To the Chairman and Councillors, Urban District of Filey.

Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1964.

The Registrar General's figures for the year indicate a mid year population of 4,580 compared with 4,490 last year.

During the year there were 56 births and 81 deaths, compared with 78 births and 70 deaths last year. The adjusted birth rate for the District is 15.04 compared with a national birth rate of 18.4 per 1,000 population, and an adjusted death rate of 14.68 compared with a national death rate of 11.3 per 1,000 population. The table on page 6 shows a constant fluctuation in population and in births and deaths.

Infectious diseases notified during the year were very few and call for no special comment.

Concerning sanitary circumstances, there were few changes during the year. The town's water is supplied by the East Yorkshire (Wolds Area) Water Board, and 15 samples taken during the year were satisfactory. The Hunmanby Gap sewage work was completed during the year and there now only remains a small area requiring attention.

On housing, 183 new dwellings were completed by private enterprise and 2 by the Council. These new dwellings should account for some increase in the town's population.

In presenting this report may I express my thanks to the staff of the Department for their work and help during the year, and also to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

## LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authority schools in the District. Head inspections of children in the primary schools is undertaken by the school nurse at the beginning of each term.

Immunisation against diptheria, tetanus and poliomyelitis and B.C.G. Vaccination is made available to children in school.

## OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

## Buckrose Health Division Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months a co-ordinating Committee, under the aegis of the County Council, meets in Bridlington to co-ordinate the work of officers in the district who are concerned with the welfare of children. The primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of break-up of families.

On the Committee are representatives of the County Children's Department, the County Health Department, the School Welfare Department, the County Welfare Department, the Housing Managers of the District Councils, the National Assistance Board, the National Society for the prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Voluntary Service, Probation Officers, and a Marriage Guidance Counsellor. Representatives of other organisations are co-opted from time to time as the need arises. Your Medical Officer of Health in his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer takes the Chair of the Committee.

## PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY

Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory of the Medical Research Council at Hull.

## VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS

## Women's Voluntary Service

The W.V.S. undertakes the sale of welfare foods for infants at the Conference Hall each Friday 9.30 a.m. to 11 a.m. and also at each infant welfare clinic.

They also administer a Meals on Wheels service, a Chiropody service, a Darby and Joan Club and at 19, Queen Street, an Old Persons Centre.

## NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN

Filey lies within the North East Yorkshire Branch of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and cases requiring the services of the Society are visited by Inspector White working from Scarborough. Inspector White's work is much appreciated by those of us in Filey concerned with child welfare.

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### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

#### GENERAL

The sewer and Pumping Station at Hunmanby Gap was completed during the year under review and this has resulted in the small stream which ran on to the beach almost drying up. There can be little doubt that a good proportion of the water which formerly reached the beach at this point had been septic tank effluent.

183 dwellings principally of the bungalow type were completed by private enterprise. The bulk of these were on the Grange Farm Estate, but a start was also made on a new Estate on Scarborough Road which will contain houses and bungalows.

Each year sees its quota of new legislation and added responsibilities. This year the C...ices, Shops and Railway premises Act came into operation and the inspections involved in it, together with the records and reports have undoubtedly increased the work of the department.

Just over a year ago the inspection and stamping of all animals slaughtered for human consumption became compulsory, and the system still operates whereby Inspectors from a neighbouring Authority carry out meat inspection duties whenever I am absent from duty.

With one exception the Council owned properties in Ebenezar Terrace have been brought up to standard under a block Improvement Grant Scheme. Once the tenant of the remaining house has been rehoused it too will be improved.

The tenants of property within and in the vicinity of the Providence Place Development scheme are gradually being rehoused. Until the area encompassed by the Scheme is completely vacated the Scheme is bound to be delayed.

## PRESERVED FOOD - REGISTERED PREMISES - SECTION 16 FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1955

8 premises are registered in the District. 10 inspections were made and the standard was found to be satisfactory.

## THE ICE CREAM (HEAT TREATMENT ETC) REGULATIONS

43 premises are registered under the Food and Drugs Act 1955 for the sale of Ice Cream. At the majority of these premises pre-packed Ice Cream is sold from freezing cabinets, but the use of "Soft" Ice Cream machines is on the increase and one establishment manufactures its own Ice Cream using heat treatment in accordance with the regulations.

Regular visits have to be paid to the premises using Soft Ice Cream machines, particularly where seasonal staff is employed. Generally speaking there is a genuine desire to produce a product of a high standard and an effort is made to comply with any requests or advice given during the course of my visits. Twenty samples of Ice Cream were submitted to the Public Analyst with the following results :-

## REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Throughout the main part of the year two side loading freighters and six men are employed on the collection of both household and trade refuse, but during the holiday period an additional freighter with two men augments the regular team and is employed mainly on holiday camp collection, but also assists in collecting the town refuse.

One man and an excavator are employed almost full time at the Tip, where controlled tipping is the method of refuse disposal. The Tip has been well controlled in spite of the fact that the changing character of the refuse makes it increasingly difficult to obtain sufficient covering material. Periodic dusting with insecticide has reduced any nuisance from flies and other insects.
