own Ice Cream using heat treatment in accordance with the regulations.

Regular visits have to be paid to the premises using soft Ice Cream machines, particularly where seasonal staff only is employed. I have found a general desire to comply with any requests or advice given during the course of my visits. Nineteen samples of Ice Cream were submitted to the Public Analyst with the following results:-
